June 10th, 1919. This day came on to be considered THE STATE OF TEXAS the Petition of E. P. Thompson and more than fifty other property tax paying voters of Floyd County, Texas, County, to determine if the Bonds of said county shall be issued to the amount of \$500,000.00, payable forty years from their date and bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent, per annum, with option of redemption any time after ten years from their date, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining or operating, macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof; and whether there shall be annually levied and colrected on all of the taxable property in said County, while said Bonds or any of them are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on same, and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity;


