

\$100,000 ROAD BOND ELECTION JUNE 4th

Commissioners Consider Issuance Necessary if Road Work is Continued, Clark Says

The Commissioners' Court of Floyd County Tuesday afternoon entered an order on their minutes calling for a road bond election to be held on Saturday, June 4th at all election boxes in the county to determine whether the property taxpaying voters of the county desire an issue of \$100,000 in road bonds.

The decision to call the election was reached by the court, Judge Clark said Tuesday, after every means had been exhausted by the court in an effort to borrow money to continue the work without the bond issue. By means of the issue, members of the court declare it will be possible to pay outstanding indebtedness against the road and bridge fund (not including bridge warrants) and give a working fund to carry out a two-year program. Otherwise it will be necessary, they declare, to stop road work in the county and wait until next year to continue. According to figures made by Mr. Rainer, of Precinct 4, the bond issue bearing 6 per cent interest, will be discounted by bond buyers, who have offered to take the issue, a sufficient amount to make the bonds bring 7 per cent interest. After deducting this amount and approximately \$30,000 for outstanding indebtedness against this fund, about \$60,000 will be left with which to continue the work of building roads in the county. It is the plan, he said to scatter this over a period of approximately 20 or 24 months. The issue will relieve the general fund of the heavy transfers which have been necessary every year for a number of years, and will obviate the necessity of increasing valuations in this county which are now a considerable percentage above valuation in neighboring counties he says.

The order of the court was issued following the presentation of a petition from more than 50 people from various parts of the county.

B. B. PIERCE VICTIM OF HEART FAILURE FRIDAY

B. B. Pierce, for the past year a resident of Floydada, died suddenly last Friday morning of heart failure, while convalescing from an operation for appendicitis, within a few minutes after discussing plans with his father-in-law to return home that day. Having made very rapid recovery from an operation from which he had suffered little pain, his sudden death came as a great shock to his family.

The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at three o'clock at the First Baptist Church, conducted by Rev. Harlan J. Matthews, of Plainview, formerly pastor of the family at another place. Following the funeral interment was made in Floydada Cemetery.

Deceased was 28 years of age, and leaves a wife and little son. He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. S. B. Griffith and Miss Leola Pierce, both of Tulsa, Oklahoma. These sisters and a sister of Mrs. Pierce, Mrs. G. H. McCraw, of Ardmore, Oklahoma, were here for the funeral services.

Mr. Pierce was a native of Oklahoma, having lived at Sanger and Gainesville a number of years before coming to Floydada. During his residence here he was with The Hesperian as floor man, leaving his job a week before his death to have the operation for appendicitis.

BAKER PEOPLE TO DISCUSS NEW SCHOOL HOUSE PLANS

Baker School District some two years ago voted bonds for the construction of a much needed brick school building, and during the elapsed time have been awaiting reduced prices of materials before proceeding with their work.

In order to get the sentiment of the community fully the board of school trustees, of which Geo. L. Fawver is president, has issued a request for a meeting of the patrons at the Baker School house at two o'clock on Friday, May 6th, to discuss the matter. "We want to go about the new building in the wisest way," Mr. Fawver said Monday speaking of the meeting, "and we want everybody's opinion so that we can settle on a policy. Whether we will go ahead and build as much as our bond issue will permit, or whether we will add to this amount by private subscriptions or donations and build a larger building, is one of the things to be decided."

The school district is badly in need of the enlarged building, and it is expected that considerable interest will be taken in the meeting and a large attendance will be there.

ALL VARIETIES OF TIME IN VOGUE IN FLOYDADA

Any variety of time you happen to be "carrying" is altogether all right, and in vogue in Floydada. Confusion unlimited has resulted from the fact that practically all the railroads operating in this section of the state affected by the change have chosen their own time and each a separate one, to make their changes. The Interstate Commerce Commission, in issuing the order for the change set no definite date for the change and accordingly each road has chosen its own convenience. Many people have set up their time to agree with Central Time while about an equal number are still using Mountain Time.

On May 1st the Santa Fe will change its time and all those who have not as yet "moved up" an hour will do so at this time.

