

SURVEY OF CHILDREN'S DE-FECTS REPORTED BY NURSE

Austin, Texas-A survey of school children's health, which the public health nurse declares to be typical of the entire state and other states, has recently been completed by Miss Pearl N. Hyer, R. N., public health nurse of the Texas Public Health Associa-

Miss Hyer made examinations, assisted by local physicians, of 729 children in a certain North Texas town. Among these 729 school children, 1,656 defects were found—over two For District Attorney 64th Judicial Among these 729 school children, CHARLES CLEMENTS, of defects per child. The number with enlarged tonsils were 297, 31 with submerged tonsils, 122 that needed eyelids treated, 97 that had adenoids, 150 who needed glasses badly; 136 with defective hearing, 385 that needed ed teeth treated, 119 who needed gums treated, 20 who were over 10 gums treated, 20 who were over 10 pounds overweight, and 299 who were five pounds or more underweight.




