Saint Patrick's Day 1984

Saturday's Saint Patrick's Day, but it is more than leprechauns, shamrocks and the wearing of green. It's the day the Irish celebrate and renew their national heritage.

To study St. Patrick's history is to study the history of Ireland itself. To many Irish nationals, the saint is Ireland. He brought Catholicism to Ireland's shores. This religion soon became the cornerstone of the Irish way of life.

St. Patrick was not born a true Irishman, according to historians. They feel, in reality, he was probably born somewhere in southwestern Great Britain around 385 A.D.

Historical records indicate that early in his life he spent six years in Ireland as a slave. He escaped to France where he was introduced to and studied the Catholic religion.

In his diary, not long after his acceptance into the Catholic faith, St. Patrick wrote of a vision he'd had. A dream that the whole of Ireland, in one great voice, called him to return and instruct them in the "true faith."

Accepting his mission, he readied for it by being ordained, getting Pope Celestine I's permission, and by becoming a bishop in the church. He set out on the return trip in 432.

What happened in the 30 years after his arrival, according to historical records, was exceptional. In

that time, he almost singlehandedly converted an entire nation to Catholicism. This gave them not only a religion, but an orderly and well-balanced society where none existed before.

Much of what is known about St. Patrick is shrouded in legend. Three of the feats he is noted for happened at Croagh Patrick. It is more commonly known as St. Patrick's Rock today.

It was here, during his teaching, that he first used the shamrock to demonstrate the Trinity; God, the Son and Holy Ghost.

He also carried on his 40-day fast at Croagh Patrick. St. Patrick wrote that during this fast an angel appeared to him and granted him a special request. The request that on the final judgement day, when the Lord sits in judgement over mankind, St. Patrick would inturn judge the Irish nation.

The drumming of the serpents from Ireland, the third and perhaps most famous legend, was used to demonstrate the strength of God to the Druids, (pre-Christian religious order of priests among the ancient Celts of Gaul, Britain and Ireland).

To this day many Irish still make the pilgrimage to the top of Croagh Patrick to worship at a small chapel dedicated to St. Patrick.

When he died in 461, he left a rich mixture of truth and legend that has been kept alive since that period. He also left a deep sense of national identity.

Before his arrival, Ireland consisted of small

clans, no organized government and little written history.

Upon his arrival, the country became unified and entered a great period of development in the arts — much of it religious.

The Irish venerate and celebrate St. Patrick's memory in many ways. The celebration of St. Patrick's Day as we know it was not one of them.

The celebration as known today traces back to the charitable society in Boston in 1737. In 1780, the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick of Philadelphia organization joined in the fun. Four years later, the now famous New York St. Patty's Day Parade was introduced. This was the first reported American ethnic holiday.

The New England area, with its craggy rock mountains and boulder-strewn coastline, became a home to many Irish people. The landscape of the area resembled Ireland in many ways.

New England also provided an ideal area for many early settlers' to pursue their livelihoods: raising sheep, potatoes and fishing.

On the crown of Croagh Patrick stands the figure of St. Patrick. It almost seems alive when draped in the rays of sunset's fire. That figure stands as a reminder that as long as there is a story to tell or a song to sing, there will be an Ireland. And as long as there is an Irishman, there will be a St. Patrick's Day.

CARE Line

The CARE Line is prepared by Col. John R. Hullender, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, on a weekly basis. All information provided to the CARE Line will be held in strict confidence. Callers are urged to give their name and duty telephone number so that a personal reply may be made; however, neither are mandatory. Callers should use the CARE Line only after all possible means to air their views or complaints through the chain of command have been exhausted. The CARE Line number is 885- (Ext.) 3273.



A concerned parent asked why a doctor was not immediately available to see his sick child in the emergency room. The physician was away from the hospital at the time the youngster was brought in.

The medical officer of the day serves in the emergency room from 4:45 p.m. until 8 a.m. the following day. This shift follows his regular clinic duty, 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Since the physician must be on duty for 24 hours, he is permitted to visit base facilities as long as he is readily accessible by two-way radio or pager and the hospital control center is notified of his location. In the event of an emergency, as in this case, the physician is called and immediately returns to the hospital. Patients who have complaints or questions about hospital care may direct their inquiries to Bob Gregorio of the Patient Affairs Office, Ext. 3521.

