Change of command nears

Three key members of the 64th Flying Training Wing will be moving into new jobs soon, General Andrew P. Iosue, Air Training Command

commander announced last week.

Colonel John Clark Griffith who has commanded the 64th Air Base Group since March

1985 is moving to Laughlin AFB, Texas where he will take command of the 47th Flying Training Wing on July 2.

"It's a good solid wing. No-

thing is broke, so I'm not going to go down there and start fixing things. I'll just let it work for itself," said Col. Griffith.

A formal change of command ceremony is scheduled for Monday, 9 a.m. in front of Bldg. 800. Col. Ted Ownby, commander of troops for the ceremony, said there will be troop formations from Civil Engineering Squadron, Security Police Squadron, Information Systems Squadron and Mission Support Squadron. Col. James McIntyre, wing commander, will preside over the ceremony.

Colonel Charles R. Edwards, deputy commander for operations for the 64th Flying Training Wing will take command. A reception is scheduled at the Officer's Open Mess for the new Air Base Group Commander following the ceremony.

Reese personnel are invited to attend two farewell activities for Col. Griffith prior to his departure for Del Rio, Texas.

Today, all Air Base Group personnel and their friends will have an opportunity to pay an informal farewell to Col. Griffith starting at 3:30 p.m. in the Enlisted Open Mess.

Tomorrow, 6:30 p.m., all Reese personnel are invited to attend the wing's formal farewell to Col. Griffith and his wife Jean in the Officer's Open Mess. A barbecue dinner will be served and dress will be casual. Cost of the meal is \$6.95 per person. Reservations can be made by calling Ext. 3520.

"Every one of those planes has a pilot, without pilots, we would be nothing. That's what makes this job so important," said Colonel Griffith. "If I have the opportunity to come back, I will. Not just to visit my friends here, but also ones down town. If there's one thing I'm proudest of, it's that we haven't gone down hill. We've been on top for so long, and we continue to go up. Reese is going to be here for a long time," he said.

Holiday activities scheduled

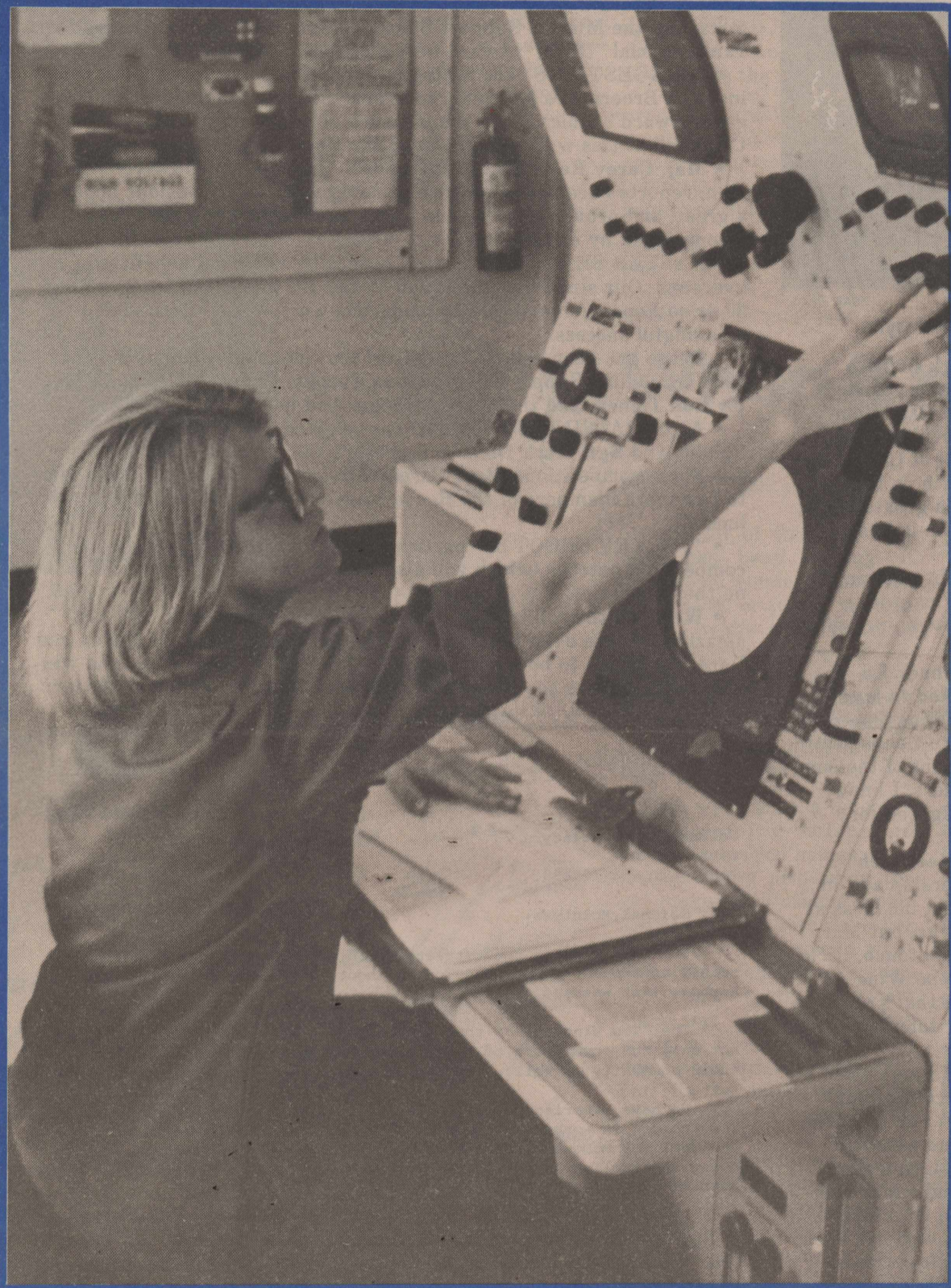
Some Reese aircrews will be busy on the Fourth of July supporting flyover requests from the cities of Post, Denver City, Canyon, Odessa, Midland and Lubbock, Texas. The flyovers will begin at 9:30 a.m. on the Fourth of July with the last flyover at Denver City, Texas at 2 p.m.

