### SUMMARY OF LAWS TO BECOME EFFECTIVE JUNE 11

Of 140 Laws Passed 99 Go Into Effect Next Wednesday; Many Changes Made.

Austin, Texas, May 28.—A total of ninety nine laws will become effective on June 11, next. They were enacted at the recent regular session of the Tenth Legislature. A total of 140 laws were passed by the Legislature and of that number forty one go into effect at dates different from June 11, in fact, with two or three exceptions, have already gone into effect. While all of these acts are supposed to be general laws, several are entirely local in their effect.

A summary of the more important laws which will go into effect on June 11 will be found below:

Postponing until Oct. 15 publication of delinquent tax lists and reducing the penalty for nonpayment from 10 to 5 per cent.

Providing for appointments of guardians for persons of unsound mind and habitual drunkards by the court without the necessity of jury trial. The act fails to say how persons can become habitual drunkards during these dry times.

Empowering County Commissioners to fix compensation for County Tax Assessor for assessing levee improvement taxes in cities of over 75,000 population not to exceed the fees paid for assessing State and county taxes.

**Fees Increased**  
Increasing the fees of Sheriffs and other peace officers in misdemeanor cases.

Authorizing the Supreme Court to make disposition of costs in various classes of cases reaching that body.

Validating charters of cities of over 5,000 inhabitants.

Providing for the organization of road districts of one or more existing districts and other territory.

An honest advertising law.

Permitting the making of certified copies of records and documents in the University Library.

Allowing inmates of the Confederate Women's Home to be transferred to the Confederate Home where their husbands are in the home and retransfer where the husband dies.

Fixing Jan. 1 as the uniform date county and precinct officers to qualify.

Exempting the property of art leagues from taxation.

Designating Nov. 11 as "Victory Day" and proclaiming it a legal holiday.

Repealing the law providing for the eradication of orchard pests.

Prohibiting betting on any public grounds with fine of from \$25 to \$50 and (or) confinement in the jail from ten to sixty days.

Repealing the law providing for the general fund oil and gas lease rentals received to the credit of the Game Fish and Oyster Department.

Recognizing substitute purchasers of school land and portions of original purchases and providing for incontestability of such sales.

**Oil and Gas Prospecting**  
Extending for five years the time for oil and gas prospecting on islands and tidewater leases.

"Texas" shall be emblazoned on every State-owned motor vehicle, followed by the name of the department or institution owning same, and prescribing penalty for use for nonofficial purposes.

Fixing method whereby towns of less than 5,000 population may invoke the commission form of government.

Making it possible for cities and towns to avail themselves of the services of the County Tax Assessor and Collector in assessing and collecting the municipal taxes.

Requiring entry to be made on tax roll when taxes are paid and that such entry is prima facie evidence of tax payment.

Attorneys may be suspended for improper practices, regardless of whether a crime was committed or they were prosecuted or convicted.

Prosecutions for bigamy may occur in the county where the bigamous marriage occurred or where the parties cohabit.

Fixing a method whereby temporary administrators may be continued as permanent administrators.

Making it unlawful to use any boat or part thereof without the owner's consent.

Forbidding the transaction of business in Texas under an assumed name.

**Confederate Pensions**  
Giving inmates of the Confederate Home and Confederate Women's home one-half the pension allowance made by the State.

Allowing cancellation of medical practitioner's license when convicted of a felony.

Regulating and licensing "baby farms," or maternity homes.

To incorporate, supervise, regulate and control mutual life insurance companies by the State Insurance Department.

Allowing the son of a Confederate soldier to become superintendent of the Confederate Home.

Requiring barber shops and beauty parlors to be conducted in a sanitary manner.

Deeding tidal land to Port Lavaca for storm protection purposes.

Protecting exclusive dairy trademarks and their milk bottles.

Permitting persons in the military

or naval service to prosecute divorce suits.

Making clear the act permitting County Judges to sell the bonds of drainage districts and fixing their compensation therefor.

Allowing business firms and charitable institutions to be beneficiaries in life insurance policies, by permission of the insured.

**Relief for Railroads**  
Granting relief and extension of time to railroads which failed to construct their lines within the required time.

Further defining what constitutes a public weigher.

Authorizing free railroad transportation for certain peace officers.

Directing physicians to place prophylactic drops in the eyes of newborn infants to prevent eye disease.

Extending until May 1 the time within which corporations may file their franchise tax statements with the Secretary of State.

Fixing fees in examinations for embalmer's license.

