#### **Course in Institutional Cookery** Now Provided at C. I. A.

A statement from the state college of industrial arts at Denton says that in addition to the courses in foods and cookery offered by the college for the home, the high school and the college, a course in institutional cookery has been installed during the present session for the purpose of training such domestic science students as elect the course, to organize and manage physical property of institutions, to equip and furnish them, prescribe menus and prepare or direct the preparations and serving of foods in college dormitories and other such institutions.

The college of industrial arts, the statement adds, has recently furnished dietitians to Texas woman's college in Fort Worth and to the girls' training school in Gainesville. It is also said that the C. I. A. is the only educational institution in Texas which offers such a course of training. There are fifteen girls enrolled in the institutional management class this session.



The hog territory of the panhandle country of Texas contributed a shipment of 174 hogs on today's market which brought a high price, the entire string bringing \$13.05. Daff Griffith of Floyd county, was the owner of these hogs, which averaged 206 pounds. These hogs were only 10 months old.

"Hog raising is becoming a very important live stock industry in the panhandle country," Mr. Griffith said. "We run them on pasture all through the summer and fatten them on ground kafir corn and milo maize, which are almost equal to corn for fattening purposes. With this feed we add just a little tankage. The country is full of hogs, and they are increasing very fast.




