Holiday spirit touches **Internal Revenue Service**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Internal Revenue Service, seeking to put a little distance between taxes and the holiday spirit, said today it will delay mailing 1991 tax forms until after New Year's Day

We don't want to intrude on the holiday season," IRS spokesman Frank Keith said. "People should spend the day after Christmas reading Christmas cards.

Keith said the Postal Service has been asked to delay delivering the packages of tax forms until Jan. 2. The more than 100 million packages constitute the largest mailing handled by the Post Office each year

Until 1990, the forms began arriving in mailboxes on Dec. 26. Last year the IRS delayed delivery a couple of days, and this year's change is a continuation of that idea.

Some things never change, however. The filing deadline remains April 15


DEAR DR. GOTT: Five years ago I was diagnosed with paroxysmal supraventricular tachycardia. I took medication for two years and recent-ly chose to stop it. Now, about every two months, I have an episode where my heart rate will suddenly double before returning to its regular rate. My doctor says not to worry. Is he

right? DEAR READER: To a large degree, my answer depends on your age and the symptoms you experience when your heart rate increases.

Paroxysmal SVT is a rapid pulse due to disruption of the normal cardiac pacemaker, usually caused by ar-teriosclerosis. Many people occasionally have short bursts of SVT (three or four beats) of which they are totally unaware. This may be discovered by accident during routine testing and requires no treatment.

However, when the SVT occurs frequently, is prolonged or causes symptoms of weakness, palpitations, light headedness or shortness of breath, preventive therapy (with drugs such as beta-blockers or calcium-channel blockers) may be necessary. SVT is most likely to cause symptoms in the elderly, in whom it can also lead to angina because the heart muscle is deprived of oxygen. In such cases, treatment is mandatory.

Since you are aware of your attacks of SVT, I think you should receive treatment - especially if you are Indiana basketball coach Bob Knight over 60 years of age. However, I am not a cardiologist, nor do I have access to information in your medical records. Nonetheless, I am concerned that you were prescribed medicine for-two years, chose to stop it and are now having symptoms. This indicates to me that your SVT is wor or at least hasn't improved. In order to resolve this issue, I suggest you obtain an additional opinion from a cardiologist. Such a specialist 1985. Hurricane Kate made landfall late will review your records and may test you further with a stress test and/or a Holter monitor (a measurement of your pulse for a 24-hour period). Then, armed with more data, the cardiologist can advise you further about ' whether or not preventive therapy is indicated. DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a heart patient trying to recover as much quality of life as possible, considering I have coronary artery disease. To date I have had two angioplasties, and I am on medication to control angina. My present goal is to improve my diet and exercise regularly. In a column you wrote last May, you discussed a group study for a controlled diet and a low-to-no-fat diet with the latter having a positive improvement in their condition. Can you elaborate? DEAR READER: Several studies have shown that by drastically reducing dietary saturated fat, many cardiac patients can significantly retard arteriosclerotic buildup in coronary arteries and lessen the risk of heart attacks. These diets are very strict and, for most patients, difficult to follow for extended periods. Because you will need one-on-one dietary advice and monitoring, I sug-gest you address this subject with your own physician, who is more fa-miliar than I am with your heart con-dition and lifestyle. He or she will probably enlist the aid of a dietician or refer you to a medical center for intense dietary therapy. If you choose to enroll in such a program, (and take your medicine, exercise regularly, and submit to close medical followup), the chances are good that your condition will improve. have either enough length to return to the opener's suit or enough power to be able to control the later auction. Here South rebids three no-trump to show his strength and spade stoppers. The success of three no-trump deends on trick one. East should deduce that South has the A-J of spades plus a low spade or two. As South is bound to get two spade tricks, East should en-sure that South is forced to win one of them immediately. East should overtake the spade nine with his 10.

Declarer wins with the spade jack and then plays a diamond. West puts up his king and leads his second spade. establishing East's suit while East still has the diamond ace as an entry contract defeated.

If East plays the spade queen at trick one, South will duck. Declarer wins the second spade with the jack and leads a diamond. West may win with the king, but he doesn't have a spade to lead to establish his partner's suit - contract made.