Exempting school superintendents, under certain conditions, from holding first grade teacher's certificates.

Authorizing water improvement districts to generate and sell electric current.

County supplies of less than \$150 may be purchased without competitive bidding under emergencies.

Allowing additional deputies to County and District Clerks where proof of need is made.

Permitting free railroad transportation to be issued to the secretary, engineer, auditor and inspector of the Railroad Commission.

Abolishing the plea of assumed risk

as a defense to railroad personal injury suits.

Authorizing cities of over 50,000 inhabitants to amend their charters so as to extend corporate limits.

Three years extension given J. J. Kane and associates to build dry dock and marine ways at Galveston.

Permitting court briefs to be typewritten when filed in the Courts of Civil Appeals.

Enlarging the maximum salaries which may be paid school teachers.

Permitting suits against municipalities for damages because of deaths growing out of personal injuries.

Allowing free passes to be sent to any State pensioner.

Increasing the pay of election judges and clerks.

Providing for absentee voting.

Permitting appeals in quo warranto proceedings.

Exempting ranch laborers from the provisions of the workmen's compensation law.

Providing for appeals in probate cases and protection of the estate involved.

Requiring additional superseded bonds in appeals to the higher courts, where deemed necessary.

Extending the life of the Commission of Appeals until the last Saturday of June, 1923.

Authorizing the incorporation of international trading corporations.

**Freedom of Contract**  
Permitting employers and employees on public works to contract as to the hours of labor, instead of fixed eight-hour law.

Increasing the pay of jail guards and matrons.

Making effective the constitutional

amendment for the conservation of the State's natural resources.

Applying the compulsory school attendance law to the blind and deaf and dumb.

Repealing the law requiring school teachers to make affidavits to get their salary checks.

Authorizing and regulating insurance on the Lloyd's plan.

Amending the act providing that the same powers be granted the several approved colleges in the matter of granting certificates to teach.

That the separate property of the husband shall not be subject to the torts of the wife and vice versa.

Increases the annual fees on commercial auto trucks and vehicles.

**Aid for Schools**  
Bill appropriating \$3,000,000 to supplement the State school apportionment.

Anti-alien land law, aimed principally at the Japs. Forbids aliens owning and leasing lands in this State.

Appropriating \$30,000 as a nucleus for a soldiers' and sailors' monument.

Authorizing the formation and incorporation of holding companies.

Corpus Christi seawall aid bill.

Amending the law regulating the creation of juvenile boards in certain counties.

An epitome of the laws which have already gone into effect, as enacted by the recent session, are as follows:

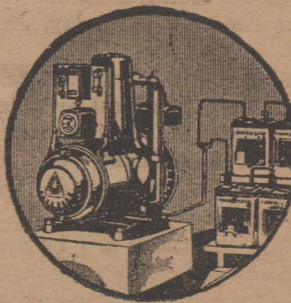
Extending oil and gas permits on State lands for five years.

Extending eighteen months from June 11 the time within which railroads may construct their lines and save their charters.

