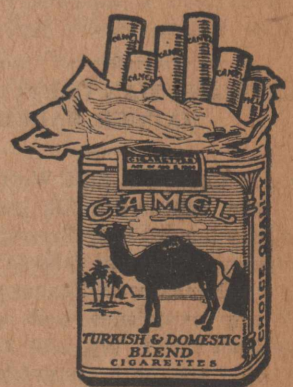

NOTICE OF ELECTION

Whereas, The City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of said city for the purposes hereinafter mentioned:

Therefore it is hereby ordered by the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, that an election be held on Tuesday the twenty fifth (25th) day of October, 1921, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said City in the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) payable as follows: One thousand dollars \$1,000.00 payable each year for fifteen years beginning one year from the date of issuance of said bonds bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable annually, and to levy and collect a tax to create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of improving the waterworks within the limits of said city, and extending the watermains in said city.

Said election shall be held in the City Hall of the City of Floydada,

Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit: Homer Steen, presiding officer; A. C. Goen, judge, Frank L. Moore and J. E. Swenson clerks.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter nine (9) Acts of the Thirty-seventh Legislature of the State of Texas, and the General Laws of 1899 and the amendments thereto if any, and only qualified voters who are property tax-payers in said City shall be allowed to vote in said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have printed or written on their ballots the words "For the Issuance of Bonds", and those opposed shall have printed or written on their ballots the words "Against the Issuance of Bonds". The Manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating General elections.

A copy of this order signed by the Mayor of said City and posted at least 30 days prior to date of said election shall serve as a proper notice of said election and the Mayor is directed to cause it to be posted at the Postoffice of the City of Floydada, Texas, at the County Court House of

Floyd County, and in the City Hall of the City of Floydada. The notice is also ordered published in the Floyd County Hesperian, a newspaper published in Floydada, Texas.

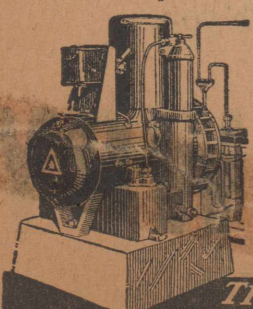

GUS HERBERG DIED SUNDAY NIGHT IN FLOYDADA

Gus Herberg, formerly representative here of the Pierce-Fordyce Oil Association, for the past four years a resident of Floydada, died at his home in the southwest part of town last Sunday night unexpectedly at the age of 46 years. While he had been in ill health for several months and was preparing to spend the winter at Carlsbad for treatment he was able to be up and was in town Saturday afternoon and walked about his home Sunday afternoon. Physicians pronounced his death as due to a sudden attack of asthma.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Methodist church at two o'clock, Rev. C. B. Meador conducting the services, and the body was interred in Floydada Cemetery at 3 o'clock.

Besides his widow the deceased is survived by three sons, Aubrey 12, Clifford 9 and Buford 6, and a daughter, Helen Isabelle, 4 years of age. He was a native of Germany and his parental family still reside in that country. He had not heard from any of them since about the time the United States entered the World War. The loyalty of the deceased was not questioned, however, and he was active in all the home campaigns during the war, aiding in Liberty Loan, Red Cross and other drives, in all of which he was a material factor in this county.

His wife was formerly Miss Victoria Hammons. They were married in Coleman in 1907. A brother and sister of Mrs. Herberg, Fred and Miss Hammons, of Coleman, reached Floydada Tuesday night for the funeral.

Following Mr. Herberg's death and burial the surviving family are leaving this week for Stacey, Texas, where they will live with Mrs. Herberg's parents.

NEWS OF MOTLEY

From the Motley County News:
 The first annual meeting of the Fort Worth, Farwell and Frisco Highway Association was held at Floydada, last Thursday and Friday, and it was the most enthusiastic, up and doing gathering of the kind ever staged in west Texas.

