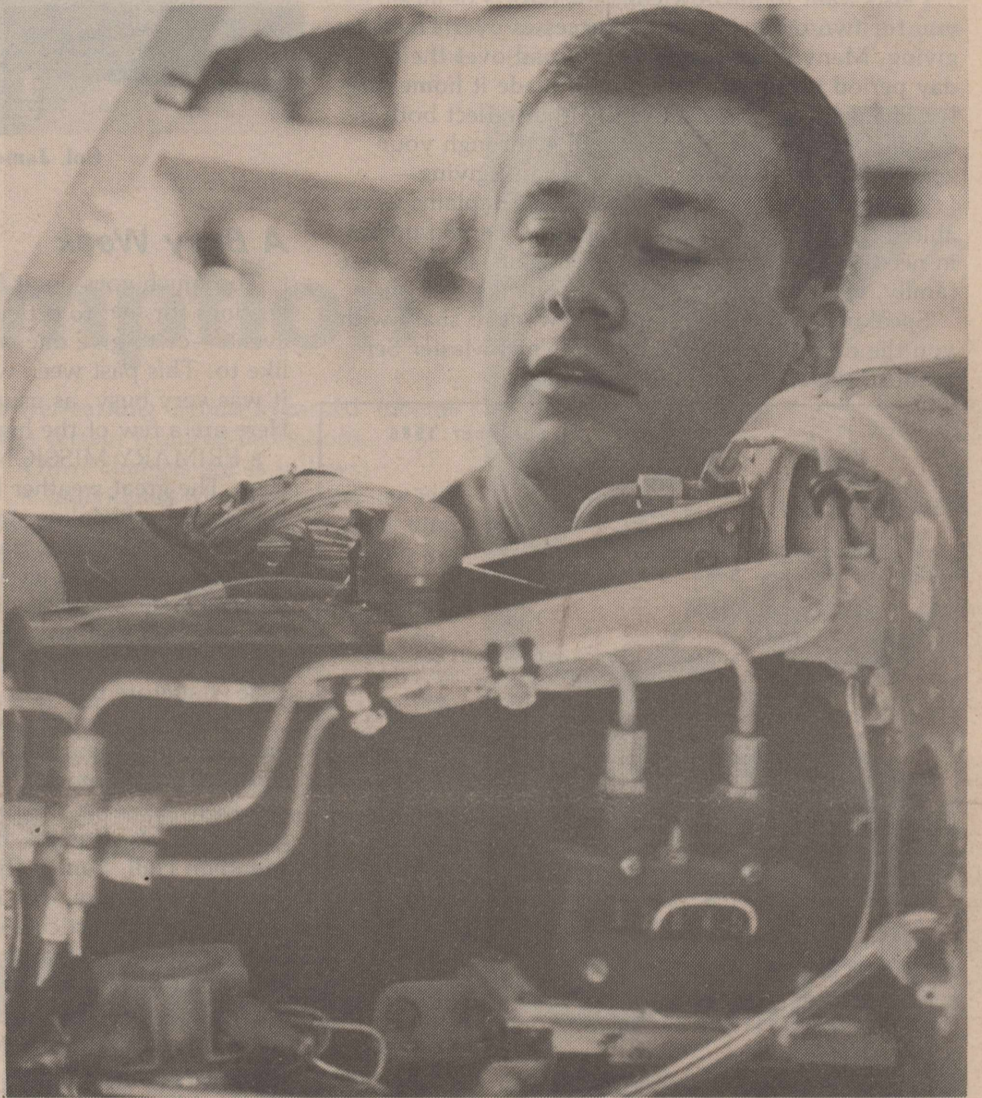

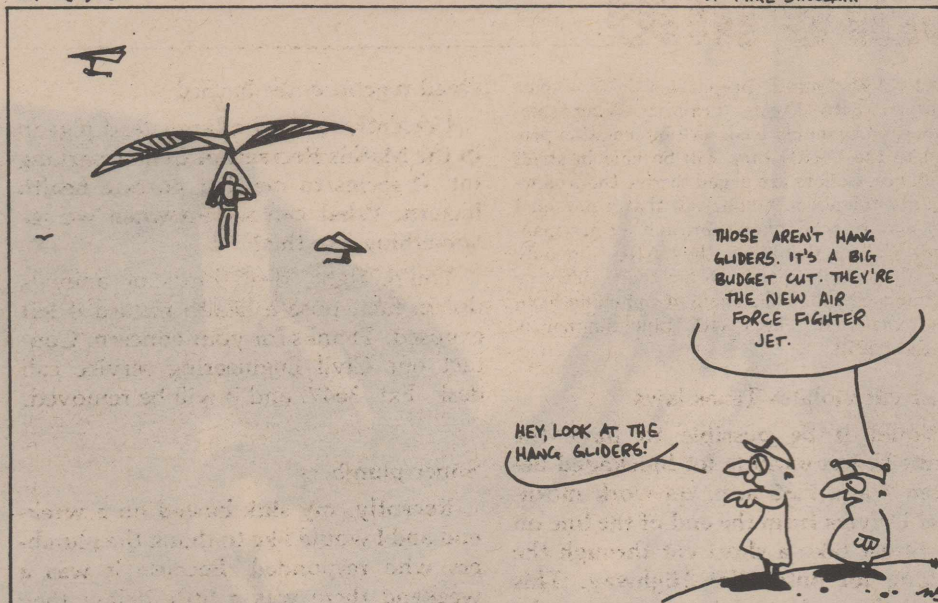

Health Care Finder Initiative to Reese

Reese Hospital has been designated as one of the eight Air Force Medical Treatment Facilities, and the ATC nominee to be a test base for the Health Care Finder Initiative. Reese's input will be a part of the recommendations which will be made to the Air Force Surgeon General in mid-January.

What could this new program offer to our Reese patients? This new program would allow the hospital commander to expand the current range of services by adding qualified civilian physicians to the staff. We would also be able to assist patients in finding quality, cost-effective civilian health care which is now outside the capabilities of the base hospital.

But what are the real benefits for Reese people? Well, for starters, the hos-

pital is looking for a new pediatrician to supplement the one assigned Air Force pediatrician. If we are successful, the new physician would see patients here at the hospital and accept CHAMPUS rates. Our patients would have the convenience of the base hospital instead of searching for a physician downtown.

They would also have the convenience of the hospital's laboratory, x-ray, and pharmacy.

The on-base portion of the Health Care Finder Initiative is only one benefit of the program. In the past it was not approved for the hospital to refer our patients to a CHAMPUS physician because of potential conflict of interest. We are now contacting civilian physicians in the

area and encouraging their participation in the Health Care Finder at no more than the CHAMPUS allowable charge.

The Health Care Finder Initiative could save our military families a substantial amount of money. If we are able to negotiate rates that are less than the CHAMPUS allowable charge, the government will also share in the savings.

When will all of this come about? We hope it will be very soon. Keep reading the Roundup. Whenever we have some news we will make every effort to let you know. Mr. Robert Gregorio, our Health Benefits Advisor, will also provide assistance with CHAMPUS questions that you may have.

Tax tips

Personal exemption

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 has substantially increased the personal exemption amount for individual taxpayers.

This year the personal exemption amount for an individual, the individual's spouse and each eligible dependent is \$1,080. The Tax Reform Act has also increased this exemption to \$1,900 for 1987, \$1,950 for 1988 and \$2,000 in 1989. After 1989, the \$2,000 personal exemption amount will be adjusted for inflation.

Under the new tax reform rules, indi-

viduals will still retain the ability to deduct the mortgage interest paid on a principal residence. Basically the same rule applies to second homes that are owned by an individual and used as a dwelling unit during any part of that year.