Misplaced medical records were the concern of a caller who said his child's records were mistakenly turned over to an individual who was out-processing for a PCS assignment.

We regret the error. All personnel in the records section of the hospital have been counseled to be more attentive when issuing records.

A caller complained about one of the receptionists at the CBPO Customer Service counter being rude to customers.

We appreciate the situation being brought to our attention because we need to hear about the "bad" service we provide as well as the good service. Most of the comments we get about personnel in Customer Service are complimentary. However, the individual in this instance has been thoroughly counseled on providing quality customer service.

The CBPO averages more than 125 visitors per day—active duty, retired, dependents—from all services. These hard working folks strive to provide the best service possible. However, with the demanding workload, times become hectic, and in some cases, trying. We have recently made some internal changes of personnel in an attempt to better serve our customers and preclude this type of incident.

A customer at the Talon Inn called to say he and his family were subjected to a shouting match between two employees at the facility.

We sincerely apologize for the poor behaviour of these two employees. Both individuals have been privately counseled. Again, we regret the inconvenience to you, your family, and the other patrons.

The folks at the base laundry put the rush on repairing a pair of pants for a young airman who in turn called CARE Line to point out their cooperation. The customer said it was an emergency, and he realized that the laundry wasn't required to give such quick service, but they did.

I add my compliments to those of the airman and pass them along to Nell Vick and her staff.

A caller from the organizational maintenance squadron's India Flight called to thank civil engineering for their assistance in making improvements in the flight shack. The paint and wood shops were particularly helpful in giving the shack a face-lift prior to the recent Daedalian Award selection team visit.

Teamwork is what makes Reese special and the caller pointed out evidence of it at work.

CARE Line is one way we take care of Reese people by opening the communications lines. The Air Force Assistance Fund is another way we can all show we care through sharing.

The fund helps finance retirement homes for both enlisted and officer personnel and their families, educational assistance, and emergency financial aid to Air Force active duty people. Last year the Air Force Aid Society provided almost \$60,000 to Reese people in the form of interest free loans or grants.

I urge each of you to take the opportunity to show you care by contributing to this worthy fund.

Why we're here — things we defend

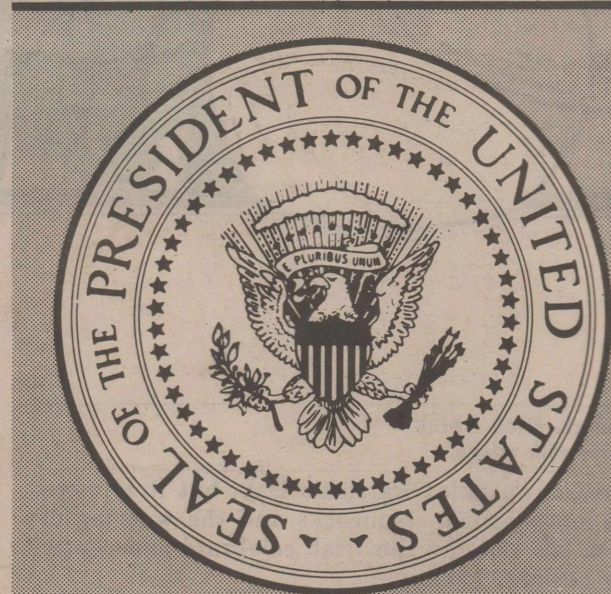
(AFSINC)—During his recent State of the Union Address President Ronald Reagan said that a lasting and meaningful peace is our highest aspiration.

The Apostle Paul spoke for all our fallen comrades when he said, "I fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith."

