ORDINANCE #070118

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING FEES BY ORDINANCE FOR SOLID WASTE RATES OF THE CITY OF STRATFORD TEXAS.

WHEREAS, the City of Stratford contracts with Rural Waste Management Inc. for the collection and disposal services; and

WHEREAS, the Rural Waste Management Inc. contract provides for an annual increase in relation to the consumer price index (CPI); and

WHEREAS, the City has determined that the cost of operating the Solid Waste Department has increased in the past and the city has not increased the fee increases to the citizens; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to fund the Solid Waste Department on a user fee basis and the current fees collected do not cover the cost of the contracted service; and

WHEREAS, the current rates for the Solid Waste Collection are:

Residential - monthly	\$12.50 - one pick up per week
Commercial - monthly	\$27.50 - one pick up per week
Additional weekly pick ups are calculated at the rates listed for once per week pick up	

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that an increase for the service is necessary to fund the cost for the services provided.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Stratford, Texas, that the following rates are increased, assessed and implemented as listed below:

1. Sanitation Rates shall be as follows:

Residential - monthly	\$14.25 one pick up per week
Commercial - monthly	\$29.25 one pick up per week
Additional weekly pick ups are calculated at the rates listed for once per week pick up	

2. Effective Date for Sanitation Rates

The effective date for these sanitation rates as established by City Council in this Ordinance shall be in effect and shall be added to the water bills mailed on March 10, 2007.

Walk Across Texas Contest Kick off March 22

If Ernest Tubb could waltz across Texas for love, couldn't you and a group of friends walk across the Lone Star state for health?

Walk Across Texas is an eight-week program that will spark some friendly competition in Sherman County. Teams of eight will compete to see who can log the most miles walking, jogging, or even biking. The kickoff for Sherman County will be the first day of spring, March 22, 2007.

Teams will keep track of their miles, which will be posted in the Extension Office and other places around the community, according to Susie Spurlock, Sherman County Extension Agent.

Many people are unaware of positive benefits of exercise. According to the American Heart Association, heart disease is the No. 1 problem in the United States. The risk of heart disease could be significantly reduced by regular exercise.

According to the Texas Department of Health, the positive effects of physical activity are not limited to lowering the risk of heart disease. Not only does regular exercise help relieve stress and anxiety, "physically active people outlive inactive people," a TDH report stated.

"Participating in *Walk Across Texas* is not only a great way to get involved with our community, it's a healthy habit," Spurlock added.

To participate in *Walk Across Texas*, first get a team together. Biking and jogging teams are limited to four people. Choose a team captain and name your team. Fill out a registration form available at the Sherman County Extension Office, located in the Courthouse Annex at 701 N. Third Street.

"The kick off event will be Thursday, March 22nd at 5:45 p.m. at the Courthouse in Stratford. Participants will count miles walked during the time period beginning Sunday, March 25 through Saturday, May 26. Come out and plan to have lots of fun."

Kristi and her husband, Mike Simpson, moved to Dalhart from Wisconsin during this past year. Mike is the COO/Operations Manager at Premier Ag, LLC. Kristi and Mike were foster parents for 17 years and served more than 450 children in their home during that time.

Kristi and Mike's search for a more challenging job lead him to Premier Ag, LLC and Dalhart. One of the couple's desires was to move to a warmer climate. After a visit to Dalhart in March of 2006 and a positive job offer for Mike, it didn't take long for them to decide on the move. The people of Dalhart seemed to be open and friendly, and the weather in March was very warm compared to the frozen winter still blowing in Wisconsin!

Mike and Kristi leave many relatives in Wisconsin, including their two grown and married sons, Trevor and Ted, and four grandchildren. Some relatives have already made the trip to Dalhart and enjoyed the pleasant climate as well as the local points-of-interest. They are both avid hunters and many of their

family members share their passion for the sport.

Kristi owned and operated a large Home and Personal Care agency for 12 years. The volunteers become a voice for these children in the court system, visiting with the children, their families, their teachers, their caregivers, their caseworkers, gathering information that will be valuable in determining the child's best interest.

