The highest previous record in California was at Mammoth Tank,
Aug. 17, 1885, when the temper Aug. 17,1885 , when the tempera-
ture climbed to 127 in the shade.
The 134 record was The 134 record was also a shade
record. It was taken from a thermometer installed on a standard screen, placed above an nlfalfa sod,
four feet above the ground. This shelter was not exposed to the re-
flected heat of the desert. This point is 188 feet below sea level.

not been made accer not been made, according to Mr
