The Constitution now limits the "COAL CAR" SHORTAGE MAY compensation of the Attorney General to an annual salary of \$2,000 and to fees of \$2,000 a year, if earned. This amount of fees has been earned by that official for many years. Therefore his total compensation is \$4,000. The proposed amendment authorizes the Legislature to fix his compensation at an annual salary not to exceed \$7,500 "and no more."

The Constitution now limits the compensation of each, the Comptroller of Public Acounts, the Treasurer and the Commissioner of the General Land Office to an annual salary of \$2,500. The proposed amendment would authorize the Legislature to fix the compensation of each of these officials at an annual salary not to exceed \$5,000 "and no more."

The Constitution now limits the compensation of the Secretary of State to a salary of \$2,000 a year. The proposed amendment would increase it to \$5,000 a year "and no

Out of Date Salaries

The Legislature has submitted these proposals of the fact that the duties of the officers have greatly increased since the salary limits were fixed, as the cost of living also greatly has increased. Further than this consideration of justice the Legislature believes that the public service would be benefitted if these officers were nearly adequately compensated, as all other officers are compensated.

If this amendment shall be adopted the Legislature shall allow each of the officers the maximum salary permitted by the amendment the cost of the State Covernment will be in of the State Government will be increased in the sum of \$18,000. To pay this sum an increase in the tax rate of one-twentieth of 1c on the \$100 would be required. A person paying taxes on \$10,000 worth of property would pay 5c a year more because of such increases.

A statement in behalf of this amendment says that these salaries were fixed under the Constitution in 1866. This statement is not altogether accurate. The truth is that none of the Constitutions of Texas prior to that of 1875 fixed any salaries, except that some of them provided the rates of compensation to be received "until otherwise provided by law." The Legislatures were free to fix salaries according to their judgment.

The Eleventh Legislature in 1866 fixed the salaries of the six officers under consideration as fellows: Governor \$4,000, Attorney General \$3,000, and the Secretary of State, Comptroller, Treasurer and Land Commissioner \$2,500 each.

The Constitution of 1868 provided at the Governor's salary should be that the Governor's salary should be \$5,000 and that that of the other five officers should be \$3,000 each "until otherwise provided by law." In pursuance of this authority the Twelfth Legislature fixed the salaries at the rates provided in the Constitution and such salaries were paid until 1876, when they were cut down by the new Constitution because times were hard in Texas at the close of reconstruction and also because the framers of the Constitution were fearful that the Carpet Baggers might regain control of their Government. The limitations have not been relaxed in all of the forty-five years that have elapsed, notwithstanding the Carpet Baggers did not regain control, and times have been better, the duties of the officers have multiplied and the cost of living has greatly increased, in this connection it has often been remarked that the heads of the departments under consideration now receive smaller salaries than do their chief clerks and certain other expert employes.

Other States Pay Better It has also been remarked that nearly all other States, including all other of the largest States, compensate their officers much more generally than does Texas. The five largest States together with their population are as follows: New York 10,-384,829, Pennsylvania 8,720,017, Illi-



Caldwell went as a representative of the Cletrac, Chavez as his mechanic and Kaho, a Fox film cameraman passed as an advertising man for the Cleveland Tractor company.

The words Fox Film corporation were painted out on the motion picture camera and the word Cletrac substituted in order to conceal the real object of the journey. Ten attempts and an offer of \$100,000 to the Mexican leader for pictures of his 200,000 acre ranch had failed.

Arrived at the station nearest the ranch, Villa's car failed to arrive on schedule time, and the three men were forced to bunk in a shack which had more "predatory animals" than those which annoyed soldiers in the trenches during the World War. Two nights they spent scratching and eating breakfasts of okra, potatoes, beans and other like roughness. This same food line-up was given the men during their entire stay on the ranch.

Twelve armed men met the automobile conveying the Americans to Villa's ranch and the visitors were searched and their guns taken. Villa later explained that he did this because his life had been threatened by Americans.

The three were given cots in Villa's office ,but were given no cover, and for the whole time of their stay, they were hardly able to sleep for the cold, the rainy season then being at its height.

Villa was pleased to learn that a his tractor was not then working as it should, and promised the men they could take some pictures if the weather cleared so the wheat could be cut. After several days of rain, clear weather came.

Kaho started grinding out his pictures of the machine in operation, while Villa stood around and fumed. Presently the binder quit running, the general called for a cigarette and began fumbling his pistol. Mexicans
