

Too Much for the Old Boy

For many communities, shouldering the burden of increased household and industrial demands on local water utilities has become too much. Water utilities built a quarter to a half century ago are not able to carry the load caused by growth of population and industry and increased per capita use.

According to the National Water Institute, water rationing during hot weather, insufficient pressure to fight fires adequately, and, in some cases a complete lack of water, have plagued communities across the country. In a recent year over 1,000 communities were rationed on water consumption.

These situations have not been the fault of the trained men who operate our water utilities. They are dedicated men who have the ability and training to keep our water facilities operating efficiently. But, unfortunately, many are stymied by inadequate water resources and lack of plant equipment due to public apathy and lack of public funds.

We now use three times more water per person than was used in 1900. By 1975 per capita consumption will be even greater. Our 1900 population was 76 million and by 1975 it is expected to reach 225 million, placing even heavier burdens on water sup-

Our local water utility manager knows whether his equipment is able to supply enough water for our needs. He also knows whether or not he has the equipment to handle the job in the future. It is important for all of us to find out the facts about our water utility now-so that expansion plans can be started if necessary. The job cannot wait until a crisis has been reachedfor it will be too late.

Tidal Wave of Crime

"There is little chance that the dikes of decency and morality in America can long withstand tidal wave of crime threatening our Nation unless every citizen, just as in flood-menaced communities, is willing to pitch in to help stem the tide.'

The words are those of an outstanding authority on the subject of crime-J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the FBI, He supports his statement with some grim statistics. Serious crime reached its all-time high last year, showing a rise of 12 per cent above 1959. And in the FBI's vast fingerprint files there are, at any one time, some 90,0000 cards which bear small, red tabs. These tabs mean that the owners of the fingerprints are wanted by some law enforcement agency in connection with crimes. In other words, they mean that 90,000 fugitives from justice are walking in our midst.

The law enforcement ranks are thin, and they cannot do the job alone. In Mr. Hoover's words, "A solid front of citizens behind the law enforcement officer who stands face to face with the criminal is the prerequisite for turning back the forces of crime." Defense-whether against enemies without or criminals within-demands the active support of us all.

has been barred since then. For a brief period in 1935-36 sale of 3.2 beer was permitted in Justice Precinct 4, having been authorized by vote of precinct residents. However, a high court ruling later nullified the election and the beer joints closed down.

The prohibition issue has been in the forefront in Haskell County at intervals for al most 75 years.

The first vote on this quesion, so far as county records low, was Aug. 4, 1887, when a prchibition election The vote in Haskell ounty was close-73 for and against prohibition.

The first local option vote is held June 2, 1900, for Preinct 1. when the vote stood 37 for and 160 against prohib-

The second vote, July 9, 1901, was in a county-wide election and was 284 for and 307 against prohibition.

The third election was Sept 1902, and embraced Precincts 3 and 4, when the vote was 346 for and 335 against prohibi tion. This election was contest ed and nullified in court because one of the boundary lines in Precinct 3 had not been cor ectly described.

The fourth county-wide elec ion was held March 25, 1905 and the "drys" won for a sec end time, the vote being 373 for and 143 against prohibition This election was also contest ed in court and declared illegal because at one of the voting oxes the election notice had acked one day being posted the required length of time.

The fifth and final county wide election was held August 21, 1907, and resulted in a vote of 783 for prohibition and 419
