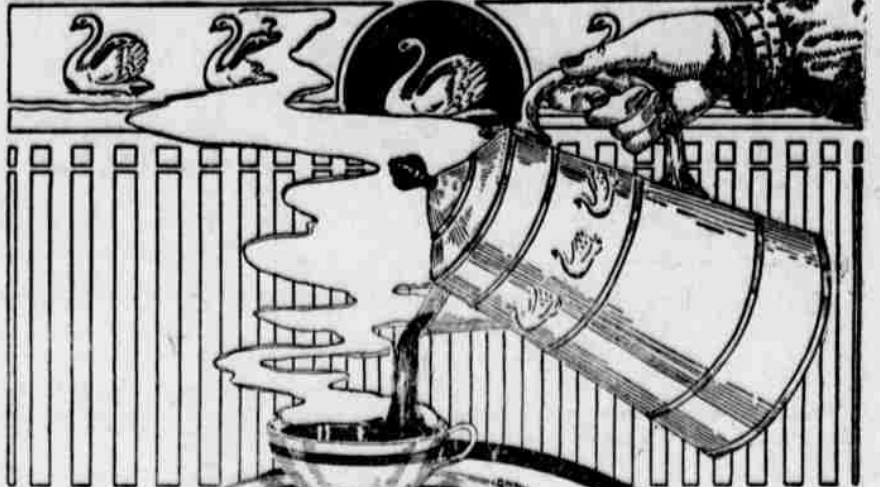

Do your Christmas shopping
early.

Those who expect to give their
loved ones and friends Christmas
presents should do so early and
avoid the usual rush just before
Christmas.

Of all human agencies the one
that has done the most for civili-
zation has been the building of
public highways. Good roads
abridge distance and shorten
time.

Texas is a good place to do
business in. Here every social
advantage can be enjoyed. Merit,
brains and energy reap the pecu-
niary reward to which they are
entitled.

Get your Christmas presents
early and lay them aside so you
you may not be rushed at Christ-
mas time. In this way you get
a chance for better selection and
also relieve the strain upon the
over-worked clerks.

A dollar spent in patronizing
home industries will eventually
come back to the spender. But
the dollar that is sent away from
home is given such a solar plexus
blow that it can't "come back."

The rain this week is of incal-
culable value in this section.
Over three inches of rain has
fallen and it came in a slow, gen-
tle down-pour, the earth swal-
lowing every drop as it fell. The

ground is wet at least fifteen or
twenty inches in depth. A few
more such seasons and this
country is sure for a bountiful
crop next year as far as mois-
ture is concerned. A good bot-
tom season in the winter with a
few surface rains at the proper
time in the spring and summer
guarantees this county a good
yield in all of the crops that can
be grown here. Verily, the in-
dications point to a good time
for west Texas in the year of our
Lord 1912.

The farmer should remember
that the building of good roads
adds to the cash value of his
farm more than twice as much
and sometimes five times as
much as the tax he will be called
upon to pay to help build them.

The boosting and the building
of a city should go hand in hand.
If the booster can show the
building to back up his boosting,
the desired end is attained and
effective advertisement of the city
(which is the object of boosting)
is accomplished.

What is considered one of the
largest yields of peanuts per
acre in this section has just been
reported at Baird, Sam Strahan,
of near Cottonwood, has threshed
1900 bushels of peanuts and
made 519 bales of hay from forty
acre of land. Mr. Strahan has
refused seventy cents per bush-
els for the nuts. Figuring the
crop on a basis of seventy cents
for the nuts and forty cents for
the hay, the total gross value of
the yield from the forty acres is
\$1537.50.

Texas again sets the pace for
plans for a state's advancement.
This time it is the Welfare Com-
mission. Towns and cities have
heretofore undertaken develop-
ment along systematic lines, but
never before has the movement
been statewide. Texans have
shown their ability to rise above
mere community levels by the
organization of the Texas Wel-
fare Commission. This commis-
sion will have for its aim the in-
dustrial and commercial uplift
of the entire state, and in this is
unique. There is no other state
in the Union that has any such
organization.

