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WOODROW WILSON

Whether or not one admires Woodrow Wilson as a political leader and a war president, it must be admitted that with the death of this wonderful man something has been taken from the life of America, something as tangible as was the loss of Theodore Roosevelt. In fact, it is doubtful that if ever so quiet a man, with such reserve, made such an impression on any country's life at a critical time as has Woodrow Wilson.

Woodrow Wilson's power was in his brain cells. He had some unlikeable personal traits, it is declared by some men who have been close to him. He carried his points by cold logic and yet he had a deep yearning for the democratic masses at large, as is indicated by the efforts he made to avoid the war and later by his efforts to distribute the costs of the war, in human life, as well as materially, to all levels of American life.

Woodrow Wilson's tragic collapse before the close of his last term as president was a forerunner of an early demise. It took one of America's greatest forces from the political life of the country, and this week the last mortal remains of the War President are being laid to rest.

But Mr. Wilson's life leaves an indelible stamp on the social and political life of the country. In the future, although he was a war president, the greatest thing to be ascribed to his memory, we think, will be the influence for unselfish service, to which thought he was a willing martyr.

LE MIRAGE

During the pretty days of the latter part of last week the works of "Le Mirage" were simply grand, the early morning paintings on the horizon's "ten league canvas" furnishing for those who were up with the early dawn, pictures as beautiful as any ever seen on canvas.

In this level stretch of country, where the horizon is marked only by the limit of one's vision the distances to which one may see when Mirage holds the brush are truly remarkable to the uninitiated. For instance, if one says that early last Friday morning one could stand in the streets of Floydada and see the south side of Blanco Canyon seven miles away, although the canyon is not visible ordinarily at a distance greater than a mile, so smooth is the country right up to its rim, it would not be so difficult to believe. But if one says that Tule Canyon 40 miles or more distant was also plainly visible, almost to the bottom of the gorge, and that the resident of Floydada is often furnished a bird's eye view of Plainview or Tullis, not to mention our next door neighbor Lockney, without ever going to the trouble of doing more than stepping to the door of his home, then the incredulous might begin to raise an unbelieving eyebrow. However, many's the time this can be done in the course of a year, and many are the residents of this section who can testify to the fact.

LEGION MEN ARE MAD

About 60 per cent of the members of the American Legion members of the United States are hopping mad, and the other 40 per cent are not exactly pleased with the route opponents of the adjusted compensation for ex-service men are taking to defeat the measure. Among the leading public men who are fighting adjusted compensation are Secretary Mellon, and Nicholas Longworth. Mellon is secretary of the treasury and Longworth is Republican whip in the House. The 60 per cent who are mad favor adjusted compensation for ex-service men and the 40 per cent do not. Even the latter, however, are warming up and may get in the fight for compensation just on general principles. So far as precedent is concerned the Revolutionary War and the Civil War both offer plenty of precedents for the payment of a bonus, so-called, so that this phase of the subject offers no matter for argument.

It is a matter of general information, and a part of the governmental records in Washington, that Secretary Mellon informed President Harding in the fall of 1922 that the treasury could not pay the money required to handle the bonus. The president based his veto message largely on Secretary Mellon's figures. There would be a deficit, Mr. Mellon said, at the end of the fiscal year on June 30, 1923, of about \$660,000,000—more than the ordinary mortal can conceive. When June 30 rolled around the deficit had turned to a surplus of about \$323,000,000. The difference between a deficit of \$660,000,000 and a surplus of \$323,000,000 is \$983,000,000. The ex-service men, with very good reason, say that the richest man in America did not make a billion dollar mistake. They say Mr. Mellon just plain misrepresented.

The American Legion Weekly, official organ of the American Legion, gives space to an article by Aaron Sapiro, apostle of co-operative marketing, and leading counsel of the American Legion, which says these things and more. That America can pay its ex-service men an adjusted compensation of liberal proportions and reduce taxes, too, is the argument made with a great deal of plausibility.

From very limited knowledge of the matter, The Hesperian is convinced of two things. One is that a large majority of the ex-service men think they are entitled to adjusted compensation; the other is that adjusted compensation can be paid and tax reduction effected at the same time.

