Local weather data available

While those of us living in Texas already had a suspicion, the National Climatic Data Center made it official, 2011 was the driest calendar year on record for the state. Average rainfall for the year totaled just 14.88 inches, beating the previous low of 14.99 inches set in 1917.

2011 also went down in the record book as the second hottest calendar year on record with an average of 67.2 degrees, just under the 67.5 degrees set in 1921. In June, July and August, Texas had an that may be good news for average statewide temperature of 86.8 degrees, making it the hottest summer on record for any state. In fact as of Sept. 1, Abilene had recorded 78 days of over 100 degrees temperature and Wichita Falls had experienced 95 days over 100 degrees. Victor Murphy, manager of climate services at the National Weather Service's southern region headquarters in Fort Worth said, "Drought begets heat and then heat begets drought, and a feedback cycle develops. This is what we

saw from May to September." Dr. David Brown, a regional official with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration states, "La Nina was present for four years during the 1950s drought, which still ranks as the worst in Texas history due to its longevity. Unusually high surface temperatures in the tropical Atlantic Ocean also helped cause that drought, and those have been present in recent years."

According to the National Drought Mitigation Center at the University of Nebraska, the entire state of Texas is experiencing drought, with three-fourths of the state classified as exceptional drought. Our immediate area has been designated to be in severe to extreme drought.

National Weather Service spokesman Murphy said, "The drought started in fall 2010 with the arrival of the La Nina weather condition that causes below-normal rainfall, and now it's back." He adds, scant rainfall and scorching temperatures in 2011 hit ranchers and farmers the hardest. The most recent

The drought also led to some of the worst wildfires ever seen in Texas, destroying hundreds of homes and ravaging millions of acres. In addition, The Texas Forest Service estimated that as many as 500 million trees across the state died last year due to the

Murphy also said another reason 2011 was so hot and dry was because no tropical storms or hurricanes made landfall in the state. While those along the coast, it could have brought much needed rain for other parts of the

Murphy continues, "Despite rainfall in December, many of the state's reservoirs and lakes remain well below normal levels. What happens in the springtime will be huge, not only for the summertime, but also for recharging the state reservoirs."

The Rolling Plains Groundwater Conservation District reports that a year end review of the weather data from the weather stations in Baylor, Haskell and Knox counties confirms what many already knew, the period from Oct. 1, 2010 to Sept. 30, 2011 was the driest in recorded times. Mike McGuire with the Groundwater Conservation District reminds citizens that you can access these weather stations and review the data at www.mesonet.ttu.edu/. You can also view valuable up to date weather information for our immediate area at this site.

McGuire says that since September, when most irrigation ceased, the levels have not dropped and have even come up a foot or so. The district will be measuring wells in a few weeks for water levels. You can access the online monitor wells for Haskell County at http://midgewater. twdb.state.tx.us/twdbwells/ haskell2135748.png.

Because of recent rains east of our area, McGuire says that the lakes and wells in the Brazos system have gone from 63% to 78% capacity. While that is encouraging, he also knows that we must estimate shows crop and have a steady rain over a

So what can we expect in the future? Like it or not, we really can't control the weather, we can only predict what we think it will do. Sometimes it follows those predictions and sometimes it doesn't. Joe Baskin of the National Weather Service says, "It takes an extended period of above normal rainfall, and the problem is you can't just put a time or date or amount of rainfall for coming out of drought. Unfortunately, predictions are for below normal precipitation statewide to continue into the springtime. Summer temperatures are also expected to be above normal.

While we can't control the weather, we can be as conservative as possible, to help ensure that we have a continued water supply. We also can talk to the one in charge of the weather, and pray for rain.

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Pressure Sores

A pressure sore is also known as a bed sore or decubitus ulcer. This is an injury to the skin and tissues under the skin. Pressure sores are caused by unrelieved pressure from sitting or lying in the same position for a long time. The pressure on a small area of the body can squeeze shut tiny blood vessels that normally supply tissue with oxygen and nutrients. If tissue is deprived of oxygen and nutrients for too long, it begins to die and a pressure sore will form.

Pressure sores are measured in stages according to the amount of damage to the skin and underlying tissues. The stages range from 1 to 4 with 1 being the least damage and 4 being the most.

In persons with other health problems, including diabetes and peripheral vascular disease, pressure sores may be more difficult to heal due to decreased healing ability and poor blood circulation.

