

Her estimate was 4,000 population, while the actual figure released by the Census Burea was 3.998. Hers was the nearest out of scores of guesses

Most of the estimates were in the 3,750-4,500 bracket. The lowest guess was 3.555, while the most optimistic was 5,590.

Census figures now being released are disappointing in most instances and in almost every case the totals fall below the claims of enthusiastic town boosters.
