## NO CHANGE IN GRAIN RATES FOR PRESENT, BELIEF

### Hamlin Palmer Says Hearing Will be Held Later to Test Texas Rates

Hamlin Palmer, secretary of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce, has addressed a letter to local people particularly interested in the fight started by Kansas City interests to test the validity of Texas Grain Rates, affecting rates from panhandle points to Gulf points. In it he says: "You will remember that we wrote you in April concerning Interstate Commerce Commission Docket No. 13518, in which Kansas City complained of discrimination against them on account of the lower rates from Panhandle territory to Galveston and other Texas points on grain and grain products. I had filed a plea of intervention in this case in behalf of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce and the Board of City Development of Amarillo.

"Hearing in this case was held at Kansas City on May 29th but on account of sickness I was unable to attend and Mr. E. R. Humphrey, Superintendent of the Great West Mill & Elevator Company, and President of the Board of City Development represented us at the hearing. We also arranged with the traffic manager of the Texas State Chamber of Commerce, Mr. F. A. Leffingwell, whose headquarters are in Dallas, to handle this case for us in connection with his own duties for the Texas state organization.

"The hearing lasted three days and it transpired that on account of the restored jurisdiction of the Texas Railroad Commission in consequence of the decision of the United States Supreme Court in the Wisconsin Rate Case and also on account of the reluctance of both sides to enter into a contention at this time as to the reasonableness of the rates involved, it is anticipated that the results of this hearing will be very much in the nature of a "draw". It is believed by our representative and others in attendance at the hearing that the Examiner will render a tentative opinion that there is a discrimination in the rates with recommendation that a subsequent proceeding be inaugurated before the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Texas Railroad Commission jointly to test the merits of the Texas rates. Probabilities are that there will be no change in rates and that there is no likelihood of a change in present rates for many months to come, possibly not before next season."

## FRY NOTIFIED OF ELECTION

### W. T. C. OF C. DIRECTORATE

R. E. Fry this week received official notice from President A. B. Spencer of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that he was elected a Director of that organization at the recent Plainview Convention.

Mr. Spencer outlines the program of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for the next year as follows:

"We have during the next twelve months possibly the largest program the organization has yet undertaken. I am sending you under separate cover a copy of the April issue of "West Texas To-Day". The same contains a brief review of the work of the organization along irrigation, oil and gas, agricultural, livestock, and other lines. The continuation of this work must go on. The program hence is such continuation."

As a director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Mr. Fry is a member of the executive board that has in hand the determination of the policy that organization, the selection of its officers, and its general control.

## DEAD ANIMALS SHOULD BE DISPOSED OF PROMPTLY

The carcasses of dogs, hogs, chickens or other animals which die or are killed should not be left to putrefy as is the practice in some quarters in Floydada, City Marshal P. C. Bedford declares. "It is an easy matter to get notice to me so that I can notify the scavenger and have these carcasses removed before they become an eyesore," Mr. Bedford declared Tuesday. "My telephone number is 197. A call will get quick removal of the offending carcass, and it will be much better to have the carcass removed before complaints begin to come in."

People who kill stray dogs are particularly careless in notifying the city.

Mr. Bedford said, in comment on the situation.

## LOUIS MORRIS DEAD

Louis A. Morris, former resident of Floydada but for the past two years a resident of southern California, died at his home in Anaheim, Calif., on Sunday evening about eight o'clock, friends here were advised the first of the week by telegrams. His death was not unexpected. Tuberculosis was the immediate cause of death. It had been induced by an attack of influenza in the earlier part of this year.

Brief dispatches reaching Floydada did not indicate the date nor the place of burial. Since the major number of his relatives also reside at Anaheim it was expected that the burial will be held in a cemetery there.

L. A. Morris was about 28 years of age. He is survived by his wife and two young children. His wife is a sister of Mrs. W. G. Collins, of this city. His brother, W. L. Morris and his mother, Mrs. J. T. Morris, both of Anaheim, also survive him.

The deceased was reared from childhood at Floydada and had a wide acquaintance in this place.