We think as much of the ex-service men now as we did in 1918. We are not convinced that there is any great principal involved in the matter. But the fact that the boys want adjusted compensation is enough for us. It puts us in the column in favor of them having it.

A POSITIVE CLIMATE

The weather of Sunday and Monday when Floyd County had a little of everything and a lot of wind with it furnishes proof that the "climate in Floyd County is positive," as advertised by the Chamber of Commerce.

It is true enough that the weather in West Texas is not fitted to the needs of hot house plants, especially since it is a new country and does not have some of the conveniences that go with an older developed country. Sunday the Iowan could have come to this section of Texas and have felt perfectly at home. The wind blew and the snow fell with much force for a time. The only thing lacking for the Iowan would have been a little lower temperature. He would have had to remove some of his heavy clothing, perhaps, to keep from getting too warm. Otherwise he would have been suited exactly.

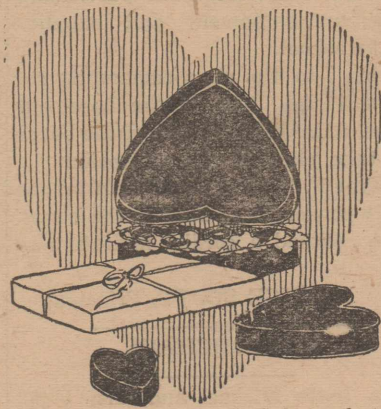

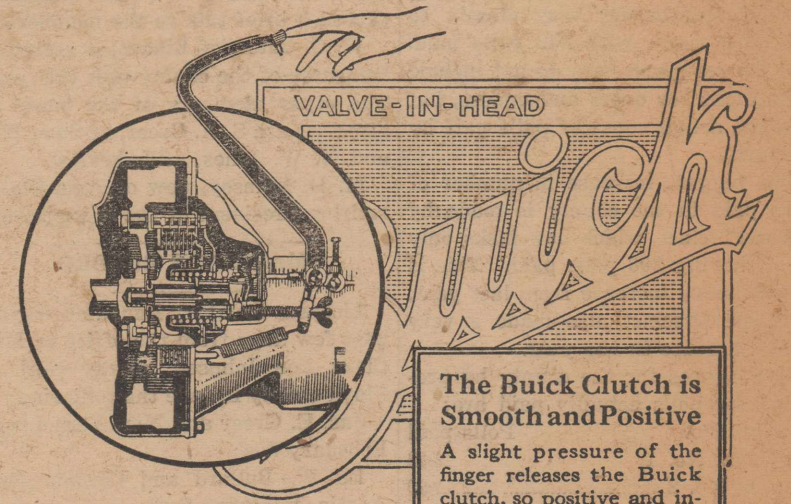

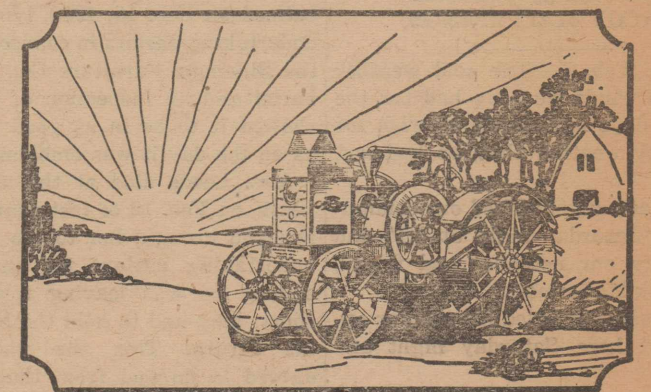

563 CHILDREN WEIGHED AND EXAMINED IN 5 DISTRICTS

A total of 563 children of the public schools of Floydada, Sand Hill, Baker, Harmony and Center School Districts, were weighed and examined during the stay of Miss Alva Morrow, Nutrition Specialist, with the Floyd County Chapter, Red Cross, who is this week closing her work here.

Figures on her work have been compiled and are being made a part of the records of the local chapter, as are the figures for the work done three years ago by Miss Katherine Mitchell.

The examinations conducted were for physical defects, and specialists were called in for examinations of eyes and teeth. Perhaps the outstanding information gained from the examinations conducted is the large number of children whose teeth or gums need attention.

