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Eggs are beginning to taste good again. With the market around 40 cents and all the hens on a strike the scarcity of hen fruit has forced the price up steadily the past few weeks.

Information has been given by Clarendon and Childress of the presence of a Ku Klux Klan local organization in each of those towns. It was likewise learned of the existence of such an order in that city. With the distasteful record the organization has further east in this state it is regrettable to see it spread westward. The names and ritual of the organization are perhaps no worse or better than many other secret orders, but the things which have been done in the name of the Klan whether or not its members did them, give rise to too many possibilities of lawlessness.

Putting the speculator out of business has been one of the principal avocations, sidelines or political activities of the people, especially of the middle west, these past ten or fifteen years. The last effort is to take the speculator out of the grain market. Speculation was a bolster to the cattle market. It has been largely eliminated and the cattle business for this or some other reason is practically in ruins, and now taking the speculator out of the grain business by legislation is one of the things helping to depress the grain business. It may be well enough to take the purely gambling species out of the grain

business but to take him out also gets the speculator who actually speculates—puts money into his activities. This is a truth which will not be accepted for a time but when we get over our orgy of preventing everybody but ourselves making money, we will awaken to the fact we are not making money as well.

The Hesperian gleans from a Department of Agriculture bulletin that the para-dichlorobenzene treatment will kill peach tree borers. Read it aloud. Seriously, the treatment is declared to be successful and is explained in farmers' bulletin No. 1246. It is by an entomologist and the names used are long ones but the methods described are simple. For 150 years the peach tree borer has been the biggest drawback to the life of peach trees. The treatment described has been tested over a period of four or five years by department experts and is declared to be effective in a very marked degree. It will prove very valuable to persons who have orchards bothered with borers.

A phenomenal incident reaching almost to the occult reported from the village cemetery at Hooker, Okla. There came strange noises from many of the graves, and it seemed that there was a rattling of dry bones on coffin box floors, groans as of stiff joints long unused, and a tearing and rending sound like as of burial clothes being parted by suddenly aroused energy that was taking the place of motion long arrested by the destroyed process of nature. HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL TEAM DEFEATS TOWN PLAYERS 6-0

Those who failed to see the football game at the ball grounds Friday afternoon between a mixed team of town players and high school men, and the regular high school team, missed a mighty good game as well as a highly amusing one. It was worth the time just to see the big heavyweight tackler, Supt. James E. Parks, playing on the town team. The entire game revolved around his enormous bulk, and he made an excellent screen for his little quartermaster, Roy Eubank, who could dart from behind him without being seen, and make a run for the goal. It was feared that there might be a casualty list among the school team when the news leaked out that Mr. Parks would play on the town line-up, but the boys soon learned to make their line plunges through the other tackle and keep out of his way.

Both teams were very evenly matched, for the town line-up consisted for the most part of old time stars, lacking organization, while the school players have not had as much experience, but had a good organization which won them the game. However, their only score would not have been made if it had not been for the brilliant playing of Colville, who received a punt as safety, stopped to take his bearings, and then made a long run of fully eighty five yards for a touchdown passing everything that got in his way. Marshall failed to kick the goal on account of the wind, which made the score 6-0. This was at the first of the third quarter, and the score remained the same until the end of the game.

The town boys tried out quite a number of forward passes but completed few of them due to their lack of the proper signals. A contest in punting made up the larger part of the first half. Jim Curry, fulback for the town boys, made himself a holy terror every time he got hold of the ball. They are saving their surplus energy for next Saturday's game when they will play the high school team at Lubbock. Although Floydada has been eliminated by Plainview her team is not out of the race yet by a

whole lot, and they are planning to do a little eliminating of their own before the season is over. The game Saturday promises to be of unusual interest, for Lubbock has a very strong team and is probably Plainview's closest rival on the south plains. Our boys hope to win.

DISTRICT COURT FLOYD COUNTY ADJOURNED SAT.

The fall term of District Court for Floyd County was formally adjourned for the term by District Judge R. C. Joiner last Saturday afternoon, following final routine of closing up the term business.

Saturday forenoon the judge set aside his judgment rendered at this term of court in the case of W. W. Smith against Floyd County and others, the judgment having been rendered in favor of the defendants. A new trial was granted.

Judgment for the defendants was given by the judge in the suit of Mrs. E. L. Morris and others against M. L. Childers and others. The case was one of trespass to try title.