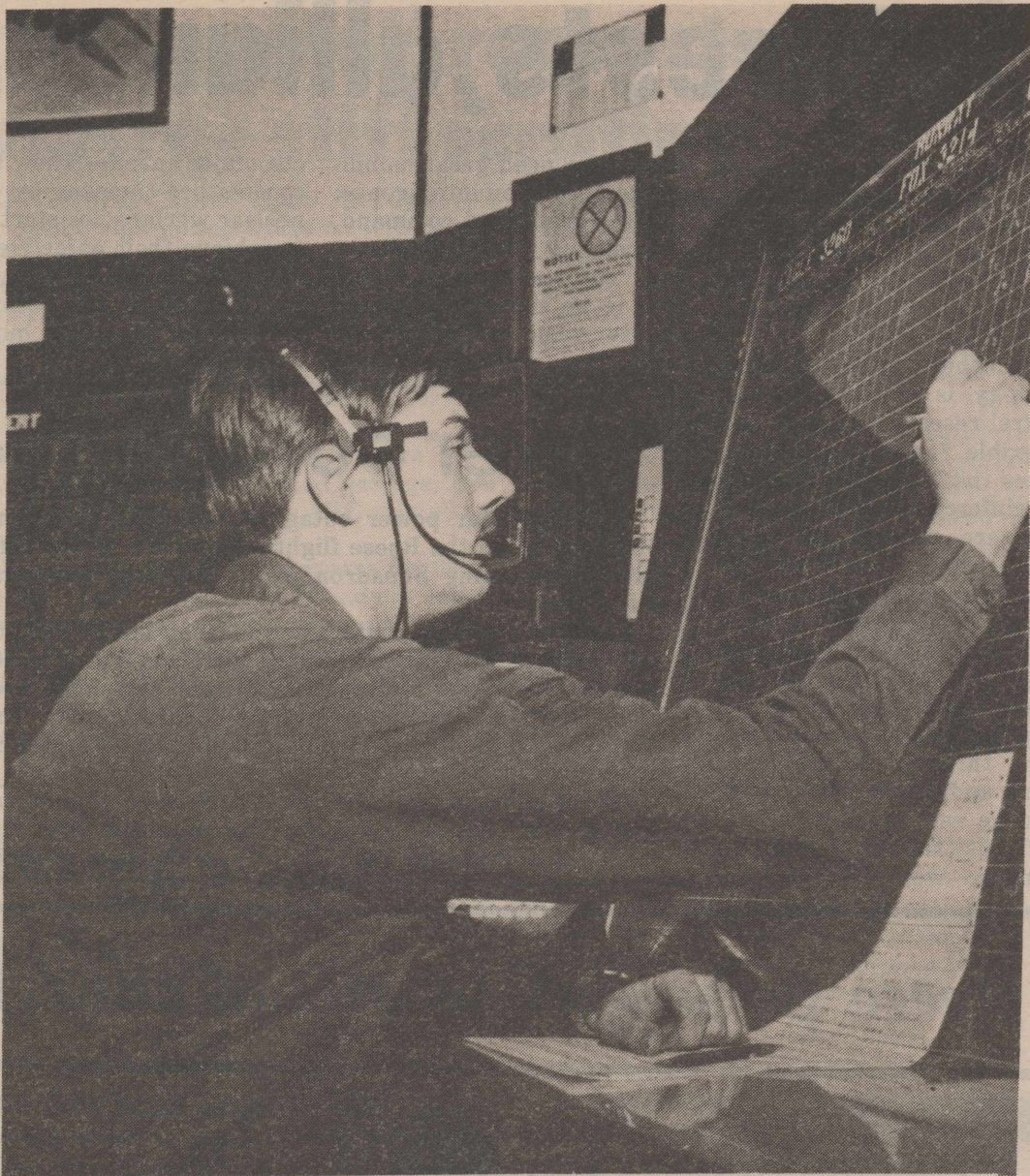
Patriotism is keeping the faith with the brave Americans who have gone before us. Their sacrifices shall not have been in vain and freedom shall not perish from the earth.

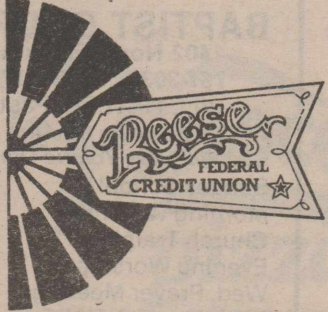

U.S. has global interests, alliances

(AFSINC)—“Are we spending correctly what we are spending?” This question was asked early this year by the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, U.S. Army Gen. John W. Vessey Jr., when he addressed the members of the Young President's Organization in Keystone, Colo.

The general continued, “Now, as you think about that question, just let me review briefly what our strategy is. Our strategy is defensive. And it's a global strategy that says our interests are global, our economic interests are global and our security interests are global.

“There are certain elements to our strategy that are very important. First are alliances. And, we have forces deployed in a number of places in the world in connection

with those alliances. And those forces do two things—first, they let our allies know that we're going to contribute military strength for our allies—they help our collective efforts to prevent war. And, they also contribute to the political cohesiveness of those alliances by letting our allies know that we're with them, even if fighting begins.

