



The Senate today approved the measure 79-15. Bush is expected to sign it into law. On Monday the House approved the bill on a 329-82 vote. The legislation lays out defense programs for the fiscal year that started Oct. 1; a separate bill actually providing the money has passed the House and is awaiting Senate approval.

Democratic and Republican leaders alike lauded the legislation as a sober balance between the end of the Cold War and continuing threats to U.S. security

Sen Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said the bill would keep America strong while reacting to the "dramatic events and momentous changes" of the Persian Gulf War and the failed Moscow coup

ach is more likely to cause symptoms. · If you're obese, lose weight. Abdominal fat deposits can press on the stomach and increase reflux.





**Houston man** receives the death penalty

> HOUSTON (AP) - Jurors have sentenced to death by injection a 23-year-old man convicted' of fatally shooting Houston police Sgt. Bruno Soboleski, rejecting pleas by the man's family and friends that he instead be given life in prison.

Shelton Denora Jones was sentenced Thursday; two days after he was convicted of capital murder. Under Texas law, jurors could have sentenced Jones only to life. in prison or death.


On today's deal, taken from "Kantar Lessons II," cover the East-West cards and plan the play in three notrump. West leads the diamond three; East wins with the ace and returns the diamond nine, West dropping the two.

The play of the diamond suit clearly shows that West began with five diamonds and East with three. So if you lose the lead, you will go down. You have seven top tricks: two spades, two hearts, one diamond and two clubs. The other two tricks must come from spades. You could cash the A-K and hope the queen drops, but that is against the odds. It is better to try the spade finesse

Having got this far, many players will lead the spade jack from hand. When playing against their relatives. they will do well because the jack will win the trick. But against less friendly opponents, this play will cost the contract. West will cover the jack with his queen, and there will be only three spade tricks available when the suit splits 4-2.

As declarer cannot gain by having the jack covered, the right play is to lead low to dummy's 10. When that wins, cash the ace. If the queen doesn't drop, cash the king and hope for a 3-3 split. If the queen does drop under the ace, lead the spade two to the jack, return to dummy with a club to the king, and cash the spade king. © 1991, NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.

'Is it available for deficit reduction?" Sasser asked of the \$1 billion. "Education, health care, growth, crime prevention? Why, of course not, it is back in the military budget.

Bush had requested \$4.8 billion to continue building the B-2, a former occupant's possible radar-evading bomber that at \$865 million per plane is the most expensive aircraft ever built. The Air Force wants 75 of them, and 15 have already been approved.

But Congress decided to limit Bush to \$4.4 billion: \$1.8 billion to keep production lines open, \$1.6 billion for continued research and development and \$1 billion for one new B-2 bomber.

**NASA** starts countdown

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - NASA started its countdown clocks again today after testing a new rocket steering system for a missile-warning satellite to be carried into space by shuttle Atlantis.

The shuttle is scheduled to blast off at 6:31 p.m. EST Sunday.

Shuttle test director Al Sofge said the countdown was off to a good start, with only a few "nickel and dime problems that you have when you have a complicated rocket ship.'

NASA's first attempt to send Atlantis on the last shuttle flight of the year ended abruptly Tuesday when the rocket's guidance system failed during the final hours of countdown.

"You do have a little letdown when you don't go as planned," astronaut Story Musgrave said Thursday before going to Johnson Space Center in Houston for more shuttle simulator training.

"But I think it's not the time. that's very important," he said.

### Father charged with murder

MADISONVILLE, Texas (AP) ound 9 p.m. Monday, and neither - Two days after his 3-year-old had been seen since, said Sgt. daughter's mangled body was found on a highway, a Beaumont man who had sought mental help said voices told him to push the girl out of his truck.

Clifton Manuel, 31, of Beaumont was charged with murder in the girl's death and was being held by Madison County authorities Thursday night in lieu of \$100,000 bond, sheriff's dispatcher Gloria Benson said.

The body of the girl, identified by relatives as April Manuel, was found on Interstate 45 south of Madisonville early Tuesday morning by construction workers.

Investigators said she had probably been struck on the head before she fell to the roadway in the southbound lane and was hit by several vehicles, including a large truck.

In a jail interview with Houston's KTRK-TV, Manuel on Thursday said that "voices" told him to take his daughter and head for Dallas after he tried to commit himself to a Beaumont hospital.

"Then I started toward Dallas. After I got so far out that way, I turned around and started to come back toward Conroe," Manuel told KTRK.

Then a voice told me, 'Just push her out,' you know, cause hell was too hot and eternity was too long, and it started getting hot in the truck. And they said, 'Push her out, push her out.' And then'I pushed her out," he said.

Manuel said he then sought help from a Conroe hospital.

Manuel's family said he had left Beaumont with his daughter ar-