Local Agent J. M. Hughes, of the Santa Fe, announced yesterday that the time change at Santa Fe points will be effective May 1st, Sunday. After that time under the time change Floydada's morning train will leave at 7 o'clock instead of 6 o'clock.

NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR COUNTY ROAD BOND ISSUE

The State of Texas, County of Floyd. Be it remembered that on this the 26th day of April, 1921, the Hon. Commissioners' Court of Floyd County met in special session, at which meeting there were present the following: W. B. Clark, County Judge. J. L. King, Com. Prec. No. 1. J. B. Teaff, Com. Prec. No. 2. Earl Rainer, Com. Prec. No. 3. And Lola Walling, Clerk, when among other proceedings the following were had, viz:

WHEREAS, the County Commissioners' Court of the County of Floyd and State of Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of said county for the purpose hereinafter stated: THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of said County that an election be held on the 4th day of June, 1921, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of the County of Floyd be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars, payable in twenty years after date, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent (6 per cent) per annum, payable on April 10, 1922, and semi-annually thereafter and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of improving and maintaining the public roads in Floyd County, under the authority of Article 610 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas.

Said election shall be held at the following named places in said County:

Floydada; Starkey; Allmon; Sandhill; Lockney; Providence; Lone Star; Sunset; Fairmont; Cedar; Center; Baker; Antelope; Lakeview; Meteor; And the following named persons are hereby appointed Managers of said election:

S. E. Duncan, Floydada, No. 1. J. W. Howard, Starkey, No. 2. G. W. deCordova, Allmon, No. 3. J. E. Riley, Sandhill, No. 4. Wm. McGehee, Lockney, No. 5.

WOOL POOL CONTRACTS SIGNED BY WOOL GROWERS

A number of Floyd County wool growers signed the wool growers contract promulgated by the Farm Bureau Federation at a meeting held in the District Court Room at Floydada last Monday afternoon, at which W. T. Magee, sheep specialist from A. & M. College and Leslie Elliott, president of the Bell County Farm Bureau were visitors and set out the plans under which the wool would be handled.

Pooling the wool under a central selling agency is the essence of the plan, and under which the growers at the meeting Monday will sell. Only one wool grower present, it was stated, did not sign the contract, which runs for a period of five years.

J. E. Bogg-Scott, was unable to be at the meeting, as announced. The Farm Bureau Federation, so far as a local organization is concerned, was not gone into but the plans and purposes were discussed at length.

RAT KILLING CAMPAIGN

Lakeview still has the lead in the rat killing campaign staged by the Chamber of Commerce, the count this week giving the boys of that community an increased lead over their nearest competitor, the Allmon boys. Lakeview's boys have a total of 840 to their credit, Allmon 360 and Center is third with 267.

F. C. HARMON BUYS FURNITURE DEPARTMENT MITCHELL BROS.

F. C. Harmon, for the past three years a member of the firm of Mitchell Bros., extensive hardware and furniture dealers of this city, has bought the furniture and undertaking department of this business, according to announcement made the latter part of last week.

The business under the new management will remain in the same location. Mr. Harmon will give it his entire attention beginning sometime during the next week.

RURAL SCHOOLS ARE PLANNING TO BUILD SOON

At least four of Floyd County's 32 rural school districts have plans under way for the construction of new school buildings in the near future. Others are considering the advisability of building new school houses.

When the war broke out there was a stopping of construction work of a public nature, to a large extent and many school districts which really wanted to build have awaited the return of more nearly normal times. Starkey, Cedar and Baker are some of the districts that have the building ideas, which will very likely develop into very creditable buildings within the next 12 months.

Chas. G. Speed, of Clarendon, is among the contractors who are figuring on these jobs. Mr. Speed was here the latter part of last week in company with J. F. Duck, formerly of this place, but who now resides at Brice in Swisher County.

LAST NUMBER ON LYCEUM COURSE GETS GOOD CROWD

The Musical Arts Quartette, a male organization, presented the last number of the 1920-21 season for the Floydada Lyceum Committee Wednesday night of last week at the High School Auditorium.