“We are blessed with good allies—not like Russia which, as I often say, is the only communist nation in the world surrounded by hostile communist neighbors. Our allies are our allies for a number of reasons. We are bound by common cultural, economic and political interests. But, they're also our allies because they have confidence in the constancy of our commitment

and our ability to make good on those commitments. If we look like we are wavering in our resolve or if they are going to be on the losing side, they won't want to be our allies anymore.

“Another part of that strategy is a rapid-reacting central reserve of forces. It's a flexible, responsive reserve forces that's capable of going to reinforce those alliances if they are needed, or going other places where our interests are threatened—there's the case of Grenada, a very small island in the Caribbean, but nevertheless one where the leadership of this country thought our interests were threatened. We went there, and we did what had to be done very quickly.

“To use that force in such a manner, we need several

things: we need great mobility; we need good intelligence; and we need good command, control and communications. And, we need control of the seas to be successful. Above all else, we need our strategic nuclear umbrella that lets

our major enemies know they can neither threaten us with nuclear warfare nor start one to achieve their objectives. If we do all that, I believe that we can guarantee our security, not only for ourselves, but for our posterity.”

Power outage due

An eight hour power outage is scheduled for some buildings along the Reese flightline Sunday, as the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron works on those electrical feeder lines.

The power will go off at 8 a.m. and be off until 4 p.m. for the buildings between Hangerline Road and Apron Road, east and west, and between the officers' swimming pool and the 1958th Communications Squadron, north and south. The dormitories and wing dining hall will not be affected.

CES is going to place the consolidated aircraft support system and the control tower on separate electrical feeder systems. They are presently on the same feeder.

Express Mail requests undergo stiff scrutiny

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (ATCNS)—If your office puts gilded wings on letters and parcels at the drop of a suspense, beware. Base admin folks are under orders to shoot down requests for Express Mail which aren't mission essential.

Express Mail is the most expensive class of mail offered by the U.S. Postal Service. Minimum cost is \$9.35 per small packet.

In fiscal 1983, command members used \$31,000 worth of Express Mail postage. Use has gone up every year since ATC started using it in 1976.

There are good and bad reasons for using Express Mail. A recent ATC admin letter cited the two most common abuses:

- *Don't use Express Mail just to meet an administrative suspense. Ask for an extension.
- *Don't use Express Mail just because an item is addressed to higher headquarters.

However, Express Mail can support the mission, save lives and even save money when ATC members use it properly. For instance, letting a million-dollar aircraft sit broken on the ramp for even one extra day is costly. Aircraft maintainers often use Express Mail to ship small parts as soon as they become available.

Likewise, a base doctor, with approval for higher headquarters, may ship perishable specimens to a lab via Express Mail. These are examples where delivery speed is absolutely necessary to meet the mission requirements.

If your office has a special need, the best person to call is MSgt. Tom Brown at Ext. 3437. They not only can help you determine if Express Mail is warranted, but offer other types of speedy delivery, such as first class mail, parcel services, messages and datafax.

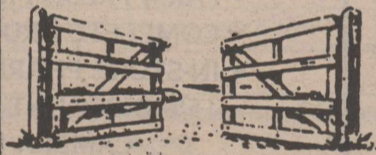



Most Soviet men move out, not up

In many respects the Soviet Armed Forces use a rank structure that is more rigid than that of their Tsarist predecessors. In the early days of the Red Army, all rank distinctions were abolished. But as the new Soviet state grew, military distinctions were reestablished. By World War II, a strict order of rank was in place. The term "Soviet Army" includes the Strategic Missile Forces, Ground Forces, Air Defense Forces and the Air Force. The Navy has two sets

of ranks: those assigned to sea duty and those permanently assigned to shore duty. Shore duty ranks are identical to those of the Soviet Army.

About four percent of the servicemen choose to stay in the service. A career man becomes a junior sergeant and it's not unusual to make master sergeant in the first two years of career service.

To improve retention, the Ministry of Defense established the rank of *praporshchik* for the Army and *michman*

for the Navy. They are equivalent to the U.S. warrant officer.

The servicemen who decide to make a career of the armed forces can sign up for two, four, or six years. Once they do, they are accorded a new status. They are given better food and quarters and become eligible for career service pay (a new junior sergeant draws about \$100 a month). Career men get 30 days of leave a year.