Sterling Jordan, the 19-year-old boy tried at this term of court on a charge of theft and given two years penitentiary sentence, was sentenced Saturday morning. Defendant gave notice of appeal.

Five new civil cases have been filed in district court in the past ten days, District Clerk G. C. Tubbs said Saturday afternoon, two of which are trespass to try title cases.

District Court for Briscoe County was opened Monday morning at Silvertown.

CORN CHEAPER THAN COAL, USE AS FUEL

Dallas, Oct. 21.—Farmers in parts of West Texas are using corn for fuel, finding it cheaper than coal when freight is paid, according to E. B. Doggett, local grain dealer. Doggett says the farmers about Lamesa are burning corn because coal costs about \$17 delivered, while they can get only \$8.50 per ton for their corn.

He believes Texas farmers will be using corn for fuel to a considerable extent in a short time unless coal prices are lowered and freight rates are cut, especially in the Panhandle.

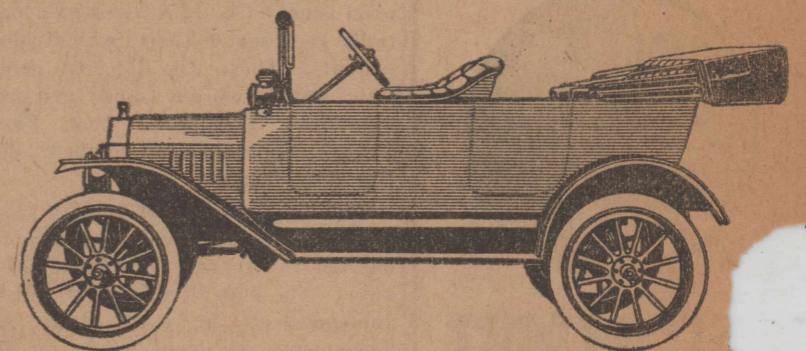

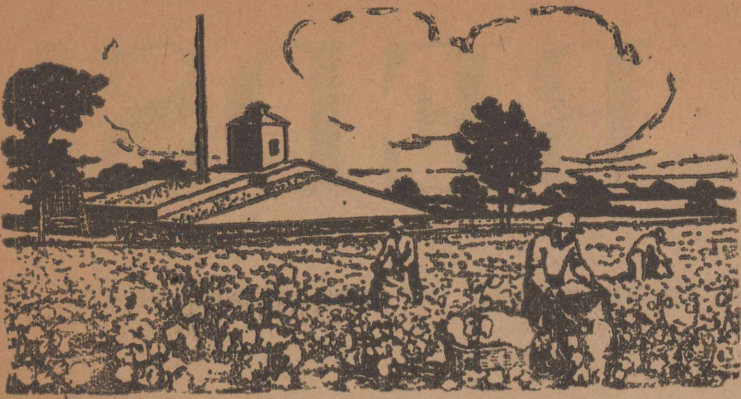

COUNTY AGENT NOTES

The boys and girls in the agricultural clubs are requested to prepare their pig, poultry, maize, etc., for a show. Definite arrangements have not been made but the date will be announced in a few days. Every boy and girl who joined the clubs are requested to show something whether they have finished their records or not. We shall make arrangements to take care of your exhibits and will offer prizes and we want you all represented. This show may be at Lockney, November 26.

We hope to have a large representation at the Dallas fair next year from the boys and girls. The officials there have a dormitory for the club members and both boys and girls can get free tickets and free board and lodging while there. I hope that some of our products will be there next year in the club show as well as a county exhibit. It is a shame that a good county like Floyd was only partially represented there by individual exhibits. Those who did have something there from our county got good premiums. This shows that Floyd County can efficiently compete with the other counties.

The members of the poultry association of Floyd County are also requested to prepare their birds for a show. The date of this show will be announced at an early date. Arrangements are being made for the show. Also people who are not members of the association are urged to show their poultry and join the association. This show probably will be at Lockney, November 26.