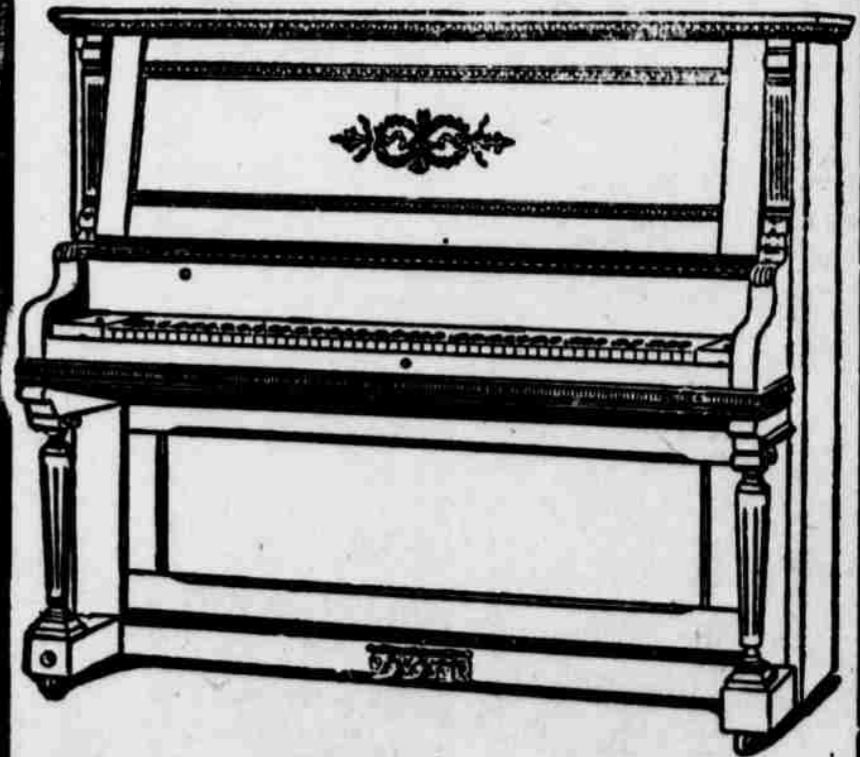

AROUND THE COURT HOUSE

Commissioners' Court.

Commissioners Court convened Monday, with Judge Smith presiding, County Clerk Meadors present and Commissioners Whitman, Fairis, Davis and Sollock in attendance. The monthly reports of W. J. Fairis, J. P. of Precinct No. 2, and A. J. Smith, county judge, were approved.

It was the order of the court that the county attorney be authorized to file suit on all past due convict bonds.

It is the order of the court that the site for building the Sager-ton bridge be moved above the railroad bridge with one additional span at an additional cost of \$936.50, said amount to come out of R. & B. fund of commissioners precinct No. 4, to be paid in four equal payments, first to become due Feb. 15, 1912, subject to approval of the contractors, Austin Bros.

It is the order of the court that taxes for year 1909 on 166 acres out of survey No. 29, abstr. 200, owned by A. A. Guinn, be cancelled and that same be reassured for said year.

District Court

In the District court this week Judge Thomas has been busy trying what is known as statutory rape cases. In such cases as these the female involved is under age of consent which is fixed in this state at the age of 16 years.

In the case of the state vs. Hugh Scarborough, on change of venue from Scurry county, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. In the case of the state vs. Charley Jones from the same county and the same offense rape, a verdict of not guilty was rendered.

These two cases brought a host of witnesses from points out of the county, as well as eminent counsel from other points. Judge C. P. Woodruff of Sweetwater, was on the prosecution in both cases. Higgins and Taylor of Snyder were in both cases of the defense and Judge J. F. Cunningham of Abilene was for the defense in the Scarborough case.

As we go to press the case of Henry Winchester, charged with assault with intent to rape is on trial. W. H. Murchison is for the defense in that case.

These cases have attracted a large crowd of men and boys, who drank in the sickening details of the drama as the helpless victim was forced to reveal her shame. We noted there were many old familiar faces present at the trials, and taking the

usual interest in the same.

One of the most pitiful sights we ever witnessed, was to see a young girl on the witness stand, answering those terrible questions, unfolding every shocking detail of her shame, within the hearing and under the stare of five hundred or more men and boys.

So often, as in these cases the victim is led astray trusting in the fidelity of her seducer, who exposes her to his chums, and the first thing she knows she is approached by every boy she meets, and her shame is in every ones mouth. The next step is to face twelve grand jury men and a district attorney alone. Then follows the ordeal of the public trial, deserted by every member of her sex, in a crowded court room, under the stare of several thousand male eyes, of all shades of lust or pity, she is forced to reveal her own shame in all its blighting details. My God, pity the victims of man's lust, and touch the enlightened sympathy of both men and women in this the twentieth century.

There is a movement on foot in Refugio to secure two railroads, the Quanah, Seymour, Dublin & Rockport from San Marcos and the San Antonio, Mexico & Rockport road.

Three cars of pecans, aggregating 90,000 pounds were shipped this week from Marble Falls and Burnet to St. Louis and New York.

San Angelo Wool growers have shipped approximately 130,000,000 pounds of wool this season.

The display of a 4-year old orange tree from Alvin is one of the most attractive exhibits of the United States Land and Irrigation Exposition now on in Chicago.

Rockport's Commercial Club is financing the building of a large cotton gin in that city.

The oil wells in the Electra fields are producing an average of about 600 barrels per day.

The Galveston Commercial Association has submitted a proposition to the national government for the establishment of a fish hatchery on the gulf coast.

Lufkin will call an election for a bond issue of \$200,000 for good roads in the near future.

Fuller's earth has been found in Ellis, Burleson, Smith, Fayette and Shelby counties.

It is reported that the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient Railway Company has filed application with the Public Utility Corporation of Kansas to secure authority to issue \$20,000,000 in gold bonds to continue railroad building in Southwest Texas.

It is believed that within three months actual work on the improvement of the Houston ship channel under a \$2,500,000 bond, will be under way.