Floydada out-Floydada-ed herself in entertaining the assemblage. They served one of the finest banquets ever spread in west Texas, so say those who have attended them nearly all and it certainly was a credit to the local Commercial Club and the good ladies of the city, who arranged and served the repast.

A big barbecue and watermelon feast was also staged at Blanco canyon Friday, which was another rare treat.

The meeting, while enjoying the entertainment afforded, was held for business, and steps taken for the logging, mapping and publicity of this popular and inviting highway.

The promoters of the Whiteflat oil development have had a proposition under consideration for several weeks, that should result in the tests being extended as far as there would be any use in going. Nothing has been said about it publicly for the reason that final arrangements have not been perfected, and the promoters did not care to give out any false alarms, or create unwarranted hopes.

The facts are that parties are ready and have entered into a contract to complete these tests, furnishing their own money, which they have in the bank and they are asking nothing unreasonable. All they want is the land owners who have leased to the original company, to waive the forfeitures and rentals called for in the original leases, which have about two years to run.

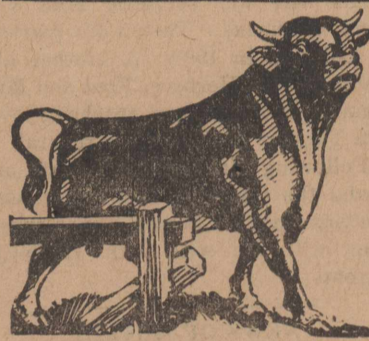

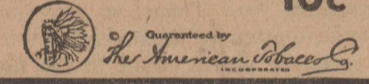

MANY WARRANTS OF SMALL DENOMINATIONS COMING IN

Although many warrants of small denominations are being received at the First National Bank here, following the announcement last week that that institution would act as holding agent for persons having script against the county, in the movement being undertaken by the Commissioners' Court to refund a large portion of its outstanding debts, the totals to which the figures reach are far below expectations. Although it is known that approximately \$60,000 worth of non-interest bearing warrants have been issued and are outstanding, less than half this amount of warrants are in the hands of the bank.

However, other banks of the county are also said to be assisting their customers in gathering up the warrants and it is possible that a greater aggregate amount of the script can be accounted for in this manner than is shown above.

Persons who hold these warrants and desire to have the assistance of the banks as formulated in the formal

announcement made last week should deliver and receive receipts for their script at an early date. If the plan of the court materializes and the refunding warrants are issued to take care of this floating debt, it is stated that only those warrants which are properly listed and accounted for will be included in the list for which the refunding debt is to be assumed by the county.