The quartette did both song and instrumental numbers, and were greeted by a full house.

Secretary Geo. A. Linder, preceding the entertainment, gave a brief financial statement of the lyceum committee, in which it was shown that the committee would carry into next season a balance of \$200, after an expenditure of about \$100 had been made out of the fund for improvements at the high school building.

This represents a slight accumulation from previous years, he said, and includes proceeds from the past year.

The response to the request for pledges for the 1921-22 program already booked at a considerably increased cost, was liberal, and Mr. Linder believes that the support pledged will make next year's higher-priced program self-sustaining.

NEXT C. OF C. MEETING EVENING OF MAY 6th

The next meeting of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce will be held on the evening of May 6th, the most important matter to be discussed at this meeting to be the proposal that the Floyd County Fair be put on a basis of permanent organization. A committee composed of J. I. Hammonds, A. D. White, I. D. Gamble, W. M. Massie and R. F. Brown are working out the details of a plan and are expected to be able to report at that time.

The funds raised by the special committee composed of R. F. Brown, N. W. McCleskey, R. E. Fry and W. M. Massie in the name of the Chamber of Commerce to pay off old indebtedness of the fair, has been disbursed to holders of indebtedness against the fair, and the slate thus cleaned ready for constructive work on a permanent basis.

The barbecue planned to be held in the afternoon or evening of May 3rd has been postponed by the committee because of the possibility of its conflicting with the meeting now in progress. Definite announcements will be made later about it, Irvin Bishop, chairman of the committee, said this morning.

SPRING OF '49 EVEN MORE FORWARD THAN

The spring of 1921 will doubtless down in the annals of folklore and records of the government agencies as the "earliest" in more than two decades past, but there was once a spring in this country even more forward. This was the spring of '49, and few there are who remember it. One of these few is John Montgomery, of Rome, Ga., a brother of Col. Thomas Montgomery, owner and manager of the TMB Ranch southeast of Floydada. In a recent letter, a portion of which we reprint by permission, this Georgia brother of Mr. Montgomery says:

"On the 16th of April, 72 years ago (1849) we had a spring even more forward than this, in which corn was half leg to knee high, wheat in the boot, leaves half grown in the forest. I here came a freeze that killed everything including many trees in the forest. Corn had to be planted over, wheat fell down but succored out and headed out but made it so late that rust struck it and grain was so shriveled up it would not make flour at all. But some little was cut and used for seed, which made good wheat the next season."

Mr. Montgomery is in the wholesale grocery and cotton business at Rome. His town was in the path of one of the hurricanes during the recent disturbance which covered some five or six states, including portions of Texas. No one was killed at Rome, but several were injured. Considerable damage was done. "I had a pretty narrow escape," the letter recites. "Had been sitting by the window two minutes before the blow came, but had just stepped to the desk to do some writing when the crash came," which blew out the plate glass in the Montgomery office. "Had I not moved would doubtless been struck by at least a portion of the glass and probably seriously hurt."

Several walls were blown down near the brother's place of business.

John Montgomery is an elder brother of the citizen of this county, being 81 years of age. He is actively engaged in the conduct of his business.

"Pioneer Days in the Southwest" is the title of a book recently secured by the Panhandle Historical Society. The volume contains thrilling descriptions of buffalo hunting, Indian fights and massacres, cowboy life, and home-building during the period from 1850

to 1879. Two or three characteristic chapters will introduce us to the contents.

In the first chapter is a brief account of the work of Mr. Charles Goodnight, who was the first settler in the Panhandle, and who has played such an important part in the development of this section. The chapter closes with an account of the Goodnight plan to preserve to Texas and the nation a few of the Panhandle buffaloes. The winter of '77 and '78 closed out forever the great herds; only a few scattering bunches were left. Mr. Goodnight captured four buffalo calves and conveyed them to the ranch. Each was adopted by a milk cow. They soon became tame and were allowed to run with their adopted mothers on the range with the other milk stock. "Here," says Emanuel Dubbs, "was the beginning of the present Goodnight herd which has preserved to Texas this noble animal and has made the Goodnight ranch famous."

