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

The Legislature is to re-convene July 10 to make a fresh stab at writing a tax bill to raise some \$350,000,000 for the next two years, Gov. Price Daniel has urged Texans to give the legislators and him their views on how the matter should be handled.

Governor Daniel is strongly opposed to the adoption of any sales tax plan designed to raise the major portion of this needed revenue. He used his influence in the regular session to block a move in this direction.

"But," said the governor, "if this is really what a majority if the people want, I don't see how I can go on fighting it.

He believes, however, that a very limited sales tax, which a terms "selective excise taxes," on only more expensive items, ith the balance to be raised from gas pipeline taxes and inreased interstate corporation franchise taxes, would be more iir and acceptable to most Texans,

In a "Report to the People" over television and radio last eek, Governor Daniel said:

"I hope you will talk with your representatives and Senators during the next 40 days. If you agree with me that the gas pip :line companies should pay at least the same 2% tax that they want Texas consumers to pay, and that our interstate and foreign corporations ought to pay on a basis comparable to our own domestic companies, and that any sales tax ought to be collected on whiskey, beer and other alcoholic beverages the same as on other products, I hope you will tell your members of the Legisalture about how you feel.

"By the same token, if you disagree with me and think Pexas should continue to get less than half of the taxes that Louisiana collects on natural gas and that the big interstate corporations should continue to pay on a cheaper allocation than domestic corporations, and that clothes should be taxed while beer and whiskey are exempt, then I think you should tell your State Senators and Representatives about that, too.

Gov. Daniel also told his radio and TV audience that he blamed the failure to enact a suitable tax compromise, not on the Legislature, but upon the lobbyists for special interests who continuously harassed the Legislature and opposed all efforts

Now, it is the people's turn to say what they think. If enough speak up, the Legislature will have little difficulty in deciding what to do when it re-convenes July 10.