Figures for all the districts named show that the per centages run somewhat in a uniform ratio.

WORK WITH CERTIFIED SEED STRESSED IN MOTION PICTURE

"Better Seed—Better Crops" is the title of a New United States Department of Agriculture motion picture which tells the story of "crop-improvement" work as it is being carried on in various States through the medium of certified seed. The film was made in cooperation with the Michigan Agricultural College.

The pictures tell the story of Bill Taylor, who found the growing of poor wheat unprofitable and couldn't understand how some of his neighbors could produce bumper crops while his hardly paid the cost of planting. Bill made some inquiries and was told about the crop improvement work.

The scenes carry the audience to the State experiment farm where is shown the actual working out of the certi-

fied seed plan. Bill is told how the seed is handled, and in the end he climbs on the band wagon and sows his acres with certified seed.

"Better Seed—Better Crops" is in one reel. It may be borrowed for short periods from the department, or prints may be bought by authorized purchasers at the manufacturing charge.

CITATION BY PUBLICATION

The State of Texas,
To the Sheriff or any Constable of Floyd County—Greeting:
You are hereby commanded, that you summon, by making publication of this citation in some newspaper published in the county of Floyd if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in the nearest county where a newspaper is published once each week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return day hereof, S. H. Dollahite, his unknown heirs and legal representatives whose residence is unknown, to be and appear before the Hon. District Court, at the next regular term thereof, to be held in the County of Floyd, at the Court House thereof, in Floydada on the 3rd day of March, A. D. 1924, then and there to answer a Petition filed in said Court, on the 19th day of Jan., A. D. 1924, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court No. 1592, wherein A. E. Johnson is plaintiff, and S. H. Dollahite, his unknown heirs and legal representatives are defendants.

The nature of the plaintiffs demand being as follows, to-wit: Plaintiff comes now and shows to the court that on the 1st day of January, A. D. 1924, that he was lawfully seized and possessed of the following described land and premises, claiming the same in fee simple, to-wit: All that certain lot, tract or parcel of land, situated in Floyd County, Texas, being Lot No. 18, in Block No. 93, as shown by the official plat of Floyd City, of record in deed records of Floyd County, Texas, Vol. 2F, page 294. That on the day and year aforesaid, defendants unlawfully entered upon said premises and ejected plaintiff therefrom; and defendants unlawfully withhold from plaintiff the possession thereof, to his damage in the sum of \$800.00.

Houghton and wife Bertha Houghton dated March 7, 1913, recorded in deed records Floyd County, in Vol. 34, page 61, that each of defendants herein are setting up some claim to the land and premises above

described, the nature of which is unknown to plaintiff.

Wherefore, premises considered, plaintiff prays that the defendants, and each of them be cited by publication in the manner prescribed by law to appear and answer this petition; and that upon final trial hereof plaintiff have judgment for his said land and premises with his writ of restitution confirming his title to the land and premises with his writ of restitution and that it be decreed that the defendants and each of them have no right, title, interest or claim in or to said land or premises or any part thereof; and that all clouds cast upon his title to said land and premises by reason of the pretended claim of defendants be cancelled and removed and that he be forever quieted in his title to and possession of said land and premises, and for such other and further relief, to which he may be entitled, either in law or in equity.

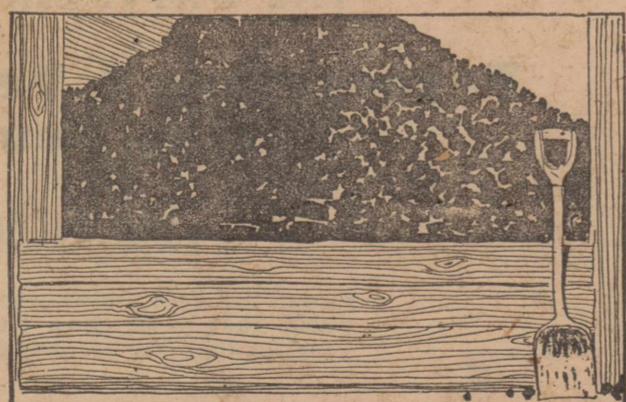