Interest is fully deductible if the amount of the debt does not exceed the cost of the property plus any capital improvements.

The year 1986 will be the last in which the two-earner married couple deduction can be taken. This deduction from gross income equals 10 percent of the lesser of \$30,000 or the amount of the

lower-earning spouse's earned income less certain required deductions.

Other changes are as follows:

- Individuals who do not itemize will lose their deduction for charitable contributions after this year. So, if you are planning a contribution in the near future, you should strongly consider making the contribution by Dec. 31, 1986. The \$100 exclusion (\$200 on a joint return) for dividends received has also been repealed for tax years beginning after 1986.

Remember, investments into Individual Retirement Accounts for the 1986 tax year must be made prior to April 15, 1987.

MWR programs to get budget cut

Morale, Welfare and Recreation programs will receive less funding from Congress this Fiscal year, according to MWR officials.

The Fiscal 1987 Appropriations Act directs the Defense Department to reduce support by \$69.5 million. Air Force share of the reduction is \$21.5 million for money-making MWR activities in larger stateside metropolitan areas.

The MWR officials said Congress is concerned about the increasing amount of appropriated funds used to support golf courses, bowling centers, marinas, club activities and other 'revenue-generating' activities.

After Sept. 30, no appropriated funds will be used to support these activities.

DoD will submit a list of installations by April 1 that will be affected by this suspension. Guidelines are being developed to determine what metropolitan areas will be affected.

Officials said it is too early to judge what MWR areas will lose appropriated funding, but non-appropriated funding will definitely be needed to keep them in business in the future, possibly resulting in higher fees and cuts

in services.

They added that other activities which are not intended to generate revenues may also be affected by changes required to

implement this new funding policy.

Congress also has requested that DoD develop a clear, consistent determination of the ap-

propriated and non-appropriated fund requirements for both MWR and non-appropriated fund activities by July 1.

The Air Force has established

a study task force to perform a top-to-bottom review of MWR to define the role, funding and direction for MWR in the future, officials said.

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Time-on-station rules change

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—The Air Force has changed some of its time-on-station requirements, including procedures for time-on-station waivers.

Air Force officials said the changes, effective Sept. 1, will save permanent-change-of-station funds by reducing the number of PCS moves.

Career service members must now have 24 months time-on-station stateside, regardless of volunteer status, before moving overseas. The time-on-station requirement used to be 12 months.

First-term airmen and lieutenants may still go overseas after

only 12 months time-on-station stateside. Anyone moving between overseas locations must serve the full tour lengths at both locations.

The minimum time-on-station requirement for stateside reassignments remains 36 months. However, the Air Force has changed who must request and

approve waivers to that time-on-station requirement.

Now, a general officer must originate waiver requests, and in most cases the Secretary of the Air Force will be the final approval authority. The same requirements apply to requests and approvals for overseas tour curtailments.

Approved humanitarian reassignments and PCS reassignments associated with schools or retraining receive automatic time-on-station waivers, if needed.

Tuning in on satellite dishes

The satellite dish has become a popular means of improving television reception in areas where cable television is not available.

Although cable service is available in most of the Lubbock area, many residents still consider purchasing a satellite dish. If you are one of them, learn as much as you can before you buy, by visiting several of the reputable dealers in the local area. Prices ranging from \$598 uninstalled to a \$5,000 installed package deal indicate the wide variety of quality and sizes

available. The bottom line is: Make an informed decision before you buy.

The satellite dish is a good means to improve reception because it is positioned to pick up signals direct from the communication satellites in stationary orbit overhead. Proper installation is essential to the finely calibrated positioning of the dish. An improperly installed dish can result in poor reception or even no reception at all.

If you are only buying a satellite dish to get around the high monthly fees charged by the cable companies, and still get the good movie channels, then beware. At the present time it is perfectly legal to own a dish,

and it is for your private use. But, many companies are beginning to scramble their signals, much in the same way cable signals are scrambled to preclude dish owners from receiving the service without paying for it. In the future, it is likely that a descrambler will have to be purchased in order to receive some of the scrambled channels. However, there are still around 100 unscrambled channels that can be picked up by the average dish.

