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Editor Thomas, of the Childress Post, after fifty years of office-less existence, is a candidate at last. Very gladly we note, however, that Mr. Thomas' office, if he gets it, will be a non-paying one. In fact it is the office of county chairman of the Democratic Party to which he aspires. One which pays only in "grief" and on occasions "cussings." Newspaper men have no business with "entangling alliances" whatever, and if Editor Thomas feels that he just must have an office we are glad it is to be one in which there will be no emoluments which might cause his judgment to be warped.

Although Floydada has had a most substantial growth throughout the past ten years and even during the past year of depression many new residences have gone up, while a building program in the business district representing an outlay of more than \$50,000 is being carried out, The Hesperian cannot too strongly urge upon the citizens of Floydada that real growth into the proportions of a city to which we aspire will be impossible until we have a sewer system. Floydada is already grown to the point where a sewer system has been and is badly needed. The need grows with each day. Some of us do not realize just how much the lack of this city necessity is retarding the growth of Floydada.

The preponderance of Texas counties are not using the pledge adopted by the State Executive Committee of Texas under which all persons who voted any ticket other than the Democratic in the last general election would be barred from participation in the primaries this summer. The pledge which the state committee would have had adopted went even further than that. It would have barred any persons who "aided or gave comfort" to any other political party in the general election two years ago, other than the Democratic. To have placed such a pledge on the ballot would have made a herculean task for managers of election. In Floyd County, the county committee felt, such a pledge is unnecessary. Many other county committees evidently felt the same way.

As a practical matter it would be impossible, we imagine, to so arrange things that every voter in Floyd County who has the residence and citizenship qualifications, could have a say in the choice of the strictly county and district and precinct officers of the county. Any man other than a Democrat in Floyd County is barred from expressing his choice for the offices which are closest to him. As always a few of the more liberal Republicans and members of other parties will take part in the Democratic Primary simply in order to get to express themselves on the local races. Some two or three hundred good men in the county who cannot subscribe to the pledge set by the party, of course, remain out of the primary and are to all practical intents disfranchised. None

of the issues which we ordinarily consider of state or national import ever enter into a local race. The only way these men can ever make their influence felt in local politics (outside of city affairs) is for their parties to gain sufficient strength to make the county and precinct races a battle between political affiliations. This, it would seem, is not one of the probabilities of the immediate future. The unfairness of it is somewhat like the unfairness of taxing land and then taxing the vendor's lien notes against the land, though not as easy to remedy.

Another big railroad strike is now imminent. In fact, the vote of the men on the strike is now being taken. Those in close touch with the movement all express the opinion that a strike will be voted. What will happen after that is not known. Numbers of strikes have been voted that never occurred. There is a great deal of bluffing in these labor troubles and a man can never be sure what will happen until it happens. Sometimes the men and sometimes the companies yield enough to avert a crisis. Strikes are always bad things. They hurt the strikers severely, they hurt the companies and they generally hurt the public worst of all—Childress Post.

The cussedness of human nature is such that we are belabored with trials and tribulations continually. If we go fishing or weed cutting the chiggers bite us; if we get through a winter without freezing we get warning to lay in another winter's supply on account of a shortage that is sure to come; and then we always have with us the threat of a strike. However, we get off on the wrong foot sometimes, and especially is there danger of us doing so just at this time. The National Labor Board is giving out decisions right and left. The workmen are kicking like bay steers at the rulings which affect them and the railroad operators are kicking too. First one then the other refuses to take orders. And the refusal of the operators is as much a strike as the refusal of the workmen except that the latter go through the motions of voting to see whether they will strike. It's the dear public which is being ground between the upper and lower millstones. The grist is getting exceeding fine.

**6,000,000th FORD BUILT MAY 18th**

The six millionth Model "T" Ford Motor was produced May 18th, in the Ford Factory at Detroit. In other words, from the time back in 1908 when the Ford Motor Company began marketing the new famous Model "T" Motor Car until May 18th, 1922, a total of six million Ford cars and trucks have been produced. Out of this total 5,517,956 were delivered to purchasers in the United States alone, and according to the latest statistics, 4,478,248 of these Ford cars and trucks are still in daily service.