More volunteers are needed to advocate for these children. CASA volunteers receive 30 hours of initial training and continue with ongoing training throughout the year to help them become well informed and powerful advocates for the children they serve. USDA RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROVIDES FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO RURAL FIRST RESPONDERS

In any emergency, all Texans count on first responders. Law enforcement, fire fighters, EMT and "medical services protect public safety. USDA Rural Development responded to these needs "in 2006 by providing more than \$2.6 million for first responder facilities and equipment for nearly 173,000 rural Texans.

"We work hard to assist rural communities prepare for emergencies and the delivery of lifesaving services," said Bryan Daniel, USDA Rural Development State Director. "Our Community Facility Programs offer loans and grants to rural Texas communities as a part of USDA's First Responder Initiative."

USDA Rural Development has earmarked one-fifth of Community Facility Program funds to first responder projects. Both grants and low-interest loans are available to support the building of facilities and equipment in rural areas. Eligible projects include fire protection equipment, fire stations, fire trucks, rescue and ambulance services and equipment, emergency response training, physician's clinics, early storm warning systems, education facilities for emergency services, police stations and cars, communications centers, and mobile communications centers.

(NU) - A national survey of 1,000 parents found that many don't know key facts regarding potential safety hazards for children.

Among the survey's findings: One in three parents are unaware that children can drown in as little as 2 inches of water. Less than half of parents know falls are the leading cause of unintentional injuries to toddlers. And more than half underestimate how long children should be in a booster seat.

"Particularly in the area of car safety seat usage, parental knowledge tends to decrease as children age," said Dr. Michael Gittelman, an emergency room pediatrician and medical adviser to "Get on Board with Child Safety," a national child injury prevention initiative. "Parents need targeted information about the different unintentional injury risks to children as they grow, from infant stage to toddlers to kids and all the way through adolescence."

Unintentional injuries are the leading cause of death for U.S. children ages 14 and under. "Get on Board with Child Safety" was spearheaded by the children's brand "Safety 1st" and the National Association of Children's Hospitals and Related Institutions. They offer the following tips for parents:

- Use a booster seat for children up to 8 years or 80 pounds. Adult seat belts usually do not fit such children properly unless they are in booster seats. When the belt sits too high in the abdominal and neck areas, it can cause serious injuries in an auto crash. Your child is approximately half as likely to be injured when using a booster seat instead of a seat belt alone.

- Always have your children wear a helmet. Bike injuries send hundreds of thousands of kids ages 5 to 14 to the emergency room each year.

- Supervise the trampoline. Approximately 90,000 kids visit the emergency room each year after a trampoline injury. Trampolines are even more dangerous when multiple kids are jumping at once or when a child does somersaults.

Round II of the Regional Safe Room Program Announced

Feb. 23, 2007 - With the start of the severe weather season in sight, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) today announced the start of the second round application period for the Regional Residential Safe Room Rebate Program. The Safe Room Rebate Program provides approved homeowners with a rebate to partially cover the cost of installing a safe room/tornado shelter in their home. The program is open to residents throughout the Texas Panhandle.

This program is being funded through a Federal Emergency Management Agency grant the PRPC received through the Governor's Division of Emergency Management (GDEM). To be eligible to participate, residents must own the home in which the safe room will be installed. Mobile home owners must own their home and the land on which their mobile home sits. Homeowners can receive a rebate of up to 50% on the cost of installing a shelter in their home. The maximum amount of grant funds paid for a shelter has been capped by the State at \$2,500.

The Safe Room Program is relatively new to the State of Texas. In fact, the program was implemented first in the Texas Panhandle. The PRPC concluded its first round application cycle in November with the funding of 235 shelters. Stefan Bressler, PRPC Regional Program Coordinator, said that all things considered, the program is going

very smoothly. "We've basically served as the test case for the program in Texas", said Bressler. "GDEM has been very accommodating in letting us set up a program to fit our needs in the Panhandle and that has allowed us to run the program with the minimum of red tape".

PRPC will accept Round II applications through April 27, 2007. Residents interested in applying for a rebate will find the application form and guidance on the PRPC's website at www.the.prpc.org. Residents can also obtain rebate information by contacting Stefan Bressler at (806) 372-3381. After the application deadline has passed, the PRPC will select the successful applicants using a modified lottery system. Currently, a certain number of safe rooms are set aside for each county in the region. Applications from the same county will be drawn at random until the allocation for that county has been filled. Any rebate allocations not used in one or more counties will be thrown into a regional pool and used to help meet the excess demand in counties where the requests received is greater than the number of rooms allocated for that county. There will be approximately 550 safe room rebates available under Round II of this regional program.

