to the next crop. Do not plant wheat or oats on the same ground more than two years in succession.

These bugs work in patches, causing yellow patches to appear in the field. Pasturing the wheat close will tend to prevent so much damage. If the plants in these small patches are killed it is best to plow these worst patches under deep to prevent the further spread of the pest.



4. Starch, prepared as for laundry purposes; for washable materials Immerse the stained place in the starch and boil; it first turns blue and then disappears.

5. Flour, used in the same manner as starch.