Another chapter of special interest is that in which Mr. Dubbs recounts his experience at Adobe Walls, Lelia Lake, and at a point near Clarendon (the confluence of Barton Creek and the Sadler.) The most harrowing experience of this period was his return to camp, at the place last mentioned, to find the naked body of one of his men thrown across a wagon tongue that had been elevated by putting under one end of it an ox yoke. An examination of the body revealed the fact that the man had been tortured to death. The savages had driven splinters under the skin and set fire to them.

The County organization of this time reveals the vastness of the sparsely settled Panhandle territory. In 1879 Wheeler County was organized and Mr. Dubbs was elected County

Judge. Wheeler then had attached to it for judicial purposes 26 other counties.

Mr. Dubbs closes his reminiscent account of these early experiences with the following significant prophecy: "I desire to add in conclusion that this great country, the Panhandle of Texas, which was virtually reclaimed from savagery and opened up to settlement by buffalo hunters and pioneers, will team with thousands of happy homes, whose occupants will once in a while give a kind thought to the memory of those who braved so many dangers, blazing the way for future progress and greatness."

Senate Joint Resolution No. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and permitting either the husband or the wife to pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

SEC. 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

SEC. 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Sat. in July, 1921, at which all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting." And all those opposed to said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, "Against the amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting."

SEC. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution, and existing laws of the State.

SEC. 4. That the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby apportioned out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise apportioned to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 11

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (\$7.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purpose, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment, and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 51: The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever, provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers, sailors, and their widows, who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1910, and their widows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this State since January 1, 1910, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under special laws of the State of Texas during the war between the states served in organization for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas who were in active service during the war between the states and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this Section shall not apply to women born since the year 1861, and all soldiers and sailors

and widows of soldiers and sailors eligible under the above conditions shall be entitled to be placed upon the pension rolls and participate in the distribution of the pension fund of this State under any existing law or laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas seven (\$7.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied, and provided further that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity.

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which all voters shall have printed or written on their ballots: "For amendment of Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows who have been a resident of this State since January 1, 1910," and "Against amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers and their widows."

SEC. 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general funds of this State not otherwise appropriated for expenses of publications and elections thereunder.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 30

Relating to the amending of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the prison system under the supervision, management and control of such officer or officers as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

SEC. 2. The above constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "For the amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "Against the Amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

SEC. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

SEC. 4. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4

A Joint Resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas amending Sections of the Constitution of the State of Texas as follows: Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4, relating to the compensation of executive officers; and Section 24, Article 3, relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature; of said State.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4, and Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. He shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary not to exceed Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture.

Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same, and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, and no more.

Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold his office for two years; and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all

suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and, from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power, or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, toll, freight, or wharfage, not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of all such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor or other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary not to exceed Seven Thousand Five Hundred (\$7,500.00) Dollars, and no more.

Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, shall each hold office for the term of two years, and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary not to exceed Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, and no more; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office; and perform such other duties as are or may be required of him by law. They and the Sec. of State shall not receive to their own use, any fees, costs or prerequisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section, or in his office, shall be paid, when received into the State Treasury.

Section 24. Mileage and per diem: The Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time, be provided by law, not exceeding Ten (\$10.00) Dollars per day for each regular session of one hundred and twenty days; and not exceeding five (\$5.00) Dollars per day for the remainder of such session; and provided, further, that Members of the Legislature shall receive not to exceed Ten (\$10.00) Dollars per day for each special session of the Legislature that may be called from time to time by the Governor. In addition to the compensation above provided for, the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government which mileage shall be ten cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct travel by land regardless of railways and water route; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and such table the mileage of each Member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session.

SEC. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which election these amendments shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the Constitution and laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the general election laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words:

"OFFICIAL BALLOT." "For the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for compensation of executive officers." "Against the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers."

"OFFICIAL BALLOT." "For the amendment of Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature of the State of Texas." "Against the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature of the State of Texas."

