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LAW ENFORCEMENT

Tales of how the long arm of the law reaches out in the dominions of Great Britain and brings back the criminals, especially those guilty of bloodshed, have furnished entertainment for many thousands of people. That these stories are based on a truth is well known. Two interesting stories recently told furnish sidelights on the execution of the law in the Dominion of Canada. Recently an Eskimo, living a thousand miles north of the ordinary habitats of man, committed a crime. He was convicted and given ten year in a penitentiary near Ottawa. Now the eskimo is petitionig to be sent to a penitentiary further north where his health will be better. He can't get good old blubber to eat in sufficient quantities at Ottawa, and the warm, soggy climate, he says, is also undermining his constitution.

Another more tragic tale is told of a commissioner of the Northwest Mounted, who was headed for the cold lands above Hudson Bay to do an execution, an inhabitant of that section having been condemned to die. The commissioner never reached his destination. Either he became ill or the exposure was too great, his body being found several weeks after the time for the execution, at any rate. FLOYD COUNTY 80-ACRE FARM NETS BIG RETURN

A big net return from farming operations on an 80-acre irrigated farm three miles north of Aiken, was realized in 1923 by Allen Dew, who has become a thorough believer in Floyd County soil.

Mr. Dew had 8 acres of cotton from which he realized \$1,600, 35 acres of maize from which he realized \$1,600, on the basis of two tons per acre, and 8 acres of corn from which he gathered 45 pushels per acre. The corn he has not sold but the other two items have been turned into cash, and Mr. Dew still has the other products of his farm for use in living at home, including quite a bit of sudan and alfalfa, the latter seeded out last spring.

The irrigation costs were 90 cents per acre for each irrigation. The cotton he irrigated three times and the corn and maize two times.