A *praporshchik* can get commissioned as a junior lieutenant after five years of honorable service in that grade if he can pass the necessary academic and professional tests. A commission as a junior lieutenant is awarded automatically to anyone having served 10 years as a *praporshchik*.

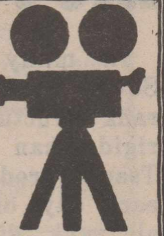

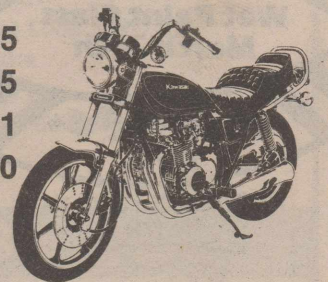

Ready to meet the challenge

Six miles from the nearest highway, across a stretch of rugged West Texas terrain, an Air Force vehicle is serving as a mobile command post to coordinate the ac-

tivities at an aircraft crash site.

How did this six passenger pickup, with cab-over camper, navigate the harsh surroundings to get to the crash area? Well, for one thing, it's not your everyday basic pickup truck.

For a long time, members of the

Reese Disaster Preparedness Division felt that their ability to respond to a crash or other emergency in "unfavorable" terrain was impaired by the limitations of their mobile command post, a conventional six passenger pickup truck. The division's primary responsibility is to

respond to emergencies wherever they occur (and in West Texas, "wherever" can be most "anywhere"), the need for a sturdy off-the-road vehicle was evident.

The decision to convert Reese's mobile command post into an off-the-road vehicle was made when the

division received a new Ford F-350, one-ton, four-wheel drive, six passenger pickup truck. The transformation began with the addition of ten-and-one-half inch all terrain tires on heavy-duty rims, heavy-duty shocks and steering stabilizers, high-intensity driving lights, brush guards and spotlights mounted on the door frames.

In addition to these and other modifications, extensive communications gear was installed. Included in the Reese mobile command post are a series of radios, including links to the base's fire-crash and taxi networks, a Texas Department of Public Safety radio for use in coordination with local highway patrol vehicles, and a mobile telephone for use if the mobile command post is out of radio range of other systems.

The vehicle is also equipped with radios to communicate with aircraft involved in search operations. For example, if units of the Civil Air Patrol are involved in search and rescue operations, an FM radio is available to keep in contact with both CAP air and ground units. A standard Air Force UHF radio is also available in the camper to communicate with aircraft from Reese and other bases.

To power all this equipment without exhausting the truck engine, a 5,000 kilowatt portable generator was added for continuous electrical power. To help alleviate the heat produced by this equipment, the vehicle has a camper-mounted air conditioner and fan to allow for constant cooling and ventilation.

In short, the Reese mobile command post has been outfitted to respond to emergencies in all, but the most inhospitable of West Texas terrain. And when your job is to help save lives, an off-road vehicle is worth its weight in gold.

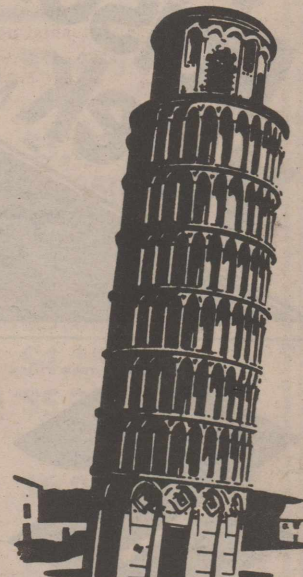

Election year 1984

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—Eligible Air Force military and civilian members are encouraged by officials of the Federal Voting Assistance program office to vote in state and presidential primary elections and caucuses which began Feb. 28.

Caucuses are conducted in political parties to select delegates to the national conventions where presidential candidates are chosen. Primaries allow voters to choose a party candidate or to select delegates to the national conventions.

Absentee voting procedures and dates differ from state to state. Therefore, voting officials advise military members to contact a unit or base voting officer for specific information.

