Raising Kidney Transplant Awareness

(NAPS)-Kidney failure is the most common reason for a kidney transplant. Blacks are at a greater risk for end-stage kidney disease because of higher-than-average rates of diabetes, high blood pressure and other immunologic factors. Transplants from living donors have considerable advantages over transplants from nonliving donors. A kidney from a living donor will usually function immediately and may last longer. By comparison, some nonliving donor kidneys do not function right away, and the patient may need dialysis until the kidney starts to function. Treatments

If you receive a kidney transplant, your body knows that the new kidney is not an original part of your body. Your body will attack the new kidney and try to damage or destroy it. Almost everyone who has a transplant must take drugs called immunosuppressants every day to stop this from happening. Immunosuppressant drugs lower your body's ability to attack or 'reject" your newly transplanted kidney. Regular checkups at your transplant center will help to spot any problems and start treatment before a problem gets worse. The good news is that treatments have come a long way.
