FIRST AID CLASS WILL BEGIN NEXT MONDAY

Mrs. L. V. Smith, chairman for Floyd County of the American Red Cross, returned home last Friday from a meeting of county officials with superintendents of divisions for the southwestern department, held in Dallas. She reports that Floyd County is rated very highly in Red Cross work, the only thing short in the record of the county being that of furnishing nurses and nurses' aids. The meeting in Dallas was a very enthusiastic one and was very instructive as well.

All arrangements have been made for the beginning of a Class in First Aid, looking toward making up the deficency in this branch, Mrs. Smith said. "Next Monday at four p. m., we will start a class in First Aid," she said, "and all wishing to take this work are asked to report at that time. Those entering schools for nurses are given credit for this work and young men who have this work are in line for promotion when they enter military service."

The chapter has arranged for thoroughly competent instructors to give these courses. The first meeting will be held at the Red Cross rooms.



The Hotel Division of the Food Administration is calling the attention of the State Hotel Chairmen to the waste of grease through the kitchen drain pipe, and the importance of conserving on the part of the retailers, to sell 315 Trench Mortar Battery, American this grease for the manufacture of nitro-glycerine and other ex- more sugar. plosives. It is conservatively estimated that material enough to furnish the explosive power for at least 90,000 seventy-five milli- allotments the Food Administration meter shells is going to waste in hotels and restaurant kitchens every day.

The same material in its existent shape would bring from four ten cents per pound, depending upon its condition and the local demand. The allies are asking the American people to increase only 66 2/3 per cent of their face value. our glycerine production for the remainder of this year by 30,-000,000 pounds.

Tests were recently made in a large Chicago hotel after the preparation and serving of 1,400 meals. The waste that went into lotments to retailers on their state twenty days, exclusive of the day of the drain was trapped and one hundred and eight (108) pounds of grease were recovered. This is about one and one-quarter sugar going through that channel in (1 1/4) ounces per meal. It is believed that the waste per meal in the average public eating place would figure out anywhere from million pounds over the August allot deceased: half an ounce to one ounce per person.

While this grease being wasted in Texas public eating and August. places might be converted into soap, it has just now a far more important value. It may be used exclusively in the manufacture of cordite and nitro-glycerine. One pound of this grease would be sufficient to provide the powder charge of three 75 millimeter shells.