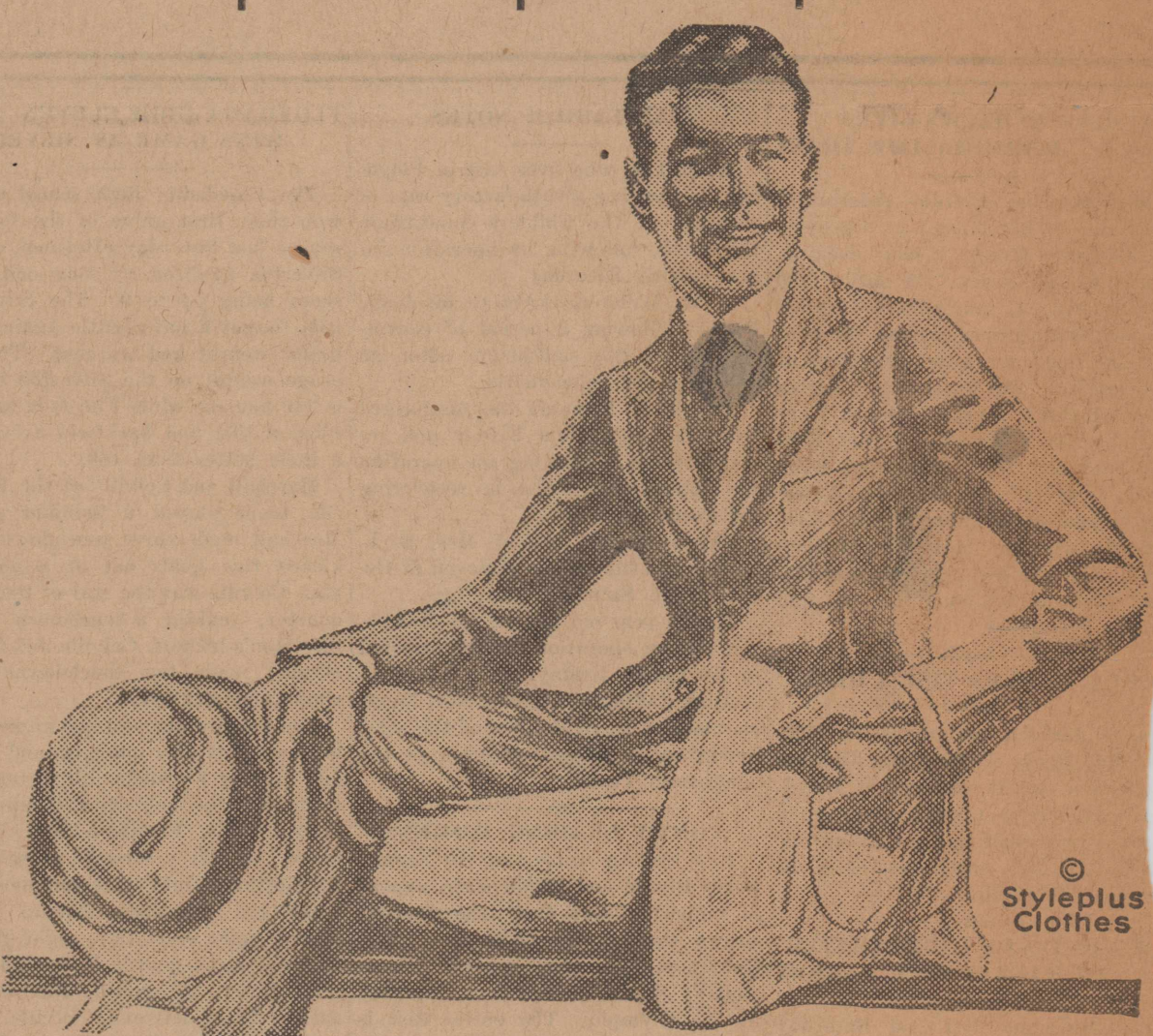

HEAVY STEEL WILL BE IN FLOYDADA BY OCTOBER 20th

The job of laying the 85-pound steel on Floydada Branch, which was started again during the earlier part of this month, following a lay-off since March of this spring, will be completed by October 20th, according to J. F. Anton, division superintendent of the Slaton Division.

The extra gang, under the supervision of Foreman O. Kirkland, has been increased to one hundred eighty-five men, and the work is proceeding rapidly this side of Lockney. The crew was moved from Lockney to Muncy Switch this week and will be removed to Floydada about the 6th or 7th of October, according to present plans.

The heavier steel on this branch will reduce the running time of trains very greatly, saving almost thirty minutes between Floydada and Lockney. It will also make possible bringing the heavier engines to the branch for use in rush seasons when the smaller engines are unable to handle the loads for which the Malleyes and other large type engines are made.

Floydada Branch is believed to be the only line of similar length in the state of Texas, not on main line, to be rock-ballasted and laid with the heavier steel. The expenditure of the several hundred thousand dollars by the Santa Fe to make possible more speed for their trains and the use of heavier trains in this district is distinct indication of the heavy tonnage carried on the branch line annually, and is likewise an indication of the great productiveness of a region which is not equalled in any section of the state of Texas.

FALL FROM MULE BREAKS ARM

France, Hunt, eleven year old son of W. W. Hunt, who lives about three miles west of town, was very painfully injured Friday of last week when he fell from a mule which he was trying to ride.
