MY POSITION ON THE WATER PROBLEM

In advance of the city election April 5th, I want to make my position clear concerning our city's water problem and the steps that have been taken or proposed to solve this problem.

First, however, I want to state that I am 100 per cent for every progressive movement designed to make Haskell a better town, and to promote its growth. I have always considered it a duty and a privilege to work for and support every feasible civic project that has been advanced in our community in recent years. I can say with pardonable pride that my record in this respect is well known to the citizens of Haskell.

The fact that Haskell is faced with a serious problem in regard to a municipal water supply is well known to all of us. The solution of this problem, its cost to the taxpayers, and its effect on our town's future is of vital concern to every citizen and every taxpayer.

Personally, I think the so-called Miller Creek Project, a \$3,800,000 package, is far too great a debt to assume for a 25,000-acre-foot lake 33 miles from Haskell. Our town's share, about \$1,950,000 would place a tax burden of around \$65,875.00 annually for 40 years on the taxpayers of Haskell. The interest alone would "eat us up!" If you have ever paid interest on a long-term home or business loan you know what I mean!

In my opinion, a more sensible, satisfactory and far less costly solution is virtually at our doorstep. Reliable engineers tell us that for an investment of not more than \$650,000, Haskell can build a pipeline, filtering and pumping plant to provide unlimited water from Lake Stamford, a 60,000-acre-foot lake only 11 or 12 miles away. And I personally know the City of Stamford is agreeable to this.

Best of all, the \$650,000 expenditure could be financed with Revenue Bonds. No tax increase would be required, since no ad valorem tax would be involved-a saving of \$65,875.00 yearly. To me, that looks like a worthwhile saving!

That, briefly, is my stand on the water problem. I favor a \$650,000 investment right here in our own county and no tax bonds, against a \$3,800,000 deal 33 miles away that would require 40-year tax bondsa mortgage on every home and business in Haskell.

Aside from securing adequate water, there will be other civic needs if Haskell is to continue as a progressive, growing city. If we can maintain a sound financial structure, keeping our bonded indebtedness at a sensible level, I believe that other civic programs can be carried out, such as paving, better street lighting, better sidewalks, park improvements or other projects that the people want.

These are the things that I stand for and will work for if you see fit to again honor me by electing the as your Mayer.

On that basis, and on my past record as your Alderman and Mayor. I solicit your vote Tuesday, April 5.





World's first water conservation postage stamp, to be is-sued April 18 in Washington.

D. C., honors rural and urban organizations engaged in small watershed conservation activi-ties, according to J. C. Yeary Jr., Soil Conservation technician, Haskell.

The California Creek and Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservations District are among local groups honored by the issusuance of the stamp. Yeary said.

"The local groups are attacking water problems where they begin on the farm land where water first falls, and along the small creeks and brooks that join to form our major rivers'' Yeary said. Yeary pointed out that vir-

tually every community in the country has a water problem some sort-too much periodic (loods), too little (drouth) too poor (polluted), In Haskell Cunty our main water problem is the lack of sufficient water for community use and farm use.



fee for their license as Texans \$2.15 which permits fishing in either fresh or sait