The following are unit voting officers: Capt. Carolyn Moore, Air Base Group, 3377; 2nd Lt. Ginger Cook, Field Maintenance Squadron, 3716; 1st Lt. Janis Rizzo, Hospital, 3625; 1st Lt. 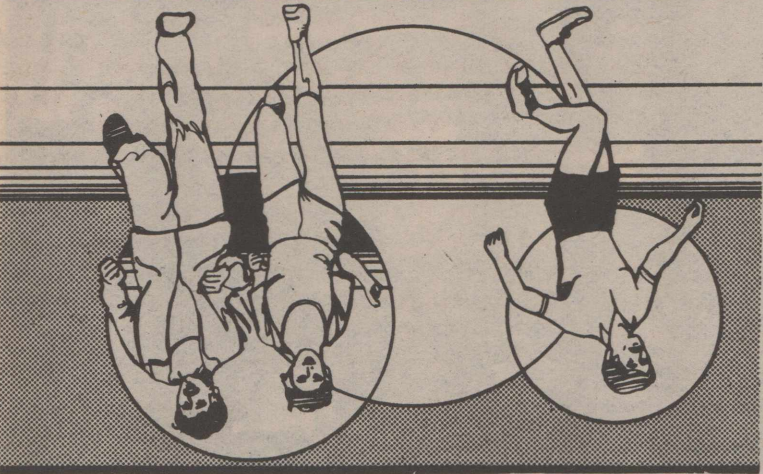

Age is no excuse for fat



None of this has to happen. A regular and vigorous aerobic exercise program can slow the metabolism reduction to one percent over the entire 30-year period. A program including a consistent, nutritional diet and consistent exercise will reduce this nation's number one killer, heart disease, up to 75 percent. As America grows older, dietary habits remain the same in spite of a less active lifestyle. Those individuals who have been brought up from childhood to 'clean their plates' have a difficult time rejecting overabundant portions of food. For example, it is not unusual to find restaurants and homemakers who serve 12 to 16 ounces of meat per meal. This is far beyond the four ounces of meat recommended by the Human Nutrition Department of Agriculture. The problem arises in the misconception that meat does not cause weight gain because it is a high protein food. Meat contains both protein and fat. There are four calories per gram of protein and nine calories per gram of fat. That adds up to between 1,000 to 4,000 calories per 12-ounce steak. This would represent well over half of the recommended calorie intake per day for most Americans. Calorie intake is the key to weight control. It's very easy to determine the required number of calories to maintain an individual's present weight. Simply multiply your weight by 15 and this will provide a close figure in measuring the number of calories needed to stay at your current weight. Any excess calories are stored as fat (Courtesy U.S. Army Health Services Command).

The impression among Americans today is that as they get older, they naturally get fatter. There is no reason for the increase in weight with each change of the calendar. After age 25, when growth has ceased, any accumulated weight without exercise is likely to be fat. At the same age, an individual's metabolism begins to slow down by one-half percent per year which significantly increases the probability that additional fat will develop. The average American gains 15 to 30 pounds from age 25 to 55 and this excess weight can lead to heart disease, high blood pressure and diabetes.

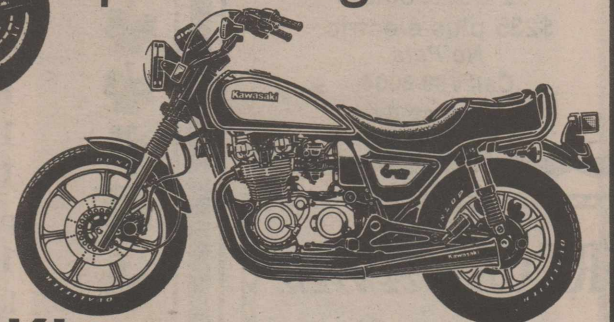
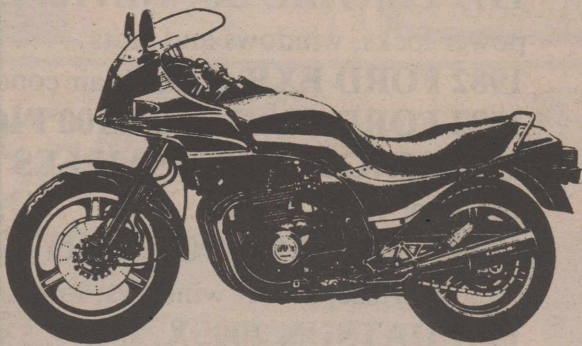

ATC fuel usage drops

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (ATCNS) — Enough miles were driven in Air Training Command vehicles last year to make 53 round trips to the moon. The cost of vehicle fuel for those miles, both in quantity and dollars, is staggering; just over 3 million gallons of fuel cost \$3.7 million.

