

Despite all the problems and criticisms they weathered, it wasn't enough. Now they are face to face with the prospect of another deficit next year and the need to raise more

It is in this not-so-rosy setting that the House Committee on Saving Taxes is checking into how state money has, and is being spending the week in Dallas, spent. When they heard that the terrazzo floors in the brand new State Office Building has cracked, committee members decided to investigate further into the \$3,793,000 building.

They learned that the air conditioning system vibrated excessively; that the building had 1,000 elaborate door knobs, visiting relatives in Graham costing \$36 apiece; and that there were telephone booths in the this week. hallways lined with expensive marble. Some offices had no doors.

They noted that the Texas Employment Commission Building, just across the street and to the casual observer equally as | Falls last week. handsome, cost only \$14.33 per square foot compared to \$17.40 for the State Office Building.

Cracked floors now are being removed and replaced by the contractor, at no cost to the state. Efforts are under way to smooth out the knocks in the air conditioning. Legislators are unhappy at the lack of supervision and inspection while the building was under construction.

The purpose of any system of making up Little League teams, is to try out boys within the approved League boundaries—and this means all of the boys so that eventually they may be selected on their ability to play base ball at any given position for which they are candidates.

There must be no discrimination in giving the boys a chance to try out. Viewed in its entirety, Little League has three dimensional discrimination of the lawks; Joe Harpers, Manager of the Rams; and Volly Ivy is the Manager of the Tigers. dimensions: height, depth, and breadth. In its height, it aspires upward to a practical idealism and takes on a definite measure of what is good and true. In its depth, it penetrates to the best instincts the very heart of warm, red-blooded men and women, stimulating them, holding their motives right and unselfish. In breadth, it embraces man and boy in every station and condition of life and establishes mutual rights and respect for each

The formation of leagues on any basis which would group boys into cliques, is to be avoided. One of the principles of Little League selection is to disrupt such cliques so that the boys may have an entirely new incentive in the team and the league in which they are playing. This idea means that no team should be composed of the students of a given school or the members of a certain church or any other organization.
