(By Annie Webb Blanton)

One of the most important and farreaching acts of the Texas Legislature in many years, was the passage by the Thirty-Seventh Legislature of certificate law which provides for the gradual raising of requirements for teachers' certificates, and for emphasizing college training.

In the summer of 1920, definite progress had been made in revising the certificate laws, with two purposes in view.
