

BANK AT GRAHAM

Graham, Texas, Sept. 2 .--- While a

Guaranty State Bank of Graham of \$10,000 in cash at 2:30 this afternoon Mauldin, cashier of the bank, open the safe and deliver to them the available cash. After the money had been placed in a sack which the robbers brought with them they demanded Liberty bonds. Mr. Mauldin said the bank had no bonds, as it had been in business only a few months, during which time none had been acquired. Mr. Mauldin was then placed in the vault with the other employes and the robbers left town.

Only one of the men wore a mask and he removed it before the robbery of the bank was completed. In ordering the young lady stenograph er into the vault, one of the robbers apologized for his act, but explained that he had to play safe. The bank's loss is fully covered by insurance.

It was about fifteen minutes before Cashier Mauldin and the other employes who were locked in the vault managed to secure their release. Immediately after releasing himself Mr. Mauldin gave the alarm. It was learned that the robbers left town on the road leading to Mineral Wells.

The Sheriff's department was notified and a posse left in pursuit of the robbers, who are believed to be traveling by automobile. It was learned late this afternoon the robbers evaded the officers by taking to the woods near Finis, after which they drove to Finis and obtained information as to the direction the officers were traveling. Finis is fourteen miles south of Graham.

All roads leading out of Finis are neavily guarded tonight. Mr. Mauldin has offered a reward

of \$250 for the arrest of the men.

LIGHTER THAN ALUMINUM

The lightest metal now known that remains comparatively unaltered under ordinary atmospheric conditions is magnesium, which is only twothirds as heavy as aluminum. Magnesium is a beautiful silvery-white metal that has been made in the United States only since 1915 and is now made at but three plants. It is known to comparatively few people and to most of those few chiefly as a silvery powder used for making flash lights in photography. It was imported from Germany for this use for many vears. During the world war large quantities of powdered magnesium were made in the United States for use in star shells designed to illuminate battle fields at night, as well as in special shells designed to show in the daytime exactly where the shells containing it exploded. The white cloud by day and the brilliant white pillar of fire by night-both striking features of the battle fields of the world war-were produced by the combustion of magnesium.

The United States / Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Floyd, Texas, to be held at Floydada, Texas, on October 9, 1920, to fill the position of rural carrier at Floydada, Texas, and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above mentioned county. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977 Both men and women ,if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in request ing certification of eligibles. Women will not be considered for rural carrier appointment unless they are the widows of U. S. soldiers, sailors, or marines, or the wives of U.S. soldiers, sailors, or marines who are physically disqualified for examination by reason of injuries received in the line of military duty. Form No. 1977 and application blanks may be obtained from the officers mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.