Making effective the school tax constitutional amendment authorizing

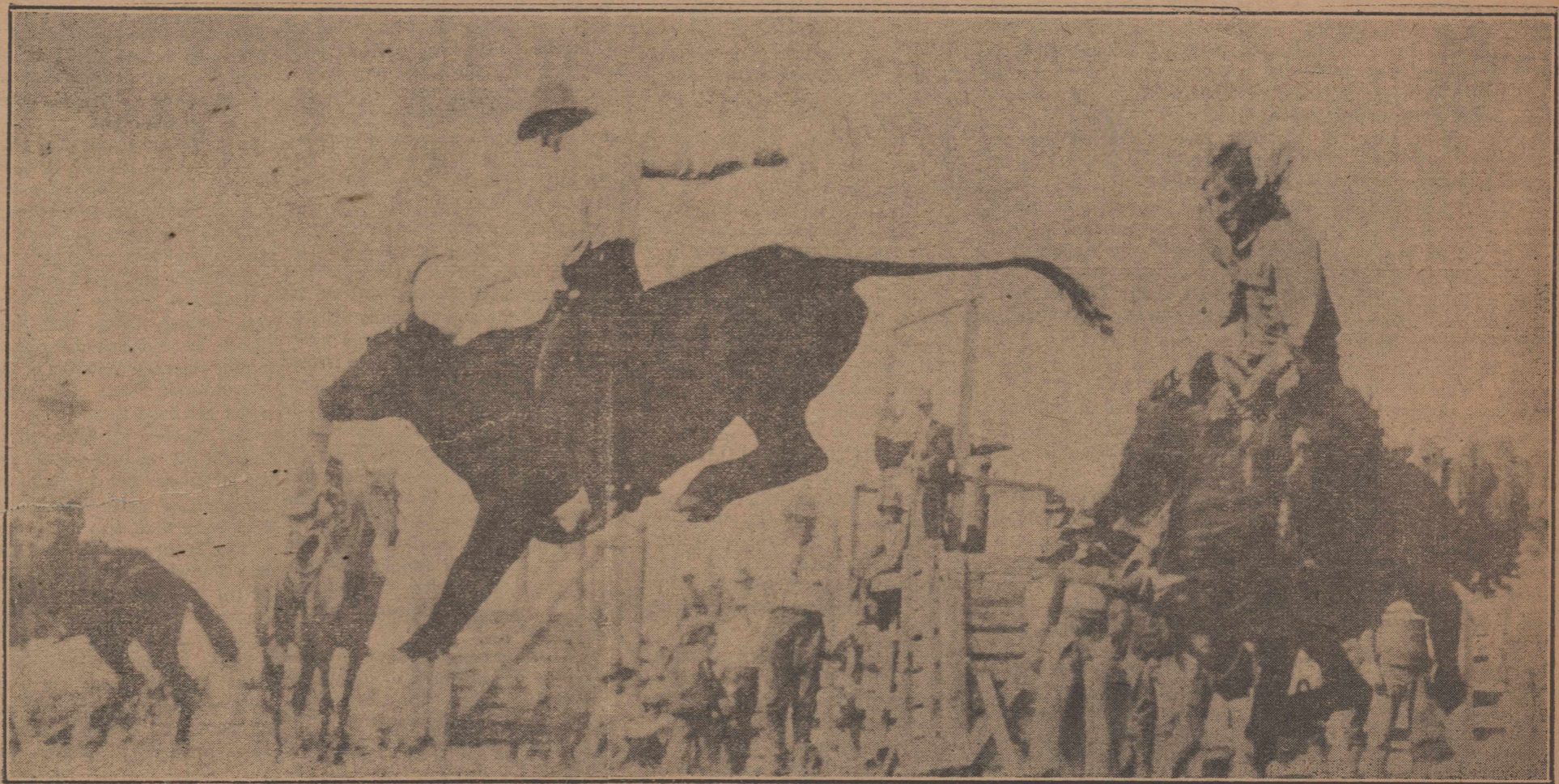

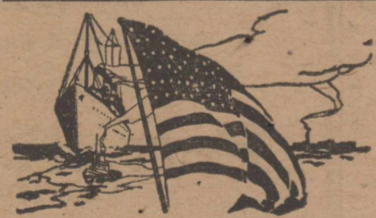

**HEALTH REPORTS**

The battle against tuberculosis seems to be succeeding to a degree not dreamed of by the advocates of the work 10 years ago, states D. E. Breed, executive secretary of the Texas Public Health Association.

From the Public Health Reports it is shown that the death rate from tuberculosis has declined over 40 per cent since 1911. This statement is made after the study of a group of 13,000,000 policy holders in a certain life insurance company. The decline in the tuberculosis death rate can no doubt be traced to some extent to the educational work of the several public health organizations.

These reductions in the death rate are greatest where the tuberculosis death rate is highest, where it creates the most damage in broken and dependent families and removal of the wage earner from industrial life when his productive efforts count most.

The tuberculosis death rate for white males between 25 and 40 years of age in 1911 in the group referred to was 224.6 per 100,000, as compared to 135 per 100,000 in 1920.

Using these extremely low figures in connection with the population of Texas, it means that tuberculosis caused at least 6,299 deaths in Texas during 1920.

There is much difference of opinion just now as to the practical benefits to be derived from the Farm Bureau now being so largely exploited over the state. There is one thing certain, the fees for joining will keep a corps of officials on good rations for a time, whether the farmer gets any benefit or not. It may be the panacea for all the farmer's ills, but that is yet to be developed.—Hall County Herald.

The Herald's tone of voice is rather pessimistic. The Farm Bureau can hardly be expected to do all that is claimed for it,—not in a year. And it is in the range of possibilities, of course, that it will fail to do any of these things. However, there is no doubt our marketing system is out of joint in some ways and the success or failures, whichever they may prove, will be worth the cost.

cities and towns to levy school taxes in increased amounts.

Merging the Dairy and Food Department with the State Board of Health.

