The most spectular feature of the two days was the school parade, One thousand and twentyeight persons, including teachers, patrons and pupils of twentyfour schools, marched in the line which formed at the bigh school building and marched down the principal thoroughfares and around the court house square.  so-called divining rou is usefulin locating minerals, finding hi den treasure, or detecting crim nals is a curious superstition that has been a subject of discussion
since the middle of the sixteenth century and still has a strong hold on the popular mind, even
in this country. This is evident in this country. This is evident
from the large number of infrom the large number of in
quiries received each year by th quiries received each year by the
United States geological survey United States geological survey,
department of the interior, as to department of the interior, as
the efficacy of such a tw i the efficacy of such a $t \mathrm{wi}$
especially for locating unde especially for locating und ground water. To furnish a re ply to these inquiries the geo
logical survey has logical survey has published a brief paper, by Arthur J. Ellis, on the history of water witch-
ing with a bibliography ing with a bibliography that in cludes a truly astonishing number of books and pamphlets on this uncanny subject.
In summary the paper states: It is doubtful whether so much investigation and discussior have
been bestowed on any other been bestowed on any other sub ject with such absolute lack
positive results. It is difficult to positive results. It is difficuit
see how for practical purposes see how for practical purposere
the entire matter could be mor thoroughly discredited. It is by thoroughly discredited. no means true that an porke oth using a forked twig or for locating water or other minerals are intentional doubtless men of good characte and benevolent intentions, However, as anything that can be deeply verled in mystery affords a golod opportunity for
swindlers, there can be no rea sonable doubt that many of the large group of professional finders of water, oil, or other miner-
als who take pay for their "services" or for the sale of their "instruments" are deliberately defrauding the people and that the total amount of money they obtain is large. To all inquire the United States geological su vey therefore gives the advice not to expend any money for the services of any "water witch" or for the use or purchase of any machine or instrument devised for locating underground wat or other mindals
History of the Superstition In tracing the theory of this
subject it is found that divining rods have been used (1) to locat ore deposits, (2) to discove buried or hidden treasure, (3) to find lost landmarks and reestab ish property boundaries; (4) detect criminals, (5) to analyze diseases, (7) to trace lost or strayed domestic animals, (8) to insure immunity. against ill fortune by use ás a fetish, (9) to locate well sites, (10) to trace
the courses of the courses of underground
streams, (11) to determine the streams, (11) to determine the drilling at a given spot, (12) to water or ores occur, (13) to determine the direction of cardinal points, (14) to determine the alyze ores and water.
The origin of the superstition is lost in antiquity. What is bedescription of the divining rod is contained in Georgius Agricola's "De re metallica." which was published in 1556. The device became common first in Germany as a means for locating mines and also for discovering buried treasure, a matter of rather common interest in those days. when the practice of burying money and plate for safe keeping was very general. It was man miners during the reign of Elizabeth (1558-1603), and be fore the end of the seventeenth century it had spread through
the countries of Europe. Eyerythe countries of Europe. Eyery
where it aroused controversy, The rules prescribed for the cut-
ting of the twig partook largely

of the old Scandinavian and eve this heathen influence was off set when the rod was duly Christianized by baptism, being laid for this puipose in the bed with a newly baptized child, by whose christian name it was afterward addressed. It is readily conceiv ble that the motive for sur ounding this practice with a re igious atmosphere might no have been altogether a belief in its divine character, for at that time anyone fcund engaged in mysterious works was in danger of being charged with
and burned to death.
Use of the Divining Rod
Detecting Criminals
The divining rod continued to
be a favorite subject with al-
hen new turn of affairs, we
brought about by a Jesuit father, who denounced it as an instruwho denounced it as an instruThe subject was then taken up by the church, and for more than 100 years it was hotly debated by churchmen. Some approved of it and authorized its use on church property; others condemned it and threatened those who used it with ex-communicaSalem witchcraft, its notoriety was greatly increased by the ar rest and execution of a crimina hrough the agency of a peasant who used a divining rod. Interest in this case was intense and
widespread and called forth a widespread and called forth a
large amount of literature. As late as 1703 this peasant was emoloyed to point out with his divining rod protestants for mas-
sacre, under the plea of punishment for crimes they had committed. The divining rod was in some respects closely related
to witchcraft, as is suggested by the use of incantations in connection with divining, and to his relationship may be ascribed in some measure the strengthen
ing of belief in it. Witchcraft at that time had become a frenzy, and anything which by any stretch of the imagination could be suspected of implication with witcheraft became a subject of discussion and the basis of firm opinions and beliefs. In 1701, however, the Inquisition issued a decree against the further use of the divining rod in criminal prosecution, and this use of the devics rapidly came to an ent?

school children are annually sub jected to the experiment of novice teacher. This also mean that the country schools are sur-
