Don't cover an honor

By Phillip Alder

When you began playing bridge, you probably learned the maxim "Cover an honor with an honor." Like many bridge maxims, this one is practically useless without elaboration. In general, you should cover only the last of touching honors, and even then only when it might generate an extra trick for your side.

True, sometimes declarer will fail to take advantage of a defensive error but not always. Today's hand cropped up in a pairs event. Every pair reached six hearts, usually following a Jacoby transfer bid. It was an easy contract to make, but the declarers who could bring home the overtrick would get the good match-

Some declarers drew only two rounds of trump before playing on diamonds; others drew all the hearts before turning to the diamonds. But when the queen of diamonds was led from the dummy, the spotlight was on East. The inexperienced defenders covered immediately with the king. Ironically some of them got lucky. A couple of declarers won with the ace of diamonds and returned the nine of diamonds. This was covered by the 10, and they had to lose either a diamond ruff or the fourth round of the suit to East's seven. The better declarers led back the six of diamonds, planning to finesse dummy's eight. The appearance of the 10 ended all problems.

When the queen of diamonds wasn't covered by the king, the declarers had to guess. Did West have 10 doubleton or did East have king doubleton? Those who guessed correctly succeeded in collecting the overtrick; those



Filibuster blocks coastal measure

AUSTIN (AP) — As filibusters go, Sen. Carlos Truan's effort was hardly a whisper - five hours and 15 minutes.

But on Thursday that was all it took to block passage of a coastal bill Truan called rank, special interest legislation.

On the other side was bill sponsor Eddie Lucio, D-Brownsville, who said the bill is "designed to benefit and protect the entire Texas coast.

Without votes to defeat the bill, Truan, D-Corpus Christi, started a filibuster at 1:40 p.m., and succeeded in blocking immediate passage of Sen. Lucio's proposal.

At 6:55 p.m., a motion to adjourn until Monday was accepted without objection, apparently because the Senate no longer had a quorum of 21 to do business. Only a few senators were in the chamber.

The record for a Texas filibuster is 43 hours.

Lucio won a 21-8 vote to debate his bill, which was considered a test of support, and said he would try to bring the coastal measure up again Monday.

The measure would authorize the creation of coastal conservation districts, which could sell tax-exempt bonds and levy taxes for public improvements such as roads and sewers.

The districts would be regulated by a state commission, Lucio said. He said joining a coastal district would be at the option of local voters.

Truan, 55, in 1985 had a 20-hour filibuster against state regulation of shrimp and oyster fishing. He has had two heart attacks and underwent bypass surgery, acto a cording Senate spokeswoman.

Truan said representatives of American General Insurance had asked him to sponsor the bill, and he refused.

Jr. Olympics raises over 2,000 dollars

The second annual Junior Olympics Festival, sponsored by the West Elementary Parent Council Organization, gave over 500 children a chance to compete in seven events plus inter city relays and raised over \$2,000 for improvements for the school.

Students - 517 in all - participated in 137 races plus the "buddy" shuttle relays. Ribbons were awared to the top three in each heat for each event.

Track meet events included the running broad jump, softball throw, 50-yard-dash, 100 yard dash, 200 yard dash, 400 yard dash and the inter city relays which had students from local elementary schools competing for ribbons.

Pair indicted for officer slaying under new drug law

TYLER, Texas (AP) - Two Edinburg brothers have been indicted in the first test of a federal law allowing the death penalty for killing an officer in the midst of a drug trafficking operation.

Baldemar Sambrano Villarreal, 29, and Reynaldo Sambrano Villarreal, 24, were indicted Thursday by a federal grand jury in connection with the Jan. 23 beating and stabbing death of Nacogdoches County constable Darrell Lunsford.

A third suspect, Jesus "Jesse" Cortez Zambrano, 22, also of Edinburg, pleaded guilty April 11 to the new federal murder statute. But Department of Justice officials said Zambrano will not face a death sentence. Instead, he will be sentenced to between 20 years and life in prison and a \$250,000 fine for his role in the officer's death.

Lunsford, 47, had stopped a car near Garrison, Texas. A videotape camera mounted on Lunsford patrol car and used primarily to get scene footage in drunken driving cases recorded the officer's killing.

The three men had been charged with capital murder and neigh without bond in a state case. The federal government later charged the trio with conspiracy to distribute marijuana after 25 to 30 pounds of the drug and Lunsford's wallet were found near the abandoned car photographed in the videotape.

Then federal officials involved in the investigation opted to try for the new indictment.


The indictment, which requires the personal approval of U.S. Attorney Dick Thornburgh, eliminates the possibility of parole for convicted offenders.

"Congress gave us a tool to prosecute drug dealers who take the lives of local, state and federal officers and we're going to use it," said U.S. Attorney Bob Wortham of Beaumont, who will try the case along with Assistant U.S. Attorneys Jim Middleton and Wes Rivers.



Chapman, D-Sulphur Springs, said he learned Monday that the Army still planned to mothball the Longhorn Army Ammunition Plant in Karnack by 1994, reducing the work force from approximately 900 to about 70.

The Army's plans come despite legislation, co-sponsored by Chapman, which requires base closings involving more than 300 workers to be approved by an independent base-closure commission, the president and Congress.

Chapman said the Army claims the ammunition plant isn't covered by the new law because it has only 31 government employees, and that the rest work for a private contractor, Thiokol Corp. of Ogden,

Chapman says he learned of the Army's plans on Monday, just three days after the Pentagon submitted a list of recommended base closings to the Base Closure and Realignment Commission.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. "I was pleasantly surprised not it didn't have to be on the list to

Chapman said the Army has taken the position that at government-owned, contractoroperated facilities, only the government employees are counted toward the new baseclosing threshold.

