Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force James C. Binnicker will be the guest

Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force James C. Binnicker is advisor to the secretary and the chief of staff of the U.S. Air Force on matters concerning welfare, effective utilization and progress of the enlisted members of the Air Force. He is the ninth chief master sergeant appointed to this ultimate noncommissioned officer position.

Chief Binnicker was born July 23, 1938, in Orangeburg, S.C., where he graduated from Aiken High School in 1956. He graduated from the U.S. Air

Tomorrow the Annual Enlisted Force Senior Noncommissioned Officer Academy in 1973 and the First Sergeant Academy in 1974.

He entered the Air Force in August 1957 and received basic training at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas. He was then assigned to the 96th Air Refueling Squadron, Altus Air Force Base, Okla., 1963. He then cross-trained to the air operations career field and transferred to the 816th Strategic Aerospace Division, also at Altus. In July 1964 he was assigned to the 1502nd Air Transport Wing, Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii.

From August 1967 to August 1968 Chief Binnicker served with the 4th Strategic Aerospace Division, Grand Forks Air Force Base, N.D., as NCOIC, Base Operations. He then transferred to Binh Thuy Air Base, Republic of Vietnam, where he served as NCOIC of operations with the 22nd Tactical Air Support Squadron. Leaving Vietnam in September 1969, he moved to Robins Air Force Base, Ga.

Chief Binnicker served as the Air Force enlisted representative and senior

enlisted advisor on the President's Commission on Military Compensation from October 1977 to April 1978. He returned to 12th Air Force as senior enlisted advisor and in June 1978 he was appointed senior enlisted advisor to the commander in chief, Pacific Air Forces, Hickam Air Force Base. In June 1981 he was assigned to Randolph Air Force Base, Texas, first as chief of the Enlisted Retention Division, Manpower and Personnel Center, and in May 1982 he was appointed assistant for chief master sergeant matters. He became senior enlisted advisor to the commander, Tactical Air Command, Langley Air Force Base, Va., in May 1985. He assumed his present duties in July 1986.

He was promoted to chief master sergeant Feb. 1, 1976. In February 1985 he was selected for the 33 Year Extended Tenure Program.

Chief Binnicker is married to the former Jan Chambers of Kenansville, N.C. They have two sons, Carmen and Mi-


Airman sentenced to four months



an a safe holiday

Thanksgiving is the traditional beginning of the holiday season. Starting with this time, most of us start becoming more involved with parties, Christmas shopping, and plans to make trips to be with our families over Christmas. I'd like to take this space to talk about some common sense planning in each of these

First, let's talk about parties. The message, "Don't drive drunk" has been out for some time, and I know each of you is aware of the inherent hazards associated with alcohol and the highways; however, the warning bears repeating since each year we see evidence of someone attempting to press their luck. The solution is simple: if you're attending the party and plan on drinking, make arrange-

you're giving the party, draw up a plan to take care of those who have been drinking that will keep them from being behind the wheel. An extra word of caution-expect the unexpected. I remember one unit party I attended at Reese where the weather was beautiful when we arrived, but by the time we left, a front had moved through, and there was two inches of snow covering everything.

These types of changing conditions can easily happen and present an added hazard getting home.

Christmas shopping can involve some unique challenges, particularly if there are some little ones on your list. Each year we read stories of where the holiday has turned to tragedy for some family due to a fatal_accident involving a child and a Christmas present. Plan ahead! Check the recommended age on the toy with the age of the child for ments for someone else to drive and if which you're buying the present. Look

for the obvious hazards—are there small pieces the child can place in their mouth (that is where virtually every small child will first try out the new toy) and get choked, will proper adult supervision be available for those toys that require it,

Additionally, do your Christmas decorations constitute a hazard? Are the trees fresh? Are they placed in a good location away from fireplaces? Will the stand keep them watered and provide sufficient support to keep them from being knocked over? Also, have you checked those old lights to insure the wiring is still good? A little planning can insure a festive season rather than a tra-

Finally, what about that trip home? Some well earned leave at home with family and friends can be a high point for the year if you plan it right. Now is the time to make reservations if you're flying or to plan the route if driving. I recommend each person draw up their regret for failing to plan.

own individual checklist for their trip. This checklist should incorporate several important questions: Have I allocated enough time to make the trip without pressing into the danger zone of fatigue?

Have I got a back-up plan in case the weather doesn't cooperate? If driving, have I had my car checked thoroughly for any defects that might show up on the road? Supervisors—have you reviewed the predeparture briefing and are you prepared to adequately counsel that young troop prior to their trip?

Obviously, I can't cover everything in this short article. I'm sure each of you can add several items to those I've already listed, and you'll possibly find that it takes less time than reading this article did. Most importantly, however, you'll never miss the small amount of time it took to plan a safe holiday season but it may keep you from a lifetime of

I had a pleasant surprise the other day as I walked into the officers' club. I rounded the corner in the main hallway and came face to face with a sharp captain I have known for only the past two

I will refer to this sharp captain as Captain X since he'd probably be embarrassed if I printed his name here. Well, as Captain X and I exchanged greetings, he produced a carefully folded sheet of paper from his pocket.