Thus, it will be seen that out of

every five Ford cars and trucks sold to retail purchasers in the United States alone during the past fourteen years, four are still in actual daily use, which is really remarkable when the hard service of commercial cars is taken into consideration. This seems to forcibly confirm the popular knowledge of the longevity of Ford cars.

That Ford products have been quite evenly distributed throughout the United States is borne out by the fact that through the sparsely settled communities in the West to the densely populated cities in the East, practically the same ratio of Ford cars and trucks to population exists.

Ohio leads with a total of 290,769 Ford cars and trucks in daily use; Illinois comes second; Pennsylvania third, Texas fourth, and Michigan fifth, with a total of 234,091. New York, Iowa and California follow in the order named, each having more than 200,000.

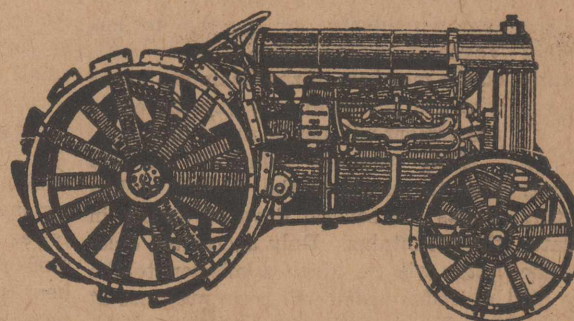

AMENDMENT MAKES ABSENTEE VOTING IN TEXAS EASIER

Austin, June 24.—From the number of inquiries being received by the Attorney General's Department, it is apparent that many voters in Texas are not cognizant of the amendment passed at the regular session of the Thirty-seventh Legislature to the absentee voting law. This amendment permits an absentee voter to vote through the assistance of a notary public.

Not more than 20 or less than 10 days before the date of an election the voter, according to this amendment, shall make his personal appearance before a notary public and deliver his poll tax receipt to that official, who shall send it to the county clerk in the county in which the elector resides. The county clerk, after verification of the poll tax receipt, shall mail to the elector one ballot which is not to be opened by the elector except in the presence of a notary public.

When this is done the elector casts his vote and it is sent by the notary public back to the county clerk of the county in which the elector resides. The county clerk on the day of the election sends the ballot to the judge of the precinct for which it is intended.

Will strawberries grow as big as apples and it come to pass that we'll buy them by the dozen like bananas instead of by the quart? It looks like that's coming if local Burbank's keep up their gait.

Strawberries must have originated in Floyd County because the crops raised in this country have never reached perfection until recent years when Floyd County soil began demonstrating. Now they have become so common in Floydada that the home without a strawberry patch has little standing in the community, as it were.

The latest reported apple-sized strawberry is from the garden of M. F. Hampton. The berry measured one and a fourth inches across the top and two and a fourth inches in circumference.

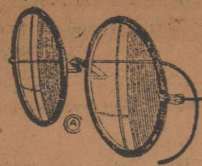

AN ORDINANCE

An ordinance of the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, fixing the water rates, providing for the payment thereof, and prescribing penalties in connection therewith, and repealing all ordinances in conflict therewith.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, that the following charges and rates for water in the City of Floydada are and here and now fixed as follows:

All consumers who use water are required to install a meter to be furnished by the City and the charge for such meter shall be a five dollar deposit to insure the city against loss in water accounts. The meter shall remain the property of the City.

To all such consumers the following rates are fixed:

Minimum \$1.50 for as much as 2,000 gallons.

Twenty-five cents per thousand gallons over 2,000 to 5,000 gallons.

Twenty-cents per thousand gallons for all used over 5,000 gallons.

SECTION 2. The tapping charge for obtaining city water shall be twenty-two dollars and fifty cents on the cast iron mains and eighteen dollars on the two inch galvanized mains, payable at installation. The City is to furnish for this charge all tapping materials and run the line to the property line of the consumer or as far as sixty five feet but in no case further than sixty five feet.