Pressure sores are serious and must not be ignored. With proper treatment, most pressure sores will heal.

Abbott sues to speed approval of voter ID law

AUSTIN-Attorney General Greg Abbott on Jan. 23 filed a lawsuit in the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals to push the U.S. Department of Justice to approve the voter I.D. law enacted by the Texas Legislature last spring.

The law has not been given the required preclearance by the Department of Justice. Abbott said his intent is to spur a ruling that would allow the new law to take effect. The lawsuit dovetails with the state's efforts in the U.S. Supreme Court and the D.C. Court to have the Texas Legislature's contested House, Senate and U.S. congressional redistricting maps pre-cleared under Section 5 of the U.S. Voting Rights Act in time to meet deadlines for the April 3 party primaries.

On Jan. 20, the Supreme Court said the U.S. District Court Western District of Texas in San Antonio erred in its remedial redistricting plans created last year and ordered the three-judge panel of the San Antonio court to revise the plans. The San Antonio court on Jan. 27 asked opponents in the redistricting cases to work together and present them with agreed-upon solutions in hopes of speeding the process.

Texas is among several states and other jurisdictions subject to Section 5 because of a history of discriminatory election practices.

Texans, if the law takes effect, would have to show a government-issued photo I.D. along with their valid voter registration card in order to cast a ballot, and those who do not have a driver's license, passport, military I.D. card or other approved form of identification can get a stateissued voter I.D. free of charge from the Texas Department of Public Safety. And anyone who is disabled or over 65 can vote by mail, a method that does not require photo identification.

Supporters of the voter I.D. law said during the legislative process that it would help stop election fraud. Opponents said the legislation, if passed, would discriminate against minorities, the disabled and citizens who live in rural areas of the state.

Abbott last week said the law is not discriminatory and to support his position quoted a U.S. Supreme Court ruling: "The inconvenience of making a trip to the (Bureau of Motor Vehicles), gathering the required documents and posing for a photograph surely does not qualify as a substantial burden on the right to vote, or even represent a significant increase over the usual burdens

of voting."

Several other states passed voter I.D. laws last year, but more than 30 states do not have voter I.D. laws.

Comptroller unveils info site

Texas Comptroller Susan Combson Jan. 25 announced the launch of TheTexasEconomy. org, a website featuring state revenue and spending data, and more than a dozen economic indicators.

Combs said the site uses info-graphics, video interviews, tables and snapshots of key data to present information on an array of topics, such as Texas industries and jobs, the effects of drought on the economy and the impact of obesity on businesses and taxpayers.

Grain indemnity fund is goal

Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples on Jan. 26 said a discussion on grain warehouse failures and what can be done to avoid them was the focus of the first meeting of the agency's newly appointed Texas Grain Producer Indemnity Board.

Bryan Black, a spokesman with the Texas Department of Agriculture, said that the word "failures" in this context means bankruptcies caused by grain market volatility. The board is looking at ways to set up a grain indemnity fund that would help cover loses for producers caught up in a warehouse bankruptcy,

A grain warehouse operator who is unable to cover the open contracts he or she has purchased can get caught in margin calls. "With the amount of grain some of these warehouses trade, one or two big margin calls can sink them pretty fast," Black said.

More reward money is offered

Gov. Rick Perry on Jan. 25 announced his decision to increase rewards for the Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offenders program to \$2,000, with some rewards reaching up to \$5,000.

Managed by Texas Crime Stoppers and the Texas Department of Public Safety, the rewards are meant to encourage citizens who have information to bring it to the attention of law enforcement.

Previously, any person who provided information that led to the arrest of one of the listed sex offenders received \$1,000 cash. According to the DPS, since the Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offenders program began in July 2010, 12 arrests have been made, with seven arrests coming from tips, and the governor's office has paid out a total of \$13,300 in rewards.





"The board is working individuals and others for hard to efficiently determine Warehouse Grain Buying working with the Legislature the operations of the indemnity fund so we can work to get the fund in place and provide the protection producers need," Vaughan said.

Once the board establishes its procedures, producers will have 90-day notice before the referendum is held. The cost of the referendum will be paid by producer organizations and agricultural financing institutions.

The board's establishment is the result of legislation passed by the 2011 Texas legislature and signed into law by the governor. Rep. Larry Phillips of Sherman and Sen. Craig Estes of Wichita Falls introduced the legislation after a series of grain elevator financial failures in recent years resulted in millions of dollars in losses to Texas grain producers.




