But our eelction machinery at this time is functioning in a way to permit such an attempt to get considerable headway during any closely contested election where one faction has control in a particular section at the polls.—Dallas News.

It might pay us, however, to "tighten up" all along the line and avoid a scandal that would ruin some good man.

First Calculation of

The first determination of the velocity of light was made by Romer in 1676. The method was based upon the observation of the eclipses of Jupiter's satellites, phenomena of frequent recurrence and easy of observation.

Assuming that light requires time wherein to move from place to place through space, says the Detroit News, the interval between successive eclipses would appear too short when the earth is approaching Jupiter and too long when the earth is receding therefrom.

Romer found in his observations that such was the case, and that the interval was conditioned by the rate of speed at which the earth changed places relatively with Jupiter. From these constants Romer computed that light expended about 161/2 minutes in crossing the earth's orbit. From this is deduced a velocity of 186,-000 miles a second.