He had a very contented expression as he invited me to read his typed letter. Just so I don't spoil his message by conditioning your response to his letter, I'd like to read it "cold" as I did:

"Although many of my peers are not aware as of yet, I stopped my separation request today. Like many of the pilots who edged into their six-month window before termination of their pilot training commitment, I applied for separation. Not so much for dissatisfaction with the Air Force, as for the chance to excel in a new arena. With the current airline hiring boom, I had little doubt about the direction or success of my future civilian

"I was transferred to the simulator for the last months of my active duty service, where I would administer evaluations to both the active and reserve wings' pilots. It was in this close association with the airline pilots who fly reserves that I first began to be troubled by my decision to leave the Air Force. Not that the airline pilots were bad guys, rather many were and are my friends. But, in all the discussions, not once was a 'greater good' mentioned. The guys basically worked for a paycheck and owed their more to a better contract and perhaps a better offer than to a greater

This greater good is more important to me than the eventual financial rewards of a successful airline career. I flew the initial resupply of Marines to Beirut after the terrorist bombing there and immediately returned to participate in the rescue efforts on Grenada. I truly believe my actions had contributed to something important then and I liked how it felt.

"Through this somewhat circuitous route, I discovered the feelings which motivated me to enter into the service of my country so long ago still controlled my heart and hence my actions. Although I've always been proud of my position as a member of the U.S. Air Force, I believe I now have a greater appreciation of why. You see, I've never worked for just a paycheck before.

I can't add much to what Captain X had to say. He realizes at a very young age what so many of us take years and often many jobs to figure out-happiness is derived from within when we feel we have served a greater cause and monetary compensation will never replace personal satisfaction over the long haul. 

Contract dental care to begin

getting ready to begin the new Active Duty Dependents Dental Plan, has asked for bids on a contract to provide dental benefits to the dependents of activeduty service members.

The "request for proposals" was released Oct. 31. The bidding period ends Jan. 7, 1987; after evaluation of the bids, the contract is expected to be awarded in early April 1987.

Under the contract, activeduty families will be automatically enrolled in the dental program and will pay a small mon-

The Defense Department, in thly premium—probably no more than \$10, since about 60 percent of the premium will be paid by the government. The family members (not the activeduty military sponsors themselves) will receive diagnostic, oral examination and preventive dental services at no additional charge (unless they decide to go to a dental care provider who doesn't participate in the new dental program) in addition to the monthly premium.

Besides cost-sharing the monthly premium, the dental plan will pay 80 percent of

charges for basic restorative services such as cavity fillings, stainless steel crowns, and repairs to dental appliances, such as false teeth.

Payment of the monthly premium share will be through payroll deduction.

Since enrollment is automatic, military sponsors will have to fill out a disenrollment form to drop out of the program, or to decline participation for their families. This process of confirming enrollment will take place next spring.

Military dental clinics will continue to provide dependent dental care on a space-available basis, and families may choose between relying on space-available care or enrolling in the new dental plan for the services covered by the plan.

Enrollments will be for a minimum of two years. The planned start-up date for dental benefits is Aug. 1, 1987.

The dental benefits program will not be open to military retirees or their families, to survivors of deceased active or retired military members, or to former spouses of service mem-

...about progress in resolving the POW and MIA issue: Admiral William Crowe Jr., chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, on July 19 reassured the National League of Families of American Prisoners and Missing in Southeast Asia of this nation's continuing commitment and of recent progress in resolving the POW and MIA issue. Admiral Crowe listed:

-Enhanced intelligence resources. He said intelligence priorities for the POW and MIA issue have been "refined" to bring the "entire intelligence apparatus to bear more directly on the problem."

-An increased responsiveness by the governments of Vietnam and Laos to U.S. concerns.

—Continuing efforts to locate and free any live Americans who may still be in Southeast Asia. He said, "The U.S. government operates on the assumption that at least some Americans are still being held captive, which we believe is the only position to take.

Admiral Crowe said the United States presses for answers in the face of factors which might discourage nations without the resolve of America. "This is what America is all aboutmustering expertise and technology to overcome the adverse and unkind circumstances," he told the families.

He said that despite hopeful signs, "This is a painful process and final success remains elusive. (AFNS)





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

Weather

For the first time in a long while, the weather at Reese became a little more normal and desirable. For most of the week, the temperatures have been mild, staying in the mid-sixties and lower seventies and the overnight lows in the mid-forties. Winds made their appearance resulting from disturbances that continually moved through the area throughout the week. On Wednesday morning rainshowers entered the area during the morning hours producing .11 inches of rainfall. The winds have been out of the west and occasionally gusting to 35 knots but then again, for anybody that has been at Reese for any length of time will remember that this is nothing out of the ordinary.

The weather trend for the next few days will not be bad at all. On Friday the area will be under the remnants of a high pressure center tha moved into the area late Wednesday, early Thursday. The skies on Friday should remain partly cloudy with temperatures in the mid sixties and the overnight low of about forty. The winds should remain predominately out of

the south well into the weekend.

As a result of the southerly wind direction, the temperatures will be a little warmer on Saturday but by late Saturday and into early Sunday, there will be a minor frontal passage from the north and this will switch the winds around once again out of the north. There will be a small chance of precipitation associated with the increasing cloudiness resulting from frontal passage Saturday evening. The front appears to be moving quite rapidly and is expected to be through the area by late Sunday leaving the rest of the weekend quite pleasant. The temperatures on Saturday will be around the upper sixties to the lower seventies with the overnight lows expected in the mid

forties. The winds will be gusty on Saturday and Sunday because of the presence of the front. On Saturday the winds are expected out of the south while on Sunday, the winds should begin to come out of the north. For the early part of next week, there is no real threatening system moving into the Reese area at this time. Have a pleasant weekend since Mother Nature is out causing trouble for other portions of the world and leaving us alone.


