The provisions of the Act apply to all persons who have served in the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps during the present war, honorably discharged since April 6, 1917. In cases where such clothing and uniforms have been restored to the government on their discharge the same shall be returned and given to such soldier, sailors and marines.