SECTION 3. Where there is a branch line run off from a tap, the city regards each consumer a customer and payment for water from each user on said branches shall be at the rates above set forth. The party giving the right to others to tap with a branch line shall be liable for all water rents on the main tap.

SECTION 4. All bills for water furnished by the city to its consumers for the preceding month shall be due on the last day of the month following, and shall be paid by them at the office of the Collector by the tenth of the month following.

SECTION 5. If the amount due for the water furnished during the preceding month is not paid by the tenth of the following month, a penalty of ten per cent of the amount due, shall be assessed in addition to said amount due and in the event the amount due together with the penalty be not paid by the 20th of the month following the "water" shall be cut off from such consumer so failing to pay such amounts due and penalty without further notice. And any consumer so cut off from the City water by reason of his or her failure to pay the amount due as herein provided desiring such water service resumed, shall make application to the City Waterworks Authorities, pay all delinquent amounts due together with penalties and the sum of \$1.00 before said water shall be furnished said consumer.

SECTION 6. All ordinances now in force, which are or may be in conflict either expressly or by implication with the provisions and terms of this ordinance are hereby now expressly repealed and declared null and void.

AN ORDINANCE

An ordinance to prohibit begging and soliciting donations, gifts, subscriptions etc., and to prohibit persons from selling articles as agents or peddlars within the City limits without license, and providing a penalty.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Floydada that it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or

persons to beg or solicit gifts or subscriptions of money or property within the limits of the City of Floydada, or to sell or offer to sell within the limits of said city, by canvassing from house to house or upon the streets, as agent or peddler, any article or articles of merchandise, or in like manner to solicit subscriptions to newspapers, magazines, or journals, without first having applied to the Mayor for a permit to engage in such business and having received such permit. It shall be a violation of this ordinance for any person to engage in any such business, either for himself or herself or for any other person or persons, or for any company or corporation, without first having applied for and received such permit. This ordinance shall not be construed to apply to the soliciting of funds for, or membership fees in, any local religious, social, business or charitable purpose or organization, such as churches, lodges, the Cemetery Association, the American Legion, the Commercial Club, and similar organizations. Any person found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of from \$1.00 to \$25.00, and each day that a person acts in violation hereof

shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

This ordinance shall be and become effective from and after its passage and approval.