## MANY P. O. SHAKEUPS IN TEXAS PLANNED FOR FALL

Mr. Briggs is one of the most widely-known newspapermen of the southwest having formerly been editor of the Texas Almanac, A. H. He declares that this section of the state certainly looks prosperous and furthermore that it has apparently been less hard hit than any other portion of the southwest during the period of deflation.

Mr. Briggs is of the belief that prices for farm products will be good comparatively speaking this fall.

## MUCH SMALL BUILDING ACTIVITIES AND IMPROVEMENTS

### Larger Expenditures in Business District Matched by Residence and Walk Improvements

Although Floydada has much building activity under way in the business district including five business houses of note, the larger construction work is being matched by an activity in residence sections of the town. Many improvements and betterments in residence property, more especially those which tend to add to the civic attractiveness of the community, are being made. For this work more than fifteen carloads of cement have been used, according to the estimate of local dealers, since the middle of February.

This substantial growth denotes a very healthy condition in the business of the community, these dealers aver. It is particularly notable in view of the many unsatisfactory reports which come from other sections of the county.

Carpenters and persons engaged in kindred building trades have had a busy season since the spring work got under way.

Among the minor improvements in the business districts, which nevertheless add much to the general appearance and betterment, is the work done at the Starks building which has required a few weeks and will be completed this week. The Snodgrass Gent's Furnishings and the Eubank Barber Shop have been badly torn up while the workmen under L. B. Maxey have been laying new concrete floors for the building. It is thought the work will be completed this week.

The Mitchell building on West California Street is having a new awning built with stucco columns and the whole is being administered a new coat of paint. Other property owners on the same block contemplate some work.

The McAdams Lumber Company, the Masonic Lodge, First State Bank, Barker Bros., Hesperian Pub. Co., and others are improving their property on West Missouri with additional concrete walks, curbs and gutters to better the drainage and general appearance of the street.

Many hundreds of feet of concrete walks have been laid in the residence district since early spring.

## BASEBALL GROUNDS WILL BE IMPROVED FOR GAMES

The grounds of the Floydada Baseball Park Association are being cleaned up in ship-shape this week, additions made in the form of players' dugouts, and the weeds cut in preparation for a season of playing by a local team made up of local boys.

**SECOND GIN WILL BE BUILT AT LOCKNEY SOON**

Vocational Training Added to Curriculum of School—Double Wedding Held

From The Beacon:  
Lockney has secured the second cotton gin, and work in the erection of building, etc., will be underway not later than July 1st.

Messrs. R. E. Patterson and A. H. Knox, of Denton County, are the men who will erect the gin. They were here this week, and have made all the necessary arrangements for the erection of the gin.

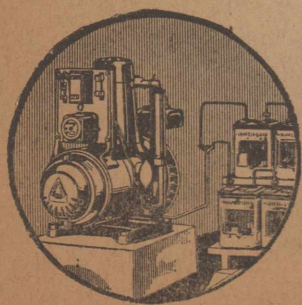

**AN ORDINANCE**

An ordinance of the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, fixing the water rates, providing for the payment thereof, and prescribing penalties in connection therewith, and repealing all ordinances in conflict therewith.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, that the following charges and rates for water in the City of Floydada are and here and now fixed as follows:

All consumers who use water are required to install a meter to be furnished by the City and the charge for such meter shall be a five dollar deposit to insure the city against loss in water accounts. The meter shall remain the property of the City.

To all such consumers the following rates are fixed:

Minimum \$1.50 for as much as 2,000 gallons.

Twenty-five cents per thousand gallons over 2,000 to 5,000 gallons.

Twenty-cents per thousand gallons for all used over 5,000 gallons.

SECTION 2. The tapping charge

for obtaining city water shall be twenty-two dollars and fifty cents on the cast iron mains and eighteen dollars on the two inch galvanized mains, payable at installation. The City is to furnish for this charge all tapping materials and run the line to the property line of the consumer or as far as sixty five feet but in no case further than sixty five feet.

