The object of this organization is to give aid and enforcement to our county officers in the enforcement of the law by open daylight means. By meeting from time to time and discussing the conditions of the county; by pledging the membership of this body to fearlessly report all violations of law, to make complaints when necessary, and not to shirk jury service on flimzy pretexts when called on the juries of the county.

The different neighborhoods of the entire county are invited to form similar organizations, to the end that the criminal laws may be enforced and the public conscience quickened against the tendency to lawlessness that is






