children." What many persons do not realize is that the very same rule applies when MERTING a stopped school bus. While every-one is interested in protecting our children, unthinking viola-tors of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Fallure to follow the law in this case can lead to fines up to \$200.00 even when no acident to even. Following and accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally much more serious. Although the above rule does not always apply when passing

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a busi-ness or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious, When it comes to overtaking and nasing moving rabidar

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a dri-ver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only commonsense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is at-tempting to pass him. In the same category is the

tempting to pass him. In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is maxing or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lance, or upon a four-

or more lanes, or upon a fourlane highway.

lane highway. However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or main-traveled portion of the roadway. Familiar to all are the no pass-ing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways.

Inters placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the re-strictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or when trav-ersing any intersection or rail-road grade crossing. A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when

center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of on-coming traffic. Generally speak-

coming traffic Generally speak-ing, when not engaged in pass-ing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the cen-ter of the roadway. (This column, based on Texas law, is written to inform-not to advise. No person should ever apply or interpret any law with-out the aid of an attorney who is fully advised concerning the facts involved, because a slight variance in facts may change the application of the law.)



Designed to supplement the officer output of the Naval Aca-demy, the NROTO program makes it possible for a young man to earn a commission while man to earn a commission while studying at the civilian college of his-choice which has an NROTC unit. All tuition, fees and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives an an-nual retainer of \$600 for four years, During the summers the student goes on fascinating training cruises as a midship-man. After completing the usual four year college course, he is commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty with the Navy's far-flung fleets. For those who apply and qualify, immediate as-signment to flight training will open new careers in Naval aviaopen new careers in Naval avia-

open new careers in Naval avia-tion. High school seniors anad grad-uates between the ages of 17 and 31 may apply for the NROTC aptiude test. Those who make a qualifying score will be given a rigid physical exam early in 1957. From the pool of qualified young men remaining in compe-tition, approximately 2,000 will be selected to begin their naval careers next September. The NROTC college training program is also open to enlisted men on active duty with the Navy and Marines. Separate quotas are established for appli-cants from within these services. Application forms are avail-able at all high schools, colleges, Navy Recruiting Stations or from the Chief of Naval Per-sonnel, Washington 25, D. C.

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

At present Texas is the only state in the nation which still requires a mentally ill person to endure a jury trial before he can-ob-tain more than 90 days treat-ment at a state hospital.

Lane, Jr., Executive Director of the Texas Society for Mental Health, declare Amendment Seven an occurring lirst step toward adeessential first step toward ademental health legislation

"There is a common misun-derstanding," said Mr. Lane, "that the amendment abolishes the jury trial in commitment proceedings. In summary 'un-less you want to use the item' in which case you should pay for it' you should keep it for awhile and then may throw it away. If another person's mail is improperly delivered to you' do not open it as such action might make you liable to severe legal penalties Such mail should promptly be reposited in a

Soon Al has not been back home since she first arriv-ed in Abilene and says she does not expect to return home until she has finished due to the high cost of transportation.

She was a native of North Korea when war came and about her struggle to survive during this period. She told of her trying experiences in trying to get to South Korea and find some way to make a living. She has not yet heard from her fam-ily and has no way of knowing what happened to them. Through her interest in church cost of transportation.

Through her interest in church work and great desire to come to America to go to school, she finally became acquainted with an American chaplain at Puson an American chaplain at Puson Army Post. He became interested in her welfare and started work-ing to get her to America, and finally an American minister, a Rev. Jones from Muleshoe, who now lives in Stinnett, was able to make final arrangements for her to come to McMurry.

One particularly touching statement she made was that while working in South Korea she' had a difficult time going to church due to working hours and finally she began to go to the Puson Army Chapel. 