If you have any problems with a dealer, warranty questions or any other legal question concerning satellite dishes, do not hesitate to call the Base Legal Office, Ext. 3505.

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
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Toys for Tots campaign underway

The Toys for Tots' campaign is underway once again.

The 1958th Communications Squadron has placed donation boxes in virtually every building on base. In addition they have canvassed base housing and solicited toys, new and used. Last year, they collected over 1,000 toys. This year they expect to do even better. The 1958th Comm. Squadron collects, sorts and delivers these toys to the Marine Corps Reserve unit in Lubbock for distribution.

The United States Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots' program was founded in 1947 by Marine Co. (then Major) Bill Hendricks, and is designed to provide Christmas joy for needy children through the collection of new toys.

The program has grown from an annual Los Angeles area project to a nationwide campaign, complete with benefit concerts, sporting events, corporate involvement, and, from the beginning, celebrity support.

Through his contacts as a Warner Brothers executive and member of the Advertising Club of Los Angeles, Colonel Hendricks was able to initiate a publicity campaign that, over the years, has featured such notables as John Wayne, Art Linkletter, Charlton Heston, Angie Dickenson and Nancy Reagan.

Historical milestones for the program were reached in 1956 when the Toys for Tots' theme was composed by oscar-winning songwriters Sammy Fain and Paul Francis Webster. In 1958, the program went international by providing toys for children of the typhoon devast-

ated city, Nagoya, Japan. In 1960 KABC TV of Los Angeles received the highest non-military award possible from the commandant of the Marine Corps for sponsorship of a spectacular Toys for Tots' circus.

The year 1962 saw the first Toys for Tots' association with a major sports organization when the New York Yankees hosted a "bring a toy" game with the Washington Senators.

The Public Relations Society of America honored the Marine Corps Reserve with the "Silver Anvil Award" for the 1964 campaign. Six years later, the "father" of the program was officially recognized when Colonel Hendricks was presented the 'Legion of Merit' upon retirement from Marine Corps Reserve.

In 1972, the concept of a "celebrity chairman" was born, with actor Dennis Weaver heading up the traditionally

star-laden roster. This year's honorary national chairman is Clint Eastwood.

To place emphasis on the uniqueness of each community, the program is tailored to fit local needs. In the weeks leading up to Christmas, toys are solicited through all publicity means available and collected through volunteer help. The 1958th Communications Squadron has provided those volunteers.

The Toys for Tots' drive for children here at Reese has been headed by the 1958th Communications Squadron for four years.

There are three principle ways to participate in the Marine Corps Reserve program. Some people choose to join all three as a donor, volunteer worker or sponsor, or conduct your own drive like the 1958th.

As Clint Eastwood might say "Go ahead, make a kid's day."

Computer network is the answer

In 1982, the DoD completed a study of how to best interconnect its installations' computer systems. The result is the Defense Data network, a program to connect all DoD installations via computer network. Existing communications network systems will be expanded and upgraded and become network subscribers. Individual desktop and multiuser microcomputer systems who demonstrate a need, may request connection into the network by submitting an Air Force Form 3215 ISRD.

The program for the network connection will be conducted in

four phases.

Phase I will connect multiuser systems together in a basewide network called Air Training Command Interbase Multiuser Network (AIMNET).

Phase II will connect AIMNET into the Defense Data Network so Air Training Command bases will be able to electronically communicate with other DoD installations.

Phase III and IV, although purely conceptual at this stage, would connect stand alone computers, like Z-100's and other MS-DOS compatible computers into the network.

With this network in full operation any user may communicate or transfer files with any other user in the network.