Power Surges Spell Disaster For Home Electronics

(NU) - Today's home entertainment systems can easily run into the thousands of dollars and often represent the most expensive purchases consumers make other than their homes and vehicles. Yet wide-screen televisions, home theater speakers, DVD recorders, CD players, high-speed cable and satellite TV subscriptions are no longer the domain of the wealthy few.

Officials with World Energy Solutions, an energy services company based in St. Petersburg, Fla., note that homeowners should protect their investment in home entertainment equipment by installing surge protectors - both inside and outside the house.

Today's devices depend on consistent, good-quality power. A single powerful surge can literally melt, weld, pit or even burn completely through circuit boards and render your components worthless.

Most people think of lightning strikes when they think of the potential damage to household equipment from power surges. But other surges can and do occur daily.

The surge can be from voltage fluctuation from the local electric company as it switches lines to handle brownouts or the result of a construction accident that damages utility equipment. Inside the home, other household appliances running on AC current can generate surges. Your equipment can even be vulnerable from the electrical "noise" generated from light dimmers, electrical razors and blenders.

Plug-in surge units are a start,

and consumers should look for UL-approved devices that offer a lifetime replacement of the surge units and limit the power of your equipment to a peak of about 330 volts in case of a surge. Cheaper models are often little more than fancy extension cords.

Many consumers stop there, forgetting that their home entertainment system is typically connected to telephone and cable lines as well as electrical outlets. These ancillary lines need their own surge suppressors.

For best protection, consumers should begin outside the house with surge arrestors at the electric meter and inside with surge suppressors at the circuit breaker panel. Such systems should be installed by qualified electrical contractors and as part of a total surge protection package.

Tips for Emergency Winter Driving Situations

(NU) - Severe winter weather can make driving a challenge for even the most experienced motorists.

Extreme cold temperatures make vehicles more likely to break down if proper maintenance has not been performed. Heavy snowfalls and icy road conditions can lead to vehicles sliding off the road and becoming stuck in the snow.

"Prevention is key to avoiding vehicle breakdowns," said John Nielsen, director of AAA's Approved Auto Repair Program. Drivers should have a certified technician inspect their vehicles, including the ignition system, antifreeze, lights, heater, windshield wipers and washer fluid.

Should motorists find themselves stranded in the snow with no help in sight, AAA cautions drivers not to needlessly spin the tires; this only digs the vehicle deeper into the snow. To properly free your vehicle, AAA experts suggest the following:

- 1) Clear away as much snow as possible from around the tires, under the vehicle and near the vehicle exhaust pipe.
- 2) Improve traction by scattering sand around the front tires for front-wheel drive cars, and around the rear tires for rear-wheel drive cars. Vehicle floor mats may work in a pinch.
- 3) Place the car in low gear (automatic transmissions) or second gear (manual transmissions) and gently press the

accelerator. Ease off if the tires begin to spin.

4) If still unable to free the vehicle, try slowly rocking the car. Ease forward with the car in low gear (automatic transmissions) or second gear (manual transmissions). When the car will no longer go forward, release the accelerator to allow the car to roll back.

5) When the vehicle stops its backward motion, apply minimum pressure to the accelerator again. Repeat these actions in rapid succession until the vehicle rolls free.

6) If others are available to help, have them push to assist the car's rocking motion. People pushing the vehicle should not stand directly behind the wheels because of the risks of flying gravel, sand and ice.

7) If you are unable to free your vehicle, set up reflectors, flares or other signal devices to alert passing motorists.

8) If you stay in your car, tie a bright cloth to your antenna to alert rescuers. If you run the engine for warmth, make sure snow does not block the exhaust pipe, which could cause dangerous fumes to back up inside the car.

9) If you can leave your vehicle and reach shelter safely, contact your local AAA auto club for assistance. AAA members can request roadside assistance by contacting their club or visiting www.AAA.com online.