Those voters who favor such amendments shall erase by marking a line through the words "against the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for compensation of executive officers." Those who oppose such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "for the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election; and

Those voters who favor such amendment relating to mileage and per diem of members of the Legislature shall erase by marking through the words "Against the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of the members of the Legislature of the State of Texas." Those who oppose such amendment relating to mileage and per diem of members of the Legislature shall erase by marking through the words "for the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of the members of the Legislature of the State of Texas." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast at such election.

SEC. 3. If a majority of the votes cast in the election herein provided for should be in favor of the amendments proposed, the maximum sum named herein shall become effective and be the compensation thereafter to be received by the officials named therein on and after the first day of January, 1923, and so remain until otherwise provided by law, and the compensation so allowed shall be paid out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

SEC. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the

Treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of these amendments and the election to be held hereunder. (A True Copy) S. L. STAPLES, Secretary of State.

**USE CARE IN FEEDING CHICKS
SAYS CIRCULAR NO. 25**

R. M. Sherwood, Poultry Husbandman, Division Animal Industry, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, A. & M. College, College Station, Texas, in Circular 25, just issued, gives the following terse advice on feeding chicks:

"A large number of chicks are lost every year because they are fed too much the first week. They should be fed when 36 to forty-eight hours old, with a little grit and a small amount of hard boiled egg mixed with rolled oats or bread crumbs and should be given all the milk they wish to drink. The second day, add to the grain feed, a small amount of bran mixture. The first week, the chicks should be fed often, but in small quantities, since the digestive organs are not completely developed before the end of the first week. The feed therefore, should at all times contain (a) flesh producing or protein feeds, such as sour skimmed milk, buttermilk, meat scraps, bran or shorts; (b) bone producing or ash feeds, such as ground bone or milk, and (c) heat, energy and fat producing feeds or carbohydrates, such as cracked corn, cracked milo, cracked kafir, cracked wheat or oats without hulls. After chicks are half grown, grain need not be cracked. Sour milk should be kept before the chicks at all times. The dishes should be scalded often to prevent poisonous molds from growing in them. Do not spill the milk on the ground as this often breeds diseases. Where milk is not available, meat scrap may be used. Dry, ground bone may be kept in a hopper, or may be mixed with the feed, allowing a pound of bone for each fifteen pounds of feed. When chicks are half grown and on range, they may be fed in self feeders. These should be used some distance from the roosting house to encourage the chicks to exercise. Provide plenty of range with grass or wheat or oats for grazing."

All farmers and poultry raisers should have Circular No. 25, "Management of Chickens on Texas Farms," January 1921. This Circular treats of breeding for egg production, culling, hatching, rearing, feeding of chicks, and feeding for egg production, housing and marketing. Address B. **CLIFF DWELLERS ORIGINATED
IN TEXAS PANHANDLE**

The members of the archeological survey, who have been working the past month in the upper Canadian valley, have reported, on arrival here, that they have collected sufficient evidence to prove that the famous Pueblo cliff-dwellers culture did not originate in Mexico. They have found ruins of adobe and stone in the Moro

valley near Watrous, New Mexico. On the surface and in the rooms were discovered fragments of decorated pottery of the black and white ware which is characteristic of the Pueblo culture. There are numbers of these small ruins scattered along the river above its junction with the Canadian. These ruins are but 700 miles from the large Pueblo of Pecos, situated on the river of that name. Yet the ruins are small and do not compare in size or importance with the more developed structure found on the west slope of the Continental divide. From this point down the Canadian to near Shattuck, Oklahoma, a distance of over 300 miles by river, are numerous small stone structures, indicating rudimentary Pueblo construction. It appears from the flint knives, arrow points, grinding stones and pottery that on the lower river the Indians were more given to hunting than agriculture. They began to build small one room houses of blue stones. As they proceeded westward the architecture improved, their pottery art was developed, they built irrigation

ditches and presently became the sedentary Pueblo cliff-dweller people. The expedition which made this discovery is in charge of W. K. Moorehead of Andover, Mass., and he was assisted by Mr. J. B. Thoburn of the

Oklahoma Historical society and John Randolph of Texas. A report will be published this winter on their observations and the work of Mr. Moorehead hereabouts in 1920 and 1917.—Amarillo Daily News.

