

HOUSE, SATTERWHITE'S PLAN

Austin, Jan. 8. Abolishment of the upper branch of the Texas Legislature and reduction of the membership of the House to not exceed 120 is advocated by Lee Satterwhite, Representative from Potter County, who spent Saturday in Austin on legal business.

"I shall advocate such a measure at the next session of the Legislature." said Representative Satterwhite, "but it only can be accomplished by the adoption of an amendment to the Constitution or the framing of a new Constitution. I believe the time has come when we should do this and, at the next session of the Legislature, I shall introduce a resolution calling for a constitutional convention.'

Representative Satterwhite is a candidate for renomination in the primary next July and so far he has no opposition. During the Thirty-seventh Legislature Satterwhite was chairman of the general appropriations commit-

"By abolishing the Senate and reducing the membership of the House," said Satterwhite, "I firmly believe that the State's business can be dispatched with alacrity and at the same time, more efficiently. I would not favor the movement recently inaugurated at San Antonio to cut the membership of the House to forty, as I believe my plan better would serve the interests of the entire State."

To wipe out the Senate and reduce the House, Satterwhite indicated, would mean an increase in the per diem of the members.

As to a special session of the Legislature this year to deal with the financial situation of the penitentiary sysem, Representtive Satterwhite said that he did not favor another session, he fears, unless Governor Neff makes satisfactory arrangements to deal with the situation, the Governor will be forced to assemble the lawmakers in another session.
