

kell about three years ago. She was a member of the Weinert Baptist Church.



#### Flood Emphasizes Need for Spring Creek Project

Need for cleaning and deepening the channel of Spring Creek, envisioned in a project advanced recently by the Chamber of Commerce, was graphically illustrated last week.

Inability of the stream to carry off the torrent of flood waters from a six and one-half inch rain, resulted in thousands of dollars in property damage.

Some homes were flooded, and two churches suffered damage from the high waters. Fences were swept away in some areas. Heaviest damage, however was to streets and bridge approaches along the stream. Repairs and rebuilding of these streets will place a heavy burden on the city, but it is something that

will have to be done. In planning these repairs, it seems that this would be an opportune time to include measures that would help prevent a recurrence of this damage in the future.

Deepening the stream channel where needed, and sloping the banks along the small creek in some places would make it possible for property owners to carry on from there by planting trees, shrubs, and grass to beautify the area.

This would remove the threat of any further property damage from flood waters, and would convert the stream from a detriment to an attractive civic asset.

#### Diminishing Return With A Vengeance

Gasoline taxes, which now average one-third of the cost to motorists for regular grade fuel, may be approaching the point of diminishing return. Charles E. Webber, president of the Natural Gasoline Association of America, said at the 39th convention of the trade association in Houston, Texas.

The American motorist has become gasoline price conscious to a degree greater than ever before because of increased prices caused by heavier fuel taxes. From 1949 through 1959 there were 62 separate state tax increases, plus a rise of from 1.5 cents to 4 cents per gallon in the Federal tax. This amounted to a jump of 40 per cent. In contrast, the actual price of gasoline at the pump rose only 4.5 per cent, making the rate of gasoline tax increase nine times that of the gasoline itself. So it is taxes that cause the seemingly high price of the product-but the petroleum industry is generally given the blame.

The growth of the compact, economy car this year is accounting for 25 per cent of the domesite automobile industry's production, and it is forecast that there will be 2 million small, economy cars in this country by the end of 1960. Rebellion against started for the man at the re tax-included high gas prices is a major reason for this trend. As aconsequence, Mr. Webber emphasized, it is conceivable that the total of taxable gallons may drop so far that taxes may have to be raised again to cover the deficit. That would be an example of "diminishing return" with a vengeance.


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

#### Origin and Causes Of Gin Fires In Texas Studied

Every year, Texas ginners suffer sizeable losses as a resullt of gin fires. In an effort to determine the causes of these fires and the effectiveness of recently developed preventitive devices, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Sta-tion conducted a study of fires in approximately 10 per cent of the State's gins. Five types of gins were selected to make the reports: those with green boll or rock traps only, those with magnets only, those with rock traps and magnets, those with complete or partial CO2 systems with magnet or green boll trap, or both, and a control group without any of these

Matches were found to be. by far, the greatest cause of fires. This can only be attriuted to carelessness on the part of cotton pickers. No device has been developed to trap matches and the only practical means used by ginners to reduce these losses is the distribution of safety matches to pickers.