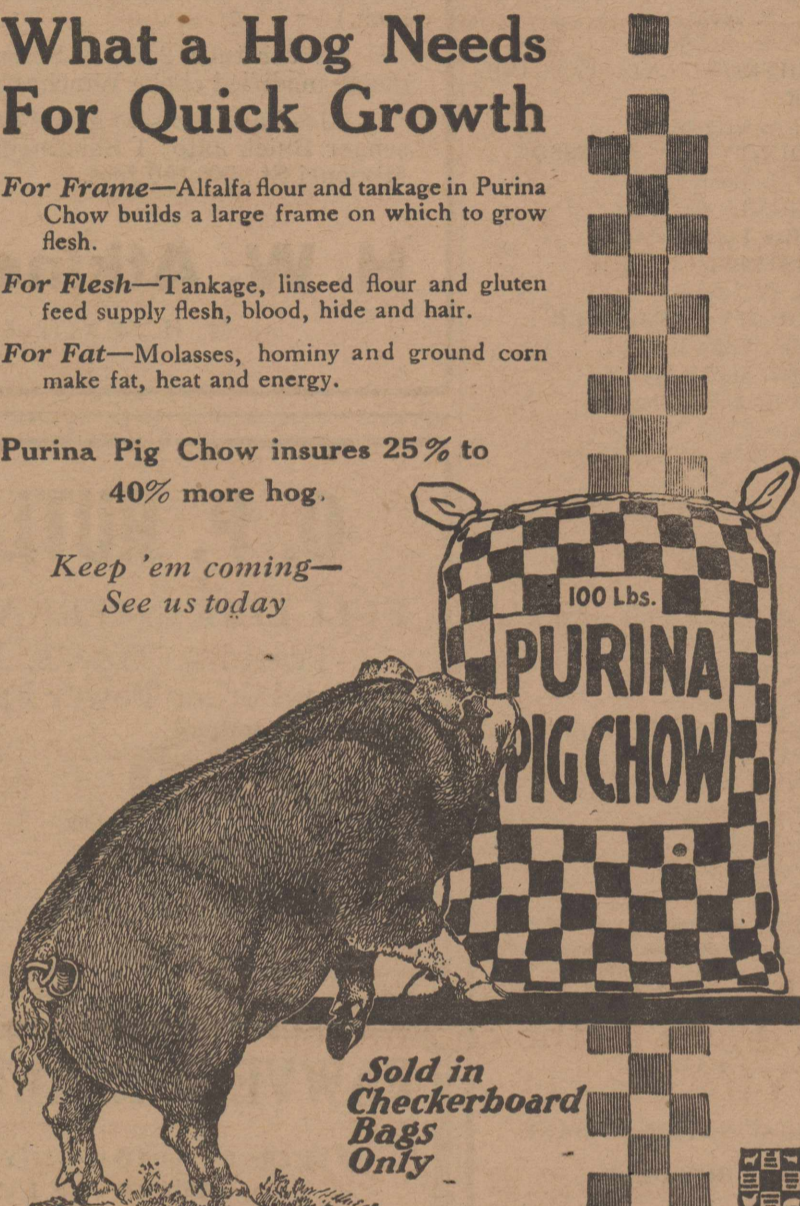

**NEWS OF PLAINVIEW**

**Yearwood Elevator to Handle Pooled Grain—Bob Fletcher Elected to New Mexico Office**

Plainview Herald:  
Possession of the municipal calaboose and \$8.00 in damages was awarded the City of Hale Center this morning by a jury in County Court in its suit against Joe Lee Ferguson of that city. The calaboose was built in 1912 on a lot owned by Mr. Ferguson. The defense testimony showed that the defendant had had possession of the building since January 1, 1913. He claimed the building, by statute of limitations and by agreement.

In February of this year, Mr. Ferguson loaded the jail on his wagon and taking it to his ranch in Lamb county, began using it as a granary. Judge L. D. Griffin ruled that the statute of limitations applies to individuals but that it does not apply to cities, towns or villages. The defense attorney, Judge E. Graham, sought to show wherein the State Supreme Court had ruled that it does apply to municipalities.

Another angle of the case was developed by the fact that when the jail house was built, the City of Hale Center was not incorporated, in fact, it was not incorporated until in the summer of 1921. The question arose, as to whether the incorporated city had inherited the jail building from the unincorporated city. Judge Griffin ruled that it did inherit the building; that the two were in fact the same.

The Plainview Equity Union has been transformed into the Farmers' Grain Company, and a lease contract has been made by that company for the Yearwood Elevator, which they will operate this year, and through which the pool of wheat will be marketed by the Plainview Wheat Growers' Association.

There are seventy two Plainview wheat growers in this association. H. E. Clark is president; H. V. Tull is secretary; R. B. Mitchell and J. D. Hatchell are other members of the Board of directors, and Albin Holmgren is the vice-president.

Bob Fletcher, well known in Plainview, has been elected county treasurer of Chaves county, New Mexico, by a majority of 400 votes according to a telegram from Bob to relatives in Plainview. Roswell is the county seat of Chaves county.

Bob is a veteran of the world war, having lost both limbs while participating with the 36th Division in the fighting in the Champagne vicinity.

Wheat harvesting in Hale County has begun. While the acreage this year is cut down to at least one-third that of last year, the yield, according to reported estimates, is fair on the average.

The first wheat of the new season to be marketed in Plainview was raised by Debs McLaughlin, who lives south of town.

And just as soon as arrangements can be completed to extend the water mains, about six miles more of sewer will be laid. The total expenditure at this time will be about \$25,000. The work is to be started in the next ten days and rushed to early completion.