Wear of winter clothes outlined

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (ATCNS)—Winter is just around the corner, which means Air Training Command people will be getting their winter clothing out of moth balls. The wear of winter clothing for Air Force people is clearly outlined in Air Force Regulation 35-10, "Dress and Personal Appearance of Air Force Personnel."

Confusion arises from not knowing what the Air Force considers outer garments, personal officials say. Here's a brief rundown on cold weather gear and what's appropriate to wear with what. For more information, contact the personal affairs section of your CBPO.

• **Pullover sweater:** may be worn indoors and outdoors and may be worn under the all-weather coat, overcoat, raincoat and parka. It may not be

worn under the lightweight blue jacket. The shirt collar is worn inside the sweater and the tie or tab must be worn.

• **Lightweight blue jacket:** an outer garment only and is not worn indoors. The tie or tab is mandatory and the jacket must be zipped up at least halfway. It is not worn with ear protectors, winter cap or scarf.

• **All-weather coat:** also an outer garment; the tie or tab is not required.

• **Cardigan sweater:** may be worn only with the maternity uniform and only in the duty section. It is permissible for pregnant women to wear the white cardigan sweater, since the blue one has been phased out and may be difficult to obtain.

• **Gloves:** authorized for wear with the overcoat, rain-

coat, all-weather coat, parka, lightweight blue jacket and pull-over sweater. Gloves may be knitted gray wool or black or gray leather, but must be plain, without ornamentation or zipper.

• **Scarf:** may be worn with the overcoat, raincoat, all-weather coat and parka; not authorized for wear with the lightweight blue jacket. The scarf must be no wider than 10 inches and can be flat or tubular knit. It must be gray.

• **Ear protectors:** only authorized for wear with the overcoat, raincoat, all-weather coat and parka. Is not authorized with the lightweight blue jacket. Ear protectors may be dark blue, black or gray and may be of any material, but must be plain.

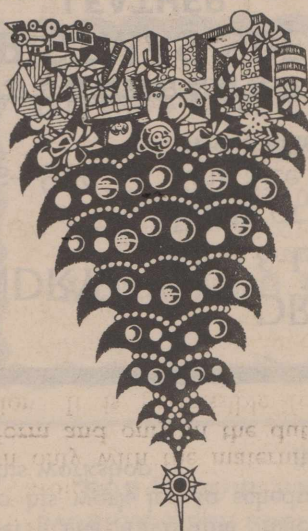

Have you decorated yet?

Decorations:

- Use only electrical lighting sets which bear the UL label.
- Check lighting sets for frayed cords, loose connections, and broken sockets. If damaged, don't use them.
- Be sure the fuse in the circuit serving the tree and other lighting is not over 15 amperes.
- Use noncombustible materials where possible. Untreated cotton bating, flock and paper ignite easily and burn intensely.
- Place the trunk of the tree in water until you are ready to bring it inside, and keep the tree in water after it is brought inside.
- Sawing off the trunk and making a long diagonal cut across the base of the tree will allow maximum moisture in-take and help prevent the tree from drying out.
- Trees should be placed in the coolest part of the room, never close to space heaters or directly in front of heating ducts.
- Artificial plastic and metalized plastic trees can burn. Metal trees are not a fire hazard but may be a shock hazard.
- Artificial trees with built-in electrical systems should have the Underwriters' Laboratories-UL-label.

In the long run they will respect you for sticking to your beliefs, don't fall for that "chicken" routine.

Some teenagers seem to think that stores make a lot of money and won't miss a record, a cassette, or even a tape player. But

the fact is that the stores are losing more to shoplifters each year. First of all, most shoplifters have the money to buy the item they shoplift, at the time of the act. Second, shoplifters think the store won't lose much. The items have been bought and paid for by the store and taking it is stealing. If something that belonged to you were

stolen, it would be a great loss...so it is with a store. In addition, when a store loses because of shoplifters, the money needed to replace the property comes out of the budget of the customers. We as customers pay for shoplifters to steal. Store managers have to raise their prices to overcome the loss

of shoplifters.

