When this was written, Saturday morning at 7 o'clock, Mr. Dorsett's condition was considered by the physicians to be very satisfactory, and no bad results are anticipated. He rested well last night, and his pulse is normal this morning.

Immediately after the shooting Mr. Dorsett was taken to the South Plains hospital.

Mr. Thompson was arrested by Deputy Sheriff W. M. Jeffus and brought to the court house, where he later made bond in the sum of \$2,000, and was released.

Dorsett shot at Thompson twice, but neither bullet took effect. We have not been advised as to how many shots were fired by Thompson.