The farmers are urged to exercise care in selling their maize this year as we do not have a surplus of this feed. The price is not very good and the prospects are better for selling it at home than by shipping it. It would be better to keep a sufficient amount of this feed until you see that you are safe for another crop next year and then feed it to hogs. At the present price of hogs and maize you can make more money by selling it that way than by selling it direct as feed. It is estimated that in trans-

porting maize to market in hogs you can haul seven times as much in this way as when hauling the maize itself and the same thing applies to freight. You are urged to diversify your farming. Keep plenty of stock and sell your feed through this means. You will not have nearly so many chances for failure by doing so. Every farmer should arrange to plant some winter barley for pasture and for feed. Barley is one of the best feed for milk cows we can grow. Grow it for feed and not for sale as grain. By practical experiments it is found that barley chops is one of the best butter fat producers one can get. Feed your cows and chickens a balanced ration and you will make a living easily from your poultry and dairy cows. Feeding maize alone is like feeding man nothing but corn bread.

Now is the time to cull out your non-laying hens. I shall be glad to help you to rid your flock of culls.

Arrangements are being made for the Floyd County Poultry Association to join in the poultry show to be held at Lockney, November 26, on the regular last Saturday Tradesday. Also we are expecting to have the club show there too at that time. We want every one in the county to be there and take something to show. Let us co-operate in this show and make it a good one. Every one should get their poultry ready and have it there and make this show one of the best in the history of Floyd County.

A poultry culling demonstration was conducted at Mrs. M. B. Holmes' place near Sand Hill last Tuesday, by County Agent T. Scott Wilson. A good crowd of neighbors were there to witness the demonstration and considerable interest was shown in this work. About 30 people were there, mostly women of that neighborhood. This is a very important piece of work and it is hoped that many more of the communities will avail themselves of the opportunity to have the agent come and give a practical demonstration on how to discriminate between the good layers and the loafers. This is a very simple process and the purpose of this work is to show the people how it is done so that they may do it themselves. Now is the best time to do this and get rid of your non-layers and sell them. If any more communities wish the agent to come and hold a demonstration all they have to do is for one family to call him and set a date and call in the neighbors. By this means the agent can make one demonstration accomplish what would require several individual visits.

NOTICE OF STOCK LAW ELECTION

This the 18th day of October, A. D. 1921, came on to be considered by the County Judge of Floyd County, Texas, the petition of F. T. Emert and one hundred fifty-two other free holders of said County of Floyd, State of Texas, for an order of election in the entire County of Floyd, Texas, for the purpose of enabling the freeholders thereof to determine whether horses, mules, cattle, jacks and jennets shall be permitted to run at large therein;

And it appearing to the undersigned judge of such county that such petition was filed with the Commissioners' Court of said county on the 12th day of September, 1921, and that such court thereafter, on the 10th day of October, A. D. 1921, heard and granted the same and ordered that such election be held on the 3rd day of December, 1921, and that the judge of said county issue an order thereof and cause public notice thereof to be given as required by law;

Now, therefore, by virtue of the authority vested in me under such order and the law, I, W. B. Clark, County Judge of Floyd County, Texas, do hereby order that on the 3rd day of December, A. D. 1921, at the usual voting boxes in said county, an election shall be held for the purpose of enabling the freeholders of the said county of Floyd, Texas, to determine whether horses, mules, cattle, jacks and jennets, shall be permitted to run at large in said county of Floyd, Texas;

That said polls shall be open for such election at the usual places in the said county used for the purpose of holding general elections in said county; no person shall vote at such election unless he is a freeholder and also a qualified voter under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas; all votes at such election shall be by ballot and voters desiring to prevent the animals designated herein from running at large shall place upon their ballots the words "For the Stock Law," and those in favor of allowing such animals to run at large, shall place upon their ballots the words, "Against the Stock Law."

On or before the tenth day after such election, the persons holding such election shall make due return of all the votes cast at their respective voting places for and against said proposition, to the Co. judge of said

county, who will tabulate and count said returns and ascertain and proclaim the result of said election in the manner prescribed by law.

Public notice of this order shall be given for at least thirty days before the date of such election by the publication thereof in some newspaper published in said county, if there be one, and if no newspaper be published

in said county, one of which shall be posted at three public places in said county, one of which shall be at the court house door thereof.

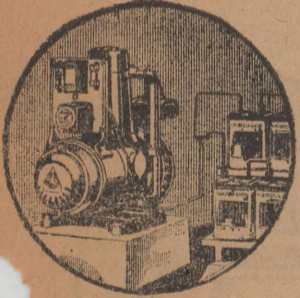
