Kerr on trial

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — Prosecution witness Mitchell Rider told a federal jury Wednesday that 42year-old television actor Jay Kerr was his California cocaine connection during 1987 and 1988.

Kerr, a native of Del Rio, Texas, is on trial before U.S. District Judge Jack Shanstrom on nine federal drug counts.

Kerr starred as the quarterback last season in

HBO's "1st and 10" series. The charges against him include one of conspiracy and eight of possession of cocaine with intent to distribute.

Felons paroled

DALLAS (AP) — More than 600 felons have been paroled in special hearings in the past month as the Texas prison population edges toward a courtimposed limit, according to a published report today.

The Dallas Times Herald reported in a copyright story that special hearings were conducted twice in the past month for hundreds of inmates, resulting in parole approval for more than twothirds of those considered.

"This is not really designed to just open the floodgates and let out people who don't deserve to be out," said James Granberry, parole board chairman, noting most of the inmates would have been considered in two to six months.

Program puts inmates to work

seen working at public facilities as part of a Scurry County sentencing program.

The program is supervised by sheriff's deputy Joe Cheyne, whose salary is funded through a state grant, and offers an alternative to sending inmates to the already over-crowded Texas prison system.

Through the program, inmates are allowed to work on any public property. Among the facilities receiving attention are Noah Project, county community centers and Towle Park Pool.

Currently, four people are in the program — designed for non-violent offenders - but Cheyne notes they have room for 10-15 inmates.

Inmates are transported to work sites in the county's old bookmobile and are constantly supervised by Cheyne. The bookmobile was refurbished by the inmates.

The project was approved in October with its first inmate introduced into the program in November. The sheriff's office has already applied for a grant to continue the program next year.

"I of course accept it gladly," Powell told Bush at a Rose Garden ceremony. He brushed aside suggestions he opposed commiting American armed forces to combat in the Persian

The reappointment was not a surprise, but came several weeks after a book was published which said that Powell had opposed the move toward war in the Gulf and preferred a policy that emphasized a non-military approach toward ousting Iraq from Kuwait. Bush praised Powell's role and his advice, saying of did it openly.

"He gave me sound advice, straightforward advice," Bush said. ".. I just want to be on the record — he speaks his mind, he did it openly.

"He told me the risks, he told me what was at stake in terms of human lives." Bush said he was angered with "revisionist" accounts that suggested he and Powell disagreed on the administration's Gulf policy.

"He did what any general officer should do," Bush said. Powell is 54.

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veins that commonly become irritated and swollen, leading to what most people call hemorrhoids or "piles." These enlarged veins are usually present at the anus (external hemorrhoids) or inside the rectum (internal hemorrhoids). The cause of the swelling is not known, although certain factors such as constipation, diarrhea and prolonged sitting on hard, cold

surfaces play an obvious role. Early internal homoraholds pro duce no symptoms. By contrast, external hemorrhoids may be painful or itchy: a large blue lump (the enlarged vein) is visible or can be felt. Early hemorrhoids usually disappear without treatment

If the temporary swelling does not resolve, the hemorrhoids often grow larger and become thrombosed. meaning that the blood in them clots. This usually leads to more severe pain. Thrombosed hemorrhoids are treated with rectal suppositories (to facilitate evacuation and aid healing) or Sitz baths (sitting in about six inches of hot water).

Eventually, the hemorrhoids disappear, leaving a small pink nubbin of skin, called a hemorrhoidal tag. On occasion, because of severe discomfort, patients with thrombosed hemorrhoids require surgery to remove

If the hemorrhoids grow large

lower rectum contain a network of enough or become very inflamed. they may bleed. This bleeding is bright red, usually painless and is typically present on the toilet tissue after a bowel movement. Sometimes the bleeding can be quite brisk and may occur between bowel movements. Again, the treatment is usually suppositories and Sitz baths. Hemorrhoids that bleed profusely or persistently may require surgery.

Obviously, rectal bleeding is aloccur from afflictions, such as tumors, other than bemorrhoids. Therefore, doctors usually must investigate the condition by examining the anus and rectum (anoscopy) for the cause. If the bleeding comes from a hemorrhoid, the physician may attempt to cauterize the vein to stop the

Bleeding hemorrhoids do not, in most cases, present a health problem but they always deserve examination and appropriate treatment.

Speed is of the essence

When you are in an apparently im-

possible contract, try to find a play that gives an opponent a guess - he may get it wrong. Remember, he presumably cannot see your cards.

Today's deal occurred during the Open Pairs in Atlantic City. The bidding is typical of a pairs event when both sides have a fit. Everyone continues bidding to at least the four-level.

In bidding three no-trump, South hoped that no-trump would produce the same number of tricks as hearts, in which case he would score more been right, but not if West found an inspired diamond start.

However, when East proceeded to bid out his two-suiter, South competed in hearts to the five-level. He won the spade lead with his ace and cashed the ace of hearts. West dropping the nine and East the jack.

Reading the position perfectly, declarer realized West had dropped the nine as the start of an echo to show three trumps. With no noticeable pause, South led the 10 of hearts to trick three. (Would you have even thought of that play?)
Time stood still. Eventually West

decided his partner must have started with K-J doubleton in hearts, so he played his five. The 10 of hearts won. Declarer cashed the king of hearts, drove out the ace of clubs and won 12 tricks. Plus 480 was, of course, a top




Screening tests slated in area
