MAGNOLIA CODE BOOK FIGURES IN HEARING

W. C. PROCTOR ON STAND AT COR SICANA WITH BOOKS AND RECORDS.

REGARDING SOME PURCHASES

timony Shows That Some Products
Bought by Magnolia Shipped
on Standard Boats.

Corsicana, Texas.—In the proceedings before Special Commissioner Robey to take testimony in the \$99,000,000 penalty case brought by Attorney General Looney against Magnolia Petroleum Company et al., state counsel Messrs. Maury and Sweeton, continue to propound questions to bring out the fact of relations between the Magnolia Company and Standard Oil. The chief item of development along that line was made through the introduction of contracts and records supplied by W. C. Proctor of the Magnolia, showing that the Magnolia is buying Mexican orude from the Standard of New Jersey and that some crude which it is purchasing from the Huasteca Petroleum Company has Huasteca Petroleum Company transported on vessels of the Standard of New York.

In a large bundle of telegrams produced by Mr. Proctor, was one which he sent Feb. 5, 1909, to C. N. Payne, Titusville, Penn. reading as follows: "Telegram received, cannot that measure has been introduced. Will have record legislature examined and advise you of any time development."

This is the translations of the telegram from code, according to the present code book of the Magnolia Company, which, however, was not in existence at the time telegram was existence at the time telegram was sent. Mr. Proctor was asked if he did not know that the Stevens bill to regulate the reports of companies dissolved for violation of the anti-trust law was then pending in the Texas legislature. He answered that he did not know anything about it.

NOT TO VOTE ON RESOLUTION.

Defect as to Date of Submission Makes Amendment Worthless,

Austin, Texas.-There will be nfusion incident to submitting the bond amendment to the constitution as proposed in senate joint resolution No. 18, for the governor has announced that senate joint resolution No. 4 will not be submitted. A fatal defect has been found in the latter resolution and the attorney general advises that it is a nullity. The date of the year for submitting the amendment in No. 4 is omitted. At merely says July 19, and this is fatal omission, holds the attorney general. Following the receipt of this opinion the governor authorized the statement that he will not issue his proclamation submitting No. 4. No. 18, for the governor has announced

Now that No. 4 is not to appear on the ballots No. 4 will not be the excuse or weapon for fighting No. 18.

DECISION ON MEATS REVERSED.

Live Stock, Wheat and Oats Placed on Free List by Subcommittee.

Washington.-Reversing its former action in voting to place wheat, flour, catmeal and fresh meats on the du-tiable list, the senate finance subcomtiable list, the senate finance subcommittee in charge of the agricultural schedule voted to place live stock, wheat and oats on the free list. This action, it was authoritatively stated, was taken to meet the views of President Wilson; Senator Simmons, chairman of the finance committee, and other administration leaders who disapproved the decision announced to tax meats 10 per cent, compensatory to a duty in cattle in the Underwood bill, and to assess a compensatory duty on both flour and oatmeal.

FEDERALS YIELD MATAMOROS

Defenders Abandon Place After Ex-hausting Their Ammunition.

Brownsville, Texas.—The last desperate stand by the decimated garrison of regulars and volunteers intrenched around the main plaza in Matamoros was made at 3 o'clock Wednesday morning. At the time the men, who had been in the trenches since before 10 o'clock the day before, of 19 hours, without a moment for rest or eating, having burned up the last cartridge in their valiant fight to hold the city against Blanco's men, had to quit. They did not surrender; they merely ran out of powder and balls and the fight came to an end.

merely ran out of powder and balls and the fight came to an end.

Notwithstanding this, Blanco's men did not attempt to force the center of the city until 5 o'clock when they advanced firm upon the Market plaza, which they had occupied at 3 o'clock Tuesday. At 6 o'clock they took charge of the city entirely, although it had virtually been theirs since the fighting of the early night.

Blanco had only 500 men engaged

Blanco had only 500 men engaged n taking the city, the other 500 being held in reserve. This placed the forces almost on an equal basis. The total number of dead accounted for is above 80, and the dead may recath the 100 mark before the bodies are gathered.

