



It does seem to me that our Commissioners and Judge ought to be able o see that our taxes are already burdensome and almost intolerable, and that there ought to be an effort to reduce rather than to increase them. Let us stop and take an inventory of our resources and liabilities and pay our debts, and then proceed as we are able, but get value for the money ex-


pended. Our county finances will be in a deplorable condition, even if the bonds are voted down, but would soon be in a much worse condition if the bonds are carried, as the proceeds from the sale of the proposed bonds would be alnost, if not, altogether consumed by claims for work already done and contracted for with a much heavier burden for the future.

Isn't it presumptious on the part of the court to go ahead and contract for road work, that will almost, if not altogether consume the proceeds from the proposed bond issue should it be voted and then say to the tax payers, in effect, you will either vote the bonds or we will raise your taxes?

There seems to me to be only one way of reducing our taxes, and that for our tax payers to apply the breaks, and stop the extravagant expenditures. There must be some remedy found for this terrible disease, which I think can very properly be called by that newly coined word "Squanderlust" with which our court seems to be afflicted, and the first remedy in the course of treatment, which I would prescribe, would be to vote down the \$100,000 bond issue, and then follow that by a good long period of rest-cure, and give both the court and tax payers a rest, while we are getting back to normalcy, and our finances on a more sensible and firm basis.

Honest differences of opinion as to the merits of any proposed financial olicy are to be expected, but there ought to be no differences of opinion as to the ideal policy toward the securing of which every effort should be diected.



The above figures will give some idea of the enormous amounts being expended by our Commissioners Court, especially on our roads. It seems that they have not only spent all the Tax money collected, but in addition thereto, all they could borrow from the banks and individuals (even at a high rate of interest), and a great deal of it, as I see it, has been not only extravagantly spent, but to an actual injury to some of our roads, as is apparent to people who travel over them.

Road Grading Contract With Mr. Covington

On January 13th, A. D. 1921, our Commissioners Court, contracted with Mr. Covington to sell him the County Road Machinery for \$15,000 and have him to do the general road grading for the county, at the rate of 16 cents per cubic yard, it being provided that out of the 16 cents per cubic yard, at least 5 cents should be credited on the \$15,000 note.

I am strongly of the opinion that the 16 cents per cubic yard of dirt moved in grading our plains roads, is entirely too high a price to be paid for such work, for instance: When the railroad from Plainview, to Floydada, was graded, some ten years ago, it was graded under contract let by our local railroad company, cf which Mr. W. M. Massie, was president and general manager, at 11 cents per cubic yard, including cuts and fills, much of the dirt having to be moved several hundred yards, with the old fashioned road scrapers ,or slips, which was quite different from simply moving the dirt from the side of the road and rounding up the center of the roads with the modern road machinery that cost the county so much and sold to Mr. Covington so cheaply.

#### Small Construction Cost of Hale County Roads

In a statement published in Ft. Worth Star-Telegram, issue of last Sunday ,May 29th, 1921, is published the following:

"According to W. J. Espy, one of the Hale County, Commissioner's, well graded highways can be constructed in any part of Hale County for less than \$50 per mile", \* \* \* "There are some slight depressions in the level Plainview country, and fills are built when a highway crosses one of them." 'Before the county purchased its necessary modern machinery, it let contracts for building these fills. The cost for a quarter of a mile fill from four Doughtery ranch eighteen miles south to eight feet high, usually ran about \$2000.00." \* \* \* "The county outfit supervised by Commissioner Espy, recently threw up and put into splendid condition such a fill for \$75. The road equipment of Hale County is divided into four outfits and one complete outfit is used in each precinct."

Notice, Mr. Espy, says "Good Roads can be constructed anywhere in Hale County for \$50 per mile," while our Floyd County roads, if I am correctly informed, are now costing more than three times that amount.

If Hale Co. can own her own road machinery and construct her roads so cheaply ,then why cannot Floyd County, do the same thing '

I believe in good roads, and much has been accomplished, in the way of laying out roads, and improving them, by grading low places, putting in culverts, making drainage ditches., with only the regular 15 cents on the \$100 road tax, and on a much lower valuation, than we now have, but the tax rate has been increased to the legal limit of 30 cents on the \$100, all over the county, and I voted for the increase in my precinct, but instead of the increase being advantageous, it seems to have had the contrary effect.

I think that our Commissioners Court made a serious and costly mis take, when they made the grading Contract with Mr. Covington, and the numerous other contracts, recently made for road work. It seems to me that they have "an elephant on their hands"-in other words, they have

Nashville, Tenn.,-The Southern Methodist Church is short 2,000 preachers and is calling for hundreds of volunteers to become missionaries. and trained church workers in order that the needs of the local church and the mission fields may be supplied, it is announced by the Christian education movement of the Methodist Episcopal Church ,South

In addition to the shortage of ministers and missionaries, it is said that the educational institutions of the church are badly crippled on account of insufficient funds to make necessary improvements in buildings and equipment and to assist worthy students to obtain educational advant-Leaders here say that it is in order to meet this situation that the Christian education movement was organized. This movement has the right of way throughout the Church over all other causes. For the past year a program of cultivation and education has been in progress. Leading men in both Church and State have devoted much time to speaking in behalf of the movement, and local churchmen have kept the cause actively before the people in their communities. The climax of the Christian education movement will be reached May 29, to June 5 when a simultaneous drive for funds will be made throughout the Church. The amount sought is \$33,000,000. It is said that this amount will put the 91 schools and colleges on a permanent foundation and will provide a million dollar aid fund to assist worthy students who wish to enter the ministry and other forms of Christian service.





#### **TEXAS GUARANTY FUND IS CONSIDERED MOST STABLE BANK ACT IN THE UNITED STATES**

Nothing has contributed more to the confidence which Texans have in their state banks than the guaranty fund, according to Ed Hall, Commissioner of Banks and Insurance.

Hall declares that the financial crisis through which the country has passed has afforded conclusive evidence of the plan's effectiveness and has convinced the banking public that it will accomplish the purpose for which it was evolved-the absolute protection of unsecured and non-interest bearing deposits in state banks.

During the period of depression todate a total of fourteen state institutions have closed their doors. Not one depositor coming within the protected classes has lost a penny by these failures. On the other hand, the guaranty banks of the state have had their interests pro-" tected in a like manner, the fund standing last November at the \$2,300,000 mark and assessments having been kept well within the legal limits.