Both the cost and relative shortage of energy has caused the Department of Defense to take a tough stand on energy conservation. An all out DOD effort to conserve energy has

been in effect since 1975.

ATC used about 17 percent less vehicle fuel in fiscal 1983 as compared to the baseline year, fiscal 1975. The DOD-wide goal is to reduce vehicle fuel consumption 15 percent by fiscal 1985 and 20 percent by fiscal 1990, as compared to the baseline year.

The Air Force surpassed the 1985 goal a couple of years ago, and is now working hard to "hold the line" on fuel consumption at it's 1980 level. ATC used 3.1 million gallons

of fuel that year.

The command dropped well below that "line" last year by using nearly 98,000 gallons less than in 1980. This amounted to a savings of \$122,087 and is enough fuel to run all the vehicles at Goodfellow AFB, Texas, for more than two years.

This feat is even more amazing when you consider that ATC vehicles were driven nearly 2 million miles more than last year than in 1980. This includes all the

taxis, buses, snow plows, staff cars, street sweepers, refueling trucks, security police cars, fire engines, recruiters' cars, and others which make up the command's fleet of 6,340 vehicles.

The command should be able to reach the 20 percent fiscal 1990 goal according to Capt. Clare L. Conley, ATC's chief of energy conservation. "We've got nearly everyone thinking *save*," she said, "and with all the new energy efficient vehicles we're buying,

we'll make it."

ATC is replacing many of its older vehicles with "energy savers." Currently, all buses, truck tractors, and forklifts being purchased are diesel powered. Diesel pickup trucks are also on the command's shopping list.

The Air Force has bought compact sedans, station wagons and pickup trucks to replace bigger models. They are also replacing some of their 28-passenger busses with 15-passenger vans.

President calls March Red Cross Month

WASHINGTON, D.C.— Declaring the American Red cross to be in the forefront of efforts to provide for the well being of the American people, President Ronald Reagan has proclaimed March as Red Cross Month.

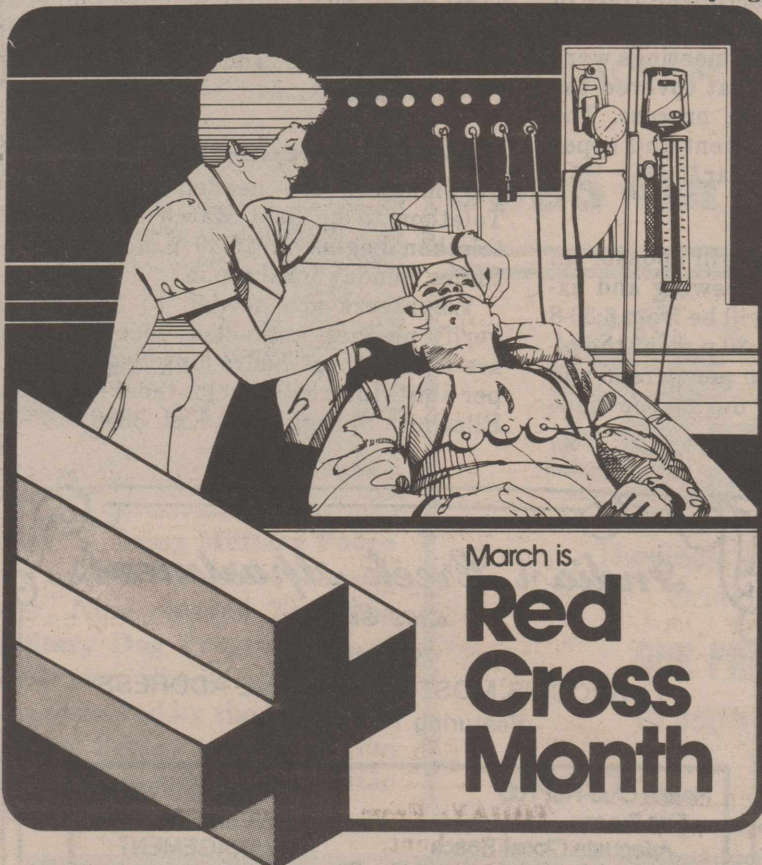
In a White House signing ceremony, the President said Red Cross volunteers and staff had "brought needed relief to hundreds of thousands of our fellow citizens who suffered in disasters and spent a record-breaking amount for disaster assistance and preparedness."

