

Stamford Council Indicates 10 Cents

City of Haskell at least 10 cents per 1,000 gallons at the lake, with the Stamford City Council in that city last Friday.

The price of 10 cents per 1,000 gallons was only an estimate, Stamford Mayor Roland Kelley emphasized, and it was pointed out that some towns are paying as much as 20 cents per 1,000 gallons to other lakes

and reservoirs. The special meeting of the Stamford Council was held at

the request of Haskell Mayor J. E. Walling and his Council members, and all Aldermen, along with City Secretary T. J. Arbuckle, were in attendance Mayor Walling, explaining

his request for the meeting. told the Stamford Council his group was interested in exploring the possibility of securing water from Lake Stamford, its cost, and length of contract involved.

He stated that Haskell was now in the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority but that a bill was pending in the Legislature which, if pass-ed, would permit Haskell or other towns to withdraw from

the Authority. Mayor Kelley, at the outset of the discussion, said he first wanted to clarify the position of the Stamford Council, since he had noted newspaper stories concerning the water con-

troversy in Haskell. We are not taking any sides in this matter, to us you are only a potential water customer. If you get your prob-lems ironed out then we will be glad to go into it, but it will

take a lot of engineering to determine the cost of water," he declared. Discussing Haskell's re quirements, it was brought out that the city uses from 300,000

Mayor Walling also mention ed that Rule might come in on the Haskell contract. However



A Fable? Here's Story of a Rugged Individual

(The following appeared in The Fort Worth Press, reprinted

from the Sonoma County, Calif., Medical Society Bulletin,) A young man lived with his parents in a public housing development. He attended a public school, rode the free school bus and participated in the free lunch program. He entered the Army and upon discharge kept his national service life insurance. He then enrolled in the state university under the GI Bill. working part time for the state to supplement his GI check.

Upon graduation he married a public health nurse and bought a farm with an FHA loan, then obtained an RFC loan to go into business. A baby was born in the county hospital. He bought a ranch with the aid of a GI loan and obtained emergency feed from the government.

Later he put part of his land in the soil bank and the payments helped pay off his debts. His parents lived comfortably on the ranch with their Social Security and old-age assistance

The County Agent showed him how to terrace it, then the government paid part of the cost of a pond and stocked it with fish. The government guaranteed him a sale for his farm prod-

Books from the public library were delivered to his door He banked money which a government agency insured. He signed a petition seeking federal assistance in develop

ing an industrial project to help the economy of his area. He was a leader in obtaining the new federal building, and went to Washington with a group to ask Congress to build a great dam costing millions so that the area could get cheap electricity.

Then, one day, he wrote his congressman a letter of protest "I wish to protest excessive government spending and high taxes. I believe in rugged individualism, I think people should stand on their own two feet without expecting handouts. I am opposed to all socialistic trends."

The Real Danger—Within

After nearly 200 years, we still enjoy the blessings of living in a nation and land that was established on respect for the Christian principles that made it. Are we preserving these same great principles for future generations?

We abound with conveniences and the material wealth of our capitalistic society. Can we continue on the road of material growth as we now travel, leaving the values of moral and spiritual growth lagging behind?

We talk more about security than faith . We speak more of luck than God's blessings. We, like larger cities, slip more and more into a complacency and indifference at the moral crumblings about us. So much more concerned are we about last year's bills and next year's taxes than this year's new Christians and next year's opportunity for service.

In the small towns like ours lies the hope of preserving the very existence of a democratic way of life. Yet, this way of life was not begun or nurtured on ease, indifference, or complacency as we often see. What would forefathers like Patrick Henry think tive in this instance as it was they could see us struggling against some social ill but in selling pigs for him. too afraid of criticism to express concern?

We work that our children might have much of the material things of life. In the end, though, what good are these alone? Is not a great reward of living the satisfaction of having attained the material needs of life through one's OWN efforts?

The greatest danger at the roots of democracy is not communism. It is the pre-occupied, social-centered, broad-minded citizen of towns like ours who is so busy with his or her many duties that there is no time for prayer, for instilling Christian taith, for teaching kindness, for Rible study, for upholding high moral standards of practice, and for worshiping God with the children of tomorrow

Communism has little need to worry that she can over rule cur nation, when its foundations crumble away like grains of smitting sand. Do we fight harder at getting water in than keeping liquor out, work longer at money-making than helping others. and spend more time at so-called 'recreations' than glorifying