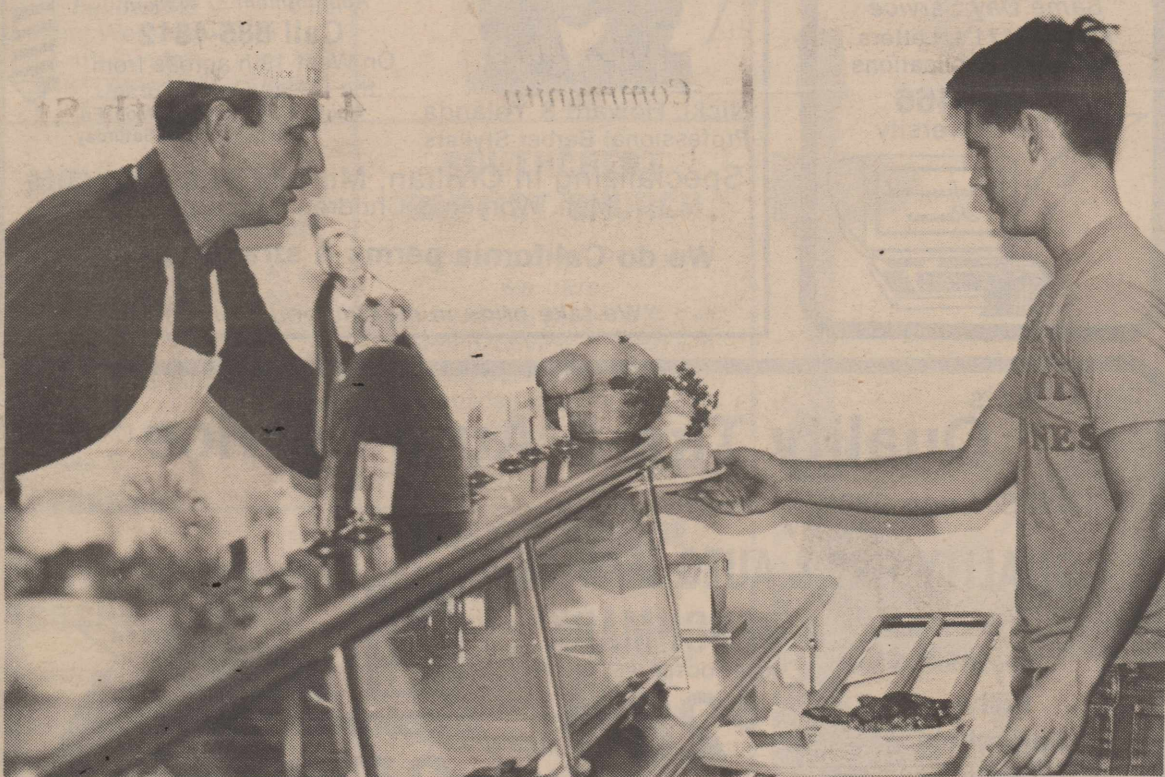

Weather

No snow, no rain, nothing except cold temperatures and windy days. It seems as though everyone about 50 miles in any direction is receiving all of the exciting type weather. Some prefer it this way but some of us would like to see some type of change and maybe that change is on the way.

For the last week the area has had temperatures that varied from 71 degrees on Saturday to a high temperature of 50 degrees on Wednesday. The overnight lows have been in the 30s for most of the week and then dropped to 24 degrees last night. The winds have caused some problems in the area because they began to kick dust up into the air as high as 9,000 feet as reported by the Reese pilots on Monday. The highest velocities that were recorded were about 38 knots. These winds were coming from the north and the result of this was a chill factor that brought the temperature down into the single digits.