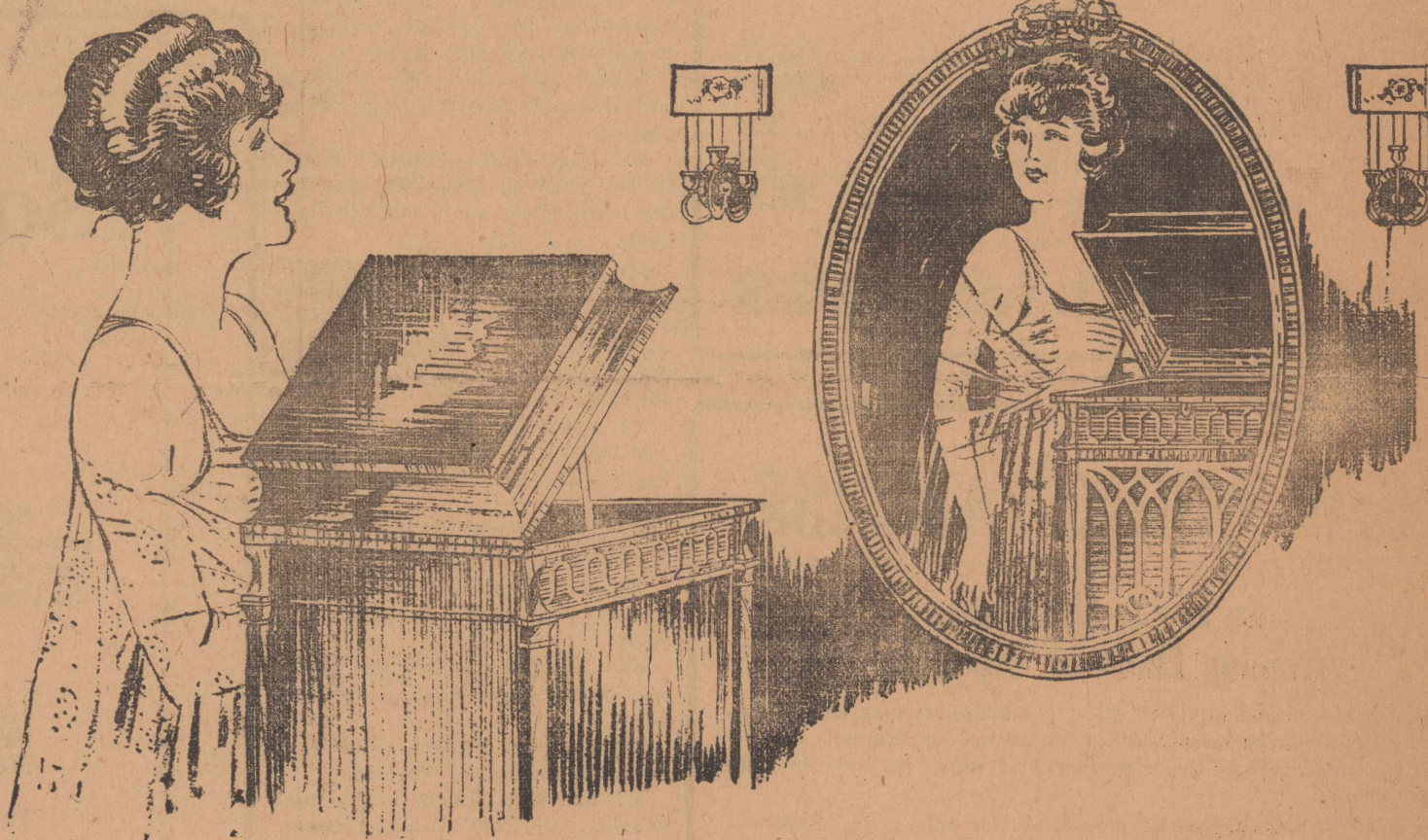