Perfecting the law governing the organization of irrigation districts.

Giving the State Depository Board discretion in transferring State funds when new depositories are selected.

Inflicting punishment to bribe railroad operatives for preferential service in handling freight.

Act appropriating \$1,500,000 for an ex-soldiers' tuberculosis sanatorium at Kerrville to accommodate 600.

Elaborate code providing for the organization of co-operative marketing associations.

Making effective the adoption constitutional amendment raising the tax limit for Independent and Common School Districts.

Creating a new method of management for the State railroad.

County Commissioners may issue bonds to build homes for dependent boys and girls.

Legislature to fix the salaries of all employes in the State Highway Department. (Effective Sept. 1, 1921.)

**As to Banks**

Providing a new method whereby State banks may increase their capital stock.

Increasing by graduation the compensation of State Bank Examiners. (Effective Sept. 1, 1921.)

Empowering cities to designate building zones.

**CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

Nashville, Tenn.—The Southern Methodist Church is short 2,000 preachers and is calling for hundreds of volunteers to become missionaries and trained church workers in order that the needs of the local church and the mission fields may be supplied, it is announced by the Christian education movement of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

In addition to the shortage of ministers and missionaries, it is said that the educational institutions of the church are badly crippled on account of insufficient funds to make necessary improvements in buildings and equipment and to assist worthy students to obtain educational advantages.

Leaders here say that it is in order to meet this situation that the Christian education movement was organized. This movement has the right of way throughout the Church over all other causes. For the past year a program of cultivation and education has been in progress. Leading men in both Church and State have devoted much time to speaking in behalf of the movement, and local churchmen have kept the cause actively before the people in their communities.

The climax of the Christian education movement will be reached May 29, to June 5 when a simultaneous drive for funds will be made throughout the Church. The amount sought is \$33,000,000. It is said that this amount will put the 91 schools and colleges on a permanent foundation and will provide a million dollar aid fund to assist worthy students who wish to enter the ministry and other forms of Christian service.

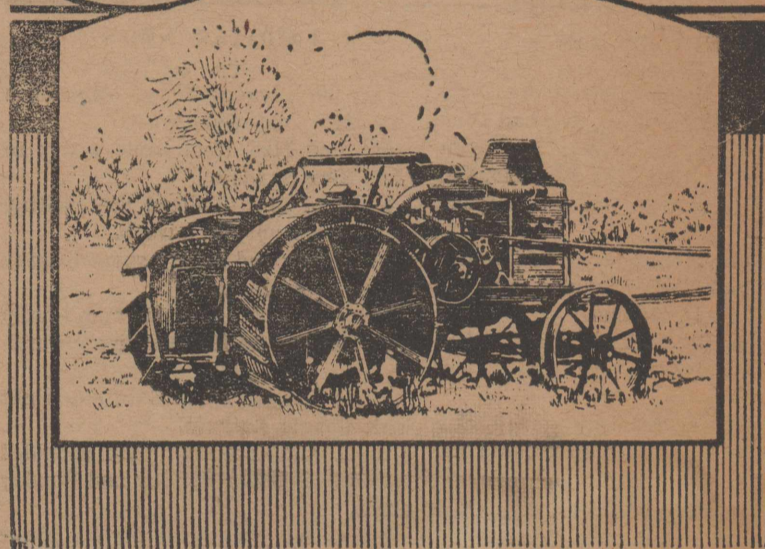

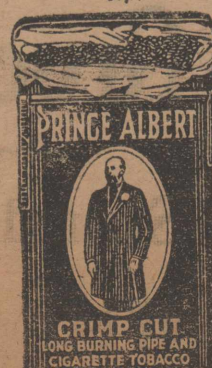

## TEXAS GUARANTY FUND IS CONSIDERED MOST STABLE BANK ACT IN THE UNITED STATES

Nothing has contributed more to the confidence which Texans have in their state banks than the guaranty fund, according to Ed Hall, Commissioner of Banks and Insurance.

Hall declares that the financial crisis through which the country has passed has afforded conclusive evidence of the plan's effectiveness and has convinced the banking public that it will accomplish the purpose for which it was evolved—the absolute protection of unsecured and non-interest bearing deposits in state banks.

During the period of depression to date a total of fourteen state institutions have closed their doors. Not one depositor coming within the protected classes has lost a penny by these failures. On the other hand, the guaranty banks of the state have had their interests protected in a like manner, the fund standing last November at the \$2,300,000 mark and assessments having been kept well within the legal limits.