There will be a warming trend again, until the weekend. On Friday, the temperature is expected to get into the low 60s and the same is for Saturday. The overnight lows will remain in the 30s. On Sunday, the arrival of two airmass will be experienced. One of the systems will be coming from the Pacific coast and will be an upper level low center that will come into the area from the southern Colorado area. The second air-

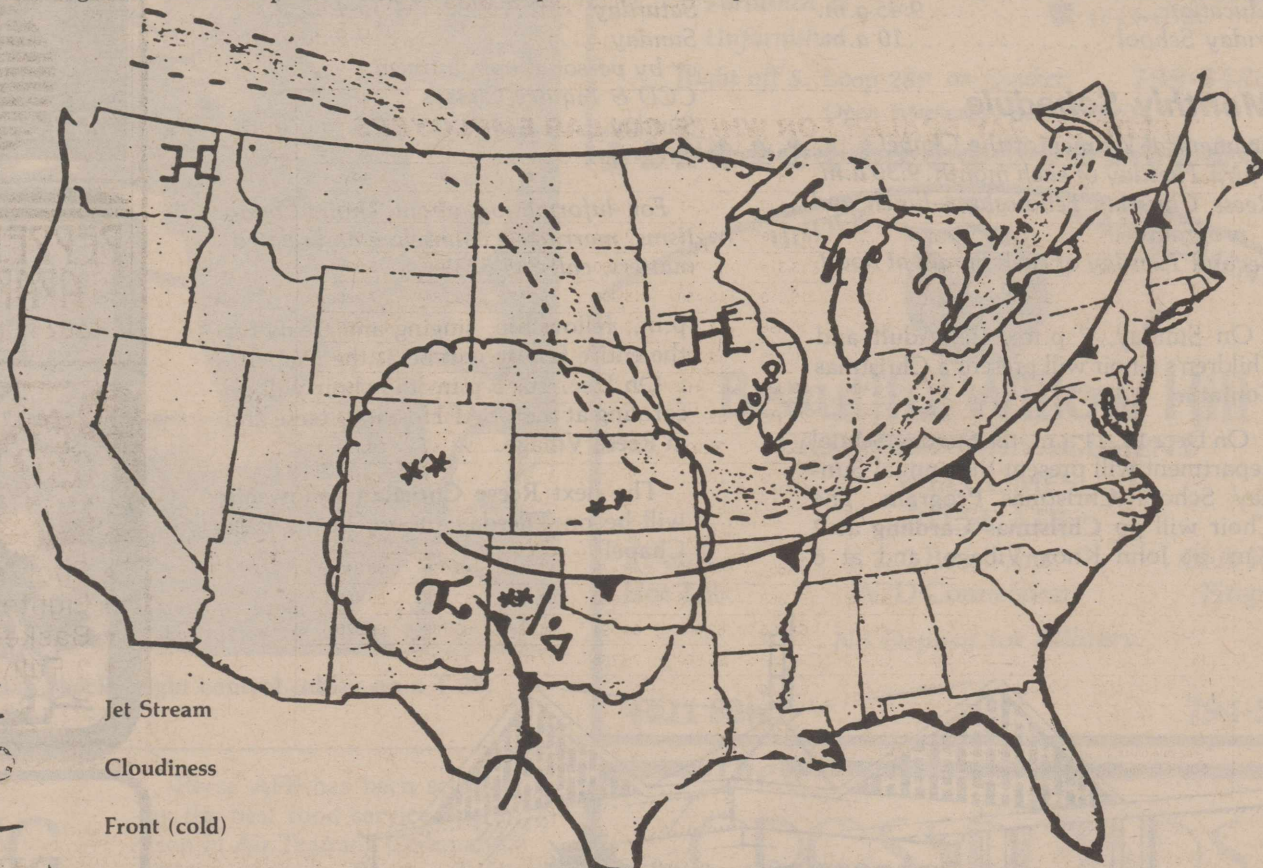
mass is brewing up in the polar regions of the world at this time. It is a strong cold airmass that will make its appearance onto the continental United States by Friday and begin trekking towards Reese through the weekend. The change that this will bring is rainshowers possi-





bly changing to freezing precipitation late Sunday. The temperatures will be dropping into the 20s on Sunday night and reach into the 30s on Monday.