Cheney announced in January 1990 that he was seeking to mothball Longhorn and several other ammunition plants as part of a national base-closing plan. The list, however, was scrapped amid charges that most installations were in Democrats' districts and Congress adopted the new procedures in its place.

"I always believed that Longhorn was at risk, but I also believed that the (new) base closure law applied, and that we would be notified," Chapman said in an interview.

Instead, Chapman said he learned of the Army's intentions Monday, when he obtained a memo from the Army to Longhorn detailing its plans to mothball the plant.

Taxes exceed expenses

AUSTIN (AP) - Pari-mutuel horse and dog races in Texas has shown a profit for state government for the first time since being legalized, the Racing Commission says.

Dave Freeman, the commission's executive secretary, said that pari-mutuel wagering now has generated more revenue for the state than was spent in supporting the racing industry since the commission was formed in

"For the first time since the voters approved pari-mutuel wagering, the state has taken in , more money than it has spent on racing start-up and subsequent regulation," Freeman said Thursday.

Since the commission was formed, revenue generated for the state totals \$10.35 million. That money was raised through racetrack application and licensing fees, fines, uncashed winning tickets and the state's tax on wagers. The state collects a 5 percent tax on each dollar wagered on horse racing and 6 percent on dog racing.

The commission's total expenses since 1988 total \$8.05 million, and another \$2.29 million was spent by the Department of Public Safety in enforcement of racing laws and on background investigations.

"This is an exciting time for the commission because the parimutuel racing industry is now generating more direct revenue for the state than it costs to operate the commission," Freeman said.



refugees. U.S. Army-supplied equipment and medicine enabled Safwan's small hospital to reopen after it was ruined by shrapnel and looters. Last weekend, as the U.S. Army prepared to withdraw, they turned the clinic back to the Iraqi staff.

Americans at Safwan are among only 18,000 remaining in Iraq to protect a thin buffer zone between Iraq and Kuwait until 1,440 U.N. peacekeeping troops are deployed in the next few weeks.

The clinic is still a mess broken windows and toilets, no running water — but Hatch described it as a success story.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have a husband who complains constantly of being tired. He has a cabinet filled with fish oil, vitamins from A to Z and all the B vitamins you could imagine. He thinks the more he takes the better he feels, and I simply cannot educate the man. Would you please comment so I can simply hand him your response? DEAR READER: Your question

really has two components: the issue of chronic fatigue and the role of megavitamin therapy. Lassitude and fa tigue are frequently the earliest and most troublesome indicators of ill health. Such symptoms often reflect the presence of disease: anemia, cancer, hidden infection, diabetes, thyroid disorders and depression, to mention a few. In fact, fatigue is part and parcel of many chronic ailments.

Therefore, rather than relying on vitamins and minerals to combat his fatigue, your husband needs to see his family doctor for a diagnosis. The physician will perform a thorough medical examination, followed by blood tests, to determine the cause of the complaint. More often than not, the basis of chronic tiredness can be identified and treated.

Megavitamin therapy is not an effective treatment for fatigue nor should it be used to treat undiagnosed ailments; this therapy has not proved appropriate for tiredness, loss of stamina or other symptoms of poor health. Moreover, some vitamins notably A and D - can be exceedingly dangerous when taken in large quantities because toxic levels may affect many of the body's organs. Of course, in rare cases a patient may have a specific vitamin or mineral deficiency that can easily be corrected by using supplements containing vitamins at or near the Recommended Daily Allowance. However, massive doses, in amounts far exceeding the body's requirement, should be discouraged.

My answer to your husband is: Stop playing doctor; find an M.D. who can diagnose the problem and suggest sensible therapy.

purchases increase

WASHINGTON (AP) Although some farmers may be a bit leery about taking on more debt, the Agriculture Department says many will be buying new tractors and other machinery this year.

The department's Economic Research Service said Thursday in a preliminary monthly outlook report that several factors indicate "a sustained increase" in farm machinery investment and that sales may rise an average of about 4 percent from their 1990 level.

"These include the strengthening of farmers' financial positions, lower cost and expanding availability of credit, an aging stock of capital equipment and higher real rates of return of farm assets," it said.

But economists cautioned that "equipment purchases may be limited by fewer acres eligible for government payments' under the new farm law. Also, many farmers may be cautious about assuming new debt,

The agency continued to forecast 1991 net cash income of farmers at \$53 billion to \$58 billion, compared with about \$58 billion last year.

As used by the USDA economists, net cash income "measures the value of commodities sold in a calendar year plus government payments, less out-of-pocket costs." Some commodities sold actually may have been produced in earlier years and stored until marketed.

Husbands, wives can qualify separately now

WASHINGTON (AP) - A final decision has been made so husbands and wives can qualify as separate persons under federal farm program payment regulations, Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan

The new regulation announced Thursday carries out a "discretionary authority" provided by the 1990 farm law to allow spouses to be considered as separate persons in determining limits on farm subsidies.

Clayton Yeutter, Madigan's predecessor, announced on Jan. 7 that he intended to carry out the authority to change the

payments rules for spouses. The Supreme Court a year ago rejected without comment a challenge to the Agriculture Department regulation that treated a husband and wife as one person when they apply for the payments.

3 more African countries added to eligibility list

WASHINGTON (AP) - Three more African countries have been added to the Agriculture Department's eligibility list for sales of U.S. wheat at subsidized

Acting Undersecretary Ann Veneman said Thursday that Botswana, Lesotho and Namibia may buy the grain under the department's Export Enhancement Program.

A total of 20 countries in West and Central Africa now are eligible to buy U.S. wheat under the program.


Ms. Trevathan will replace Frank Evans, who retired. The appointment Thursday is subject to Senate confirmation.






