Up if Deal is Consummated as Planned

If the warrants are accepted by the buyers the money for their purchase will be received and made available for script holders at an early date.

Some friction has developed in consideration of the warrant issue in the court. Judge Clark refused to sign the papers making the deal complete last Friday afternoon, giving as his reasons his belief that the transaction in bonds was turned down by the voters. He left the court room Saturday morning shortly after the session opened and was absent all day. This week he has refused to meet with the court ,giving as his reason he was busy as judge of the county court. Fifteen hundred people lose their lives every year by fire. These lives saved would populate a town about the size of our own. Do you not think it is our duty to prevent such enormous and disastrous

Fire is our greatest friend but uness we are able to master it, it becomes our worst enemy. Fire has many friends, but it's most faithful and most intimate friend is "Carelessness," and we should avoid this dreadful thing as we would the most dreadful disease. Carelessness steals in the United States alone over three hundred million dollars each year. It is very destructive; it is found everywhere, in the homes, on the streets, in the factories and on the sea.

No country in the world is so wonderfully equipped to fight fire as the United States. No country has such well drilled and skillful men to handle this equipment. The responsibility for fire lies with the individual and not with the fire department. Notwithstanding the excellence of its fire fighting equipage, the United States has a greater fire loss than any other country. Its loss is nine times that of any country in Europe.

The causes of the fire are many and varied. Among the more common causes are defective flues. We should each and every one have our flues inspected each fall. This would prevent a great per cent of our fires. Then the common match is a great menace to our homes. We should be careful of the kind of matches we use, and the way in which we use them. We should not leave them where children could get hold of them; keep them away from mice and be careful where we light them. Sometimes tiny bits of the match will fly off and lodge in places unseen and later start a fire. Again many fires are caused from carelessness in lighting houses. If we use lamps they should be of metal and not of glass. If we use gas we should not have any gas flames without globes. If our homes are wired with electricity, they should be wired by the best electricians, like the only kind we have in our city. From the heating of our homes, comes a considerable number of fires. 

Northeast section of the Louisiana Purchase. It was the Mississippi river which was the dividing line between these two large territories.

The Eastern section was ceded by France to Great Britain in 1763 and became a part of the United States at the end of the Revolution by the Treaty of Paris in 1783. The Northwest territory was organized by congress four years later. Then, as this great federal domain became settled and was gradually divided into states, the Eastern part of the present State of Minnesota belonged in turn to the Territories of Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin.

As to the western portion of the state, this was a part of the Louisiana Purchase, which was bought from France by the United States in 1803. As this region became subdivided, Western Minnesota formed a part of the Territories of Louisiana. Missouri and Iowa.

The first white man to penetrate to Minnesota was the French explorer, Duluth, who in 1678 built a fort on Lake Superior and there established a very extensive fur trade. Two years later, Father Hennepin and two companions were sent by La Salle to explore the Upper Mississippi and reached the Falls of St. Anthony, where Minneapolis now stands. But it was not until the Nineteenth century that permanent settlements were made. In 1822 the first mill was built at the Falls of St. Anthony, where were destined to arise such important successors. In 1841, Father Galtier built a chapel dedicated to St. Paul, and this was the foundation of the present great city of that name.

As to the name Minnesota, the state was so called from the river that runs through it, which in the Dakota Indian language makes the words "Minne," meaning "Water," and "Sotah," meaning "Sky-colored." Sometimes the state is called the "North Star State," from the motto on its coat-of-arms.

Minnesota was admitted to the Union in 1858. Its area is 84.-682 square miles and it is the most important of our wheat producing states. It has twelve presidential electors.





KANSAS CITY MARKET

Kansas City Stock Yards, October made to the slicky slide. There was All members are requested to be 17th.—Though cattle receipts were liberal they were not up to those of last Monday. Trade in the best killing and stock and feeding grades was active at fully steady prices. The plain and ordinary kinds were slightly lower. There was considerable urgency in the demand for hogs. Prices vere up 15 to 25 cents. Lambs were weak to 25 cents lower.

Receipts today were 35,000 cattle, 6,000 hogs, 16,000 sheep, compared with 37,000 cattle, 5,500 hogs, and 16,000 sheep a week ago, and 29,000 cattle, 7,000 hogs and 5,000 sheep a year ago.

No strictly prime full fed steers in any weight were offered. Good to choice steers were in active demand and fully steady and the best grades of grass cattle sold readily. The plainer classes moved slowly at the outset but later when a moderate decline was established they began to move more freely. Killers are making large purchases, and there is good buying on shipping orders, cows, heifers and calves were steady.

Demand for stockers and feeders continues active. The opening demand this week was for the better classes and plain and ordinary kinds sold slowly. Kansas is buying relatively fewer thin cattle than any other state A good many buyers were here who wanted to get cattle laid in before any railroad tie up occurred.