On Monday the chance of snow enters the picture. The synoptic weather picture that is expected to develop in the

area during Sunday and Monday appears to be the best snow producer for Reese this season. Accumulations, if any

at all, are impossible to tell so far in advance, but the chance is there and it is something for us to watch out for.

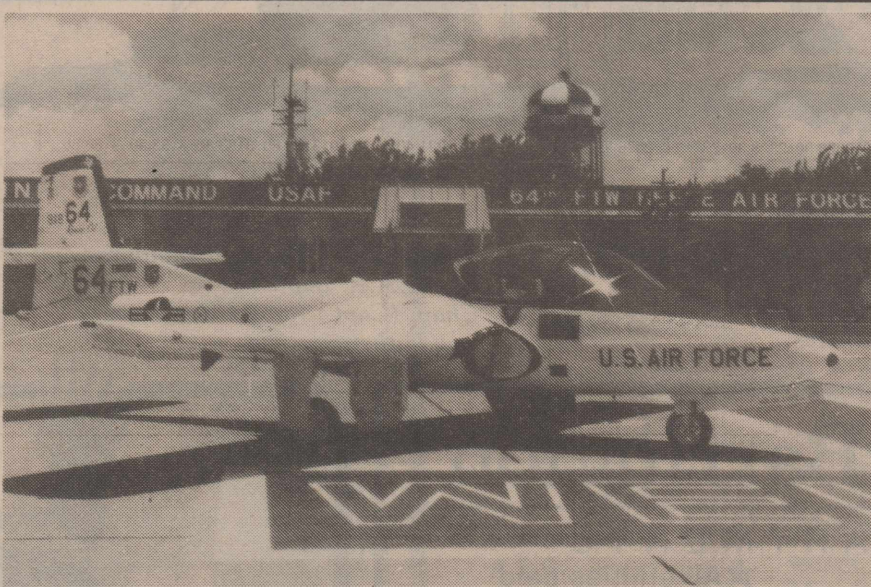

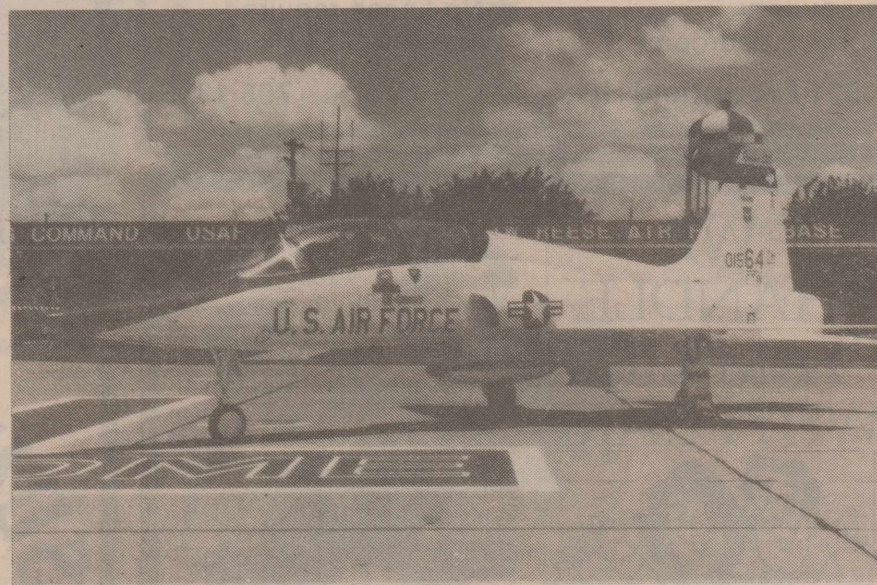


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Military, Civilians Get 3 Percent Pay Raise
