





Some Features of the New Law Governing Automobiles

Beginning July 1, 1917, all owners of automobiles and motor vehicles must register their cars every year with the State Highway Commission, in compliance with the new statutes. On account of the new law having been given little publicity, many are not cognizant of the details in connection with it.

Owners of auto and motor vehicle equipment must pay to the Commission a tax of 35 cents per horse power. Motorcycle t a x will be \$3.00 each. The tax on autos will be no less than \$7.50 each per annum. Texas University Adopts Military Training for All






