

LADY ELK ATHLETES SHINE THIS SPRING AND SUMMER

Three young ladies who competed for the Lady Elks this past year have been recognized their outstanding accomplishments both on the track and in the classroom.

Sophomore Kristen Crabtree was one of fifteen young ladies who was named to the Texas Girls Coaches Association All-State Track Team in 2006 in class A. Kristen was one of three sophomores to be named to the team, and she was the only class a female athlete in the northern part of the Panhandle to receive such an honor. Kristen competed in the 1600m run, an event she won twice and finished second in on



Miss Crabtree finished 1st six times and 2nd twice, running a personal best time of 2:26.17 at regionals to qualify for the state meet. 