Now we turn to "Kantar Lessons II," which features material that is more advanced. The opening chapter explains the negative double, about which many players are unclear. The foremost job of a negative double is to uncover a 4-4 fit in an unbid major. Here South's double shows four hearts (though South may have more hearts if he lacks the strength for a two-heart response). Also it promises some eight-plus high-card points, because in this auction the opener will probably be forced to rebid at the two-level. The double doesn't say anything about the unbid minor. However, if the doubler is short in the unbid minor, he should





ATLANTA (AP) - Manager Bobby Cox says the Atlanta Braves "wouldn't have come close" to winning the National League pennant without Terry Pendleton.

Pendleton, a free-agent acquisition who became a leader on and off the field for the Braves, won the NL Most Valuable Player Award on Wednesday.

"He absolutely deserved it," Cox said. "Terry's a special guy. They talk about team leaders, but he really is. Barry Bonds would have been a worthy recipient, but I think Terry absolutely deserved

Pendleton won by 15 points over Bonds in the closest voting by the Baseball Writers Association of America since 1979.

Pendleton had 12 first-place votes, 10 seconds and two third for 274 points in the balloting. Bonds, who won the award last year and led Pittsburgh to its second straight NL East title, had 259 points on 10 firsts, 10 seconds, one third and three fourths.

"I never dreamed about winning a National League MVP award," Pendleton said during a news conference.

'This award is going to be and it's in my name, but my teammates, Bobby Cox and John Schuerholz and the rest of the Braves deserve a lot of credit for this," he said. "If we had finished second in the National League, I don't think I'd be standing here. I think that award probably would have gone to Barry Bonds or Bobby Bonilla or someone. The way our team played this season and the way I played this season definitely had a lot to do with it."

Bonilla, another member of the Pirates who lost the championship series to the Braves, finished third in the voting with 191 points. Will Clark of the San Francisco Giants was fourth with 118 and Howard Johnson of the New York Mets was fifth with 112.



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



Retired intelligence officer said ...

Miami cops uncovered another death plot two weeks before JFK was killed

MIAMI (AP) - Two weeks before President Kennedy was assassinated, Miami police taped a conversation about a plot to shoot him from an office building with a high-powered rifle, a retired intelligence officer says.

Alarmed at the information, police advised the FBI and Secret Service, and Kennedy's motorcade in Miami was canceled, says former Miami police Lt. Everett Kay

The president then flew on to Texas on his Southern tour - and was shot to death in a Dallas motorcade on Nov. 22, 1963.

Kay, who keeps a tape of the conversation about the plot in a safe deposit box, believes Kennedy would have escaped death if federal authorities had acted in Dallas as they did in Miami.

They were very much on the ball here," says Kay. "If it had been that way in Dallas, I don't think it would have happened.'

In 1963, Kay, now 70, worked for an intelligence unit that answered directly to Miami's police chief He specialized in penetrating right-wing hate groups.

Kay's top informant, William Somersett, traveled freely in white supremacy groups, giving weekly reports on their activities. With Somersett's help, Kay solved a bombing attack on the home of an editor of The Miami Herald after the newspaper wrote in favor of racial integration.

In the weeks prior to Kennedy's, visit to Miami and Texas, Somersett reported there were rumors in right-wing circles of an attempt on the president's life.

Only two weeks later, eerily similar events occurred in Dallas, says Kay

Lée Harvey Oswald, Kennedy's alleged assassin, did carry a disassembled rifle into the Texas Book Depository building the day of the assassination, according to authorities at the time. And he was picked up within hours after the assassination.

"That's the part that chilled me - that's the way it supposedly happened," Kay says.

As soon as the assassination news broke, Kay's unit again called the FBI and this time gave them a tape of the Milteer conversation. Neither the FBI nor the Warren Commission ever talked to Somersett, however, nor did they contact Kay again.

When Miami police inquired about the progress of the Milteer investigation, they were turned away, he said.

"Our contacts in the FBI said 'it's been turned over to our superiors,"' Kay says.

Milteer died several years later in a fire in his home in Georgia, and Somersett also is dead, says Atanacio Flores Kay.