The list of wounded on both sides The list of wounded on both sides will not reach forty. Thirty were accounted for as actually seen, and others who were slightly wounded were probably being taken care of in their homes. The improvised hospital at the light plant cared for nine dead and 22 wounded. Of the nine dead three were federals and the remainder Castro's men. Of the wounded all bu two were federals.

a day 21 years of continuous service a day 21 years of continuous service with this paper, 18 of which were in the capacity of managing editor. He was en route to Mansfield, Ohio, the place of his birth, to join his two daughters for the summer, after which he expected to travel extensively in foreign countries. He had spent 35 years in the newspaper profession and years in the newspaper profession and announced his intention of retiring to

According to reports Mr. Hedges ar rived in Crestline on a train from Cininnati, leaving the train at this junc-tion to change cars for Mansfield, 12 niles east. He was not in good health and made inquiries about physicians, secured some medicine and went to a hotel and retired. His dead body was later found in the bed in his

\$70,000 FIRE AT WICHITA FALLS.

Two Business Buildings Destroyed and Another is Badly Damaged.

Wichita Falls, Texas.—Fire, originating here Friday afternoon resulted in the destruction of two business buildings, serious damage to another and losses in stocks and merchandise, stocks and processes.

Practically all of the losers carried insurance which will prabably cover the total loss. The fire originated in the kitchen of a cafe from a gasoline explosion, which followed the lighting of a pan of grease. Several were slightly burned and many more had narrow escapes.

War Awiator a Failure.

Douglas, Ariz.—A. W. Williams, the Douglas aviator who has been flying with Didier Masson in his Guaymas experiments, returned to Douglas and reported that Masson is not able to manipulate his machine at a height sufficient for safety and has given up his attempt to blow up the federal his attempt to blow up the federal gunboat in Gauymas harbor. He says it has been decided to use the machine only in scout work.

ACQUIT WOOD OF CONSPIRACY

Fail to Agree Upon Atteaux and Find Collins Guilty on Two Counts.

Boston, Mass.—A jury acquitted President William M. Wood of the American Woolen Company of the charge of conspiracy to injure the tex-tile strikers at Lawrence by "planting" two counts and not guilty on the other four counts of the indictment. The first count charged conspiracy to injure the textile strikers and the second count conspiracy to injured unknown persons. The other counts allege conspiracy against certain persons and a plot to damage property.

Negro Hanged in Capital.

Washington.-Nathaniel Green, negro, who criminally assaulted a white woman within sight of the Cap itol on Christmas night, went to his on a charge of violating the Sherman anti-trust law. It is alleged the defendants conspired against the coal opterators of Western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois to raise wages in the West Virginia coal fields so as to prevent competition with other states.



Washington.—The "people's lobby," as represented by President Wilson's solicitude for lifting the tariff burden from the necessities of life, was dragged into the lobby inquiry here Friday afternoon, when, as a direct result of charges aimed at the chief execuof charges aimed at the chief execu-tive by Senators Townsend of Michi-gan and Weeks of Massachusetts, the senate investigation committee adopt ed a resolution embodying a plan to show exactly how much pressure the president has brought to bear on wavering Democrats to induce them to sup-port the free list in the Democratic tariff bill. So far the committee care-fully has refrained from questioning senators as to their conferences with the president, but the resolution adopt-ed provides that any senator may be recalled for the express purpose of finding out just what arguments the president used in support of his poli-

The dragging in of the president is the trump card of Republican senators in an effort to make political capital, if possible, for themselves out of the inquiry. The Democrats profess to be elated over the prospects of revealing to the country the methods being employed by President Wilson "in his efforts to see that the campaign pledges made to the American people are carried out by a Democratic congress." CURE DEFECT IN INCOME TAX.

Flaw Discovered in Section That Make Measure Unconstitutional.

Washington-Before the senate acts an the Underwood tariff bill, the in-come tax section will be amended to remedy a defect which, it was discovered, would make the measure un-constitutional. When the framers of the income tax provision fixed Jan. 1, 1913, as the date from which to com-pute incomes for taxation, they over looked the fact that the constitutional amendment authorizing an income tax amendment authorizing an income tax was not proclaimed as ratified until

Feb. 25, 1913.

This fact was brought to the attention of the senate finance subcommittee which has the income tax under consideration and an amendment probably will be drafted at once.

arguments have been presented in fa-vor of making the taxable income ac-crue for the first year from July 1 or later. As far as the constitutional limitation is concerned, it would be legal to compute income for 1913 from March 1.