SECTION 3. Where there is a branch line run off from a tap, the city regards each consumer a customer and payment for water from each user on said branches shall be at the rates above set forth. The party giving the right to others to tap with a branch line shall be liable for all water rents on the main tap.

SECTION 4. All bills for water furnished by the city to its consumers for the preceding month shall be due on the last day of the month following, and shall be paid by them at the office of the Collector by the tenth of the month following.

SECTION 5. If the amount due for the water furnished during the preceding month is not paid by the tenth of the following month, a penalty of ten per cent of the amount

due, shall be assessed in addition to said amount due and in the event the amount due together with the penalty be not paid by the 20th of the month following the water shall be cut off from such consumer so failing to pay such amounts due and penalty without further notice. And any consumer so cut off from the City water by reason of his or her failure to pay the amount due as herein provided desiring such water service resumed, shall make application to the City Waterworks Authorities, pay all delinquent amounts due together with penalties and the sum of \$1.00 before said water shall be furnished said consumer.

SECTION 6. All ordinances now in force, which are or may be in conflict either expressly or by implication with the provisions and terms of this ordinance are hereby now expressly repealed and declared null and void.

**AN ORDINANCE**

An ordinance to prohibit begging and soliciting donations, gifts, subscriptions Etc., and to prohibit persons from selling articles as agents or peddlars within the City limits without license, and providing a penalty.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Floydada that it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons to beg or solicit gifts or subscriptions of money or property within the limits of the City of Floydada, or to sell or offer to sell within the limits of said city, by canvassing from house to house or upon the streets, as agent or peddler, any article or articles of merchandise, or in like manner to solicit subscriptions to newspapers, magazines, or journals, without first having applied to the Mayor for a permit to engage in such business and having received such permit. It shall be a violation of this ordinance for any person to engage in any such business, either for himself or herself or for any other person or persons, or for any company or corporation, without first having applied for and received such permit. This ordinance shall not be construed to apply to the soliciting of funds for, or membership fees in, any local religious, social, business or charitable purpose or organization, such as churches, lodges, the Cemetery Association, the American Legion, the Commercial Club, and similar organizations. Any person found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of from \$1.00 to \$25.00, and each day that a person acts in violation hereof shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

This ordinance shall be and become effective from and after its passage and approval.

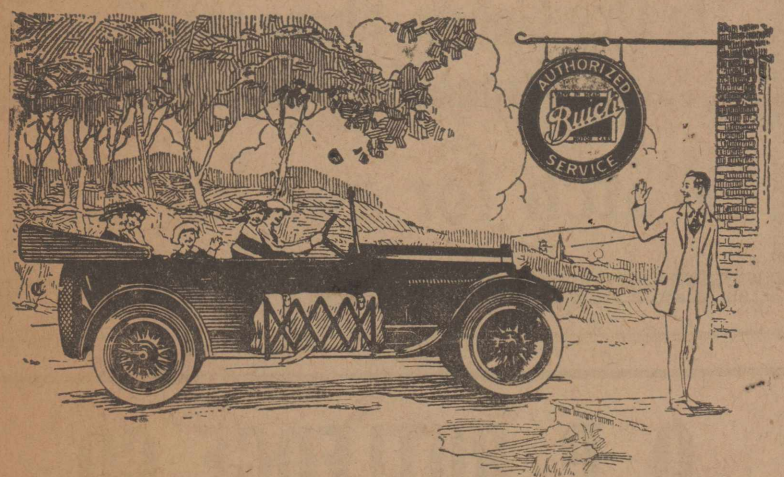

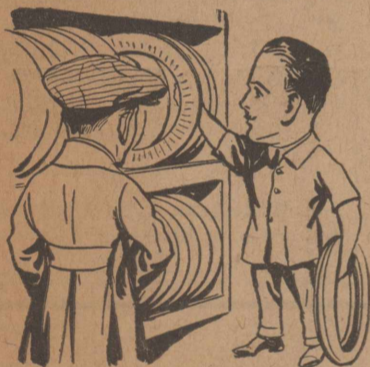
