 It takes more than a house to mak a beautiful building to make an at tractive place. A simple cottage o bungalow beautified with shrubbery trees, grass and flowers is far moreattractive and homey in appearance than the most luxurious and costly mansion without these plantings. It is positively pitiful to see th many homes that are without plant ings of any kind. Such places ma but in the cities and towns as well When one can so easily and so inex pensively beautify these bare places with a small amount of shrubbery and trees ,grass and flowers, it is nothing
short of a calamity for done.
Everyone Likes Beautiful Grounds It is true that one may live just as long in a home that is not properly
beautified beautified with trees, shrubbery, etc. the most out of life. It matters not how little beauty may mean to some people, the person never breathed who would not think more of a home properly beautified with, trees, shrubbery etc., than one built out in the open,
with nothing in the way of shrubber and grass to tie it to old mother earth We would therefore make an earnes plea that the home grounds be planted Do it now, as this planting work ca
be done any or early spring before buds in ther plants begin to swell.
Many people imagine that it is very expensive to properly plant the hom grounds. We believe this is one of
the outstanding reasons why so many homes are not planted. It is a mistake to think that a large amount of money is necessary to beautify the hom
grounds. Of course much money may be spent for this purpose if one has large grounds and wishes an elaborat planting. But the small home or eve the large one, may be properly plant ed with trees, shrubbery, etc., at price that
everyone. appearance by the planting of only $\$ 5$ to $\$ 10$ worth of shrubbery and tree about the place. True, more than this