The proclamation noted the pioneering work of the Red

Cross in voluntary blood donations, work with the military and American youth.

"It is the good will of all of us that perpetuates Red Cross efforts and provides such an inspiring example of what the private sector is capable of doing," he stated. He urged "all Americans to generously support the work of the Red Cross through donations and volunteer work."

At the same time, President Reagan issued a memorandum to heads of executive departments and agencies, urging all federal workers and armed forces members to support the Red Cross.

Units keep record intact

Four base units topped off 1983 with perfect pass rates for career development course final exams.

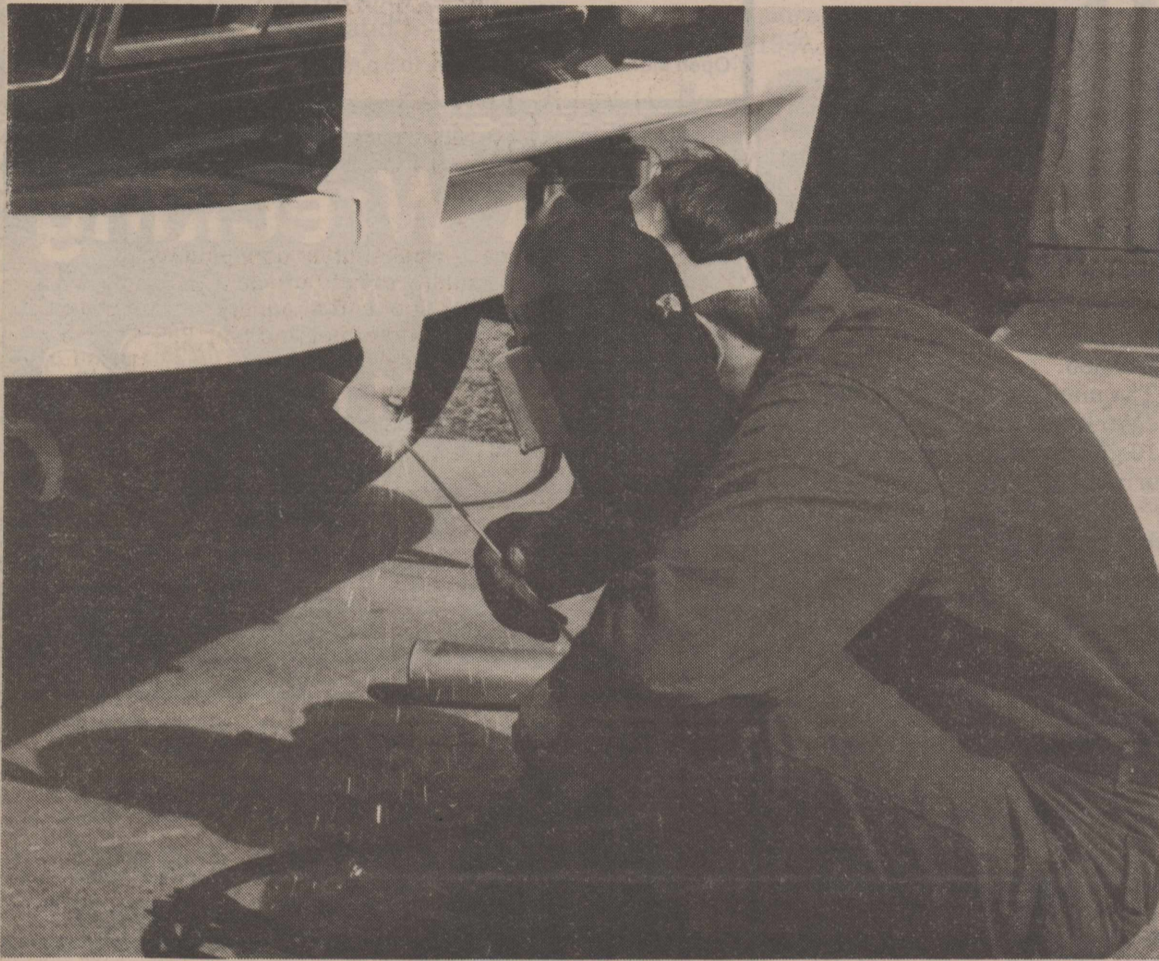
