Gruver-Jack H. Weldon, 78 died Sunday, July 16, 2006.

Services were held at 10 a.m. Tuesday, July 18, 2006 in First Baptist Church with the Rev. Scott Curry, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Gruver Cemetery Henson-Novak Funeral Directors of Guymon, OK.

Mr. Weldon was born Aug. 18, 1927, in Stamford. He had a twin brother, Gene, who died in 1980.