This year the Reese Honor Guard will be taking a contingent of 28 members to Arlington Stadium near Dallas, Texas. For the past three years the Reese Honor Guard has supplied 26 flag bearers for this Fourth of July Ceremony. The ceremony will take place during the Texas Rangers and Detroit Tigers game and the Precision Flag Team will support a swearing-in ceremony of new Air Force inductees.

The Honor Guard will also

be represented in the Chamber of Commerce Fourth of July Parade in Lubbock, Texas. A four-man color guard will lead off the Reese entries by carrying the United States and Air Force flags. The color guard commander will be Sgt. Sharon Sharpe who has been on the team for over three years.

The entire parade will be led off by a Joint Services Color Guard. SSgt. Genaro Garza will represent Reese AFB and the U.S. Air Force in this color guard. SSgt. Garza has participated in several Joint Service ceremonies throughout the South Plains and he was hand-picked for this position because of his exemplary dedication and professionalism, according to Capt. Thomas Yodor, Honor Guard Commander.

Freedom Fest '86 activities planned

"What are you going to do the Fourth of July", said 1st Lt. Mark Farmer, Freedom Fest Coordinator. "Come on out and join us at the Reese Freedom Fest '86. On Friday, July 4, from 1-5 p.m., the Reese Freedom Fest '86 Marathon will take place all over base.

"The competition is made up of 24 person organizational teams which will compete in different events in a continuing relay around the base. A total of 19 events will be completed before the finish. The events are as follows:

1. Run from picnic grounds to Wing Headquarters flag-pole; tag cracker eater;
2. Eat three crackers, whistle the entire chorus of the "Star Spangled Banner" in an audible whistle. No spitting of crackers allowed. Tag tricycle rider at road intersection;
3. Ride tricycle around to the fire hydrant between CBPO and the Volleyball Court. Tag volleyball person at fire hydrant. Bring your own tricycle;
4. After tagging tricycle

rider, volleyball person should proceed to the service line and begin serving. Three balls should be served into the service court over the net. Tag basketball person;

5. Make three freethrows and retrieve all missed balls. Tag tennis player at tennis court making sure not to run in front of other volleyball or basketball players. Bring your own ball;

6. Tennis player serves three balls into service court. Cross 5th Street and tag wheel-barrow person. Bring

own balls and racket;

7. Wheel-barrow 50 yards to 13th Street and tag soccer person;

8. Soccer-dribble around 13th Street to track and tag runner. Bring own ball;

9. Run clockwise around track and tag egg-tossers at north end of flicker-ball field;

10. Toss eggs a minimum of 10 yards for the total length of the flicker-ball field. If the egg breaks, start from the beginning. Tag sack-hopper. Bring own eggs;

11. Sack hop across the track towards pool. 100 yards available. Tag leap frogs. Bring your own sack;

12. Leap frog towards pool at least 20 of the 70 yards available then run to the ladder to tag the swimmer;

13. Swimmer walks fast to 3.5 foot deep pool start point, jumps in feet first, and swims to end of pool blowing a ping-pong ball in front. Modified breast stroke works best. No hands allowed. Tag three leg racers;

14. Three leg racers run to

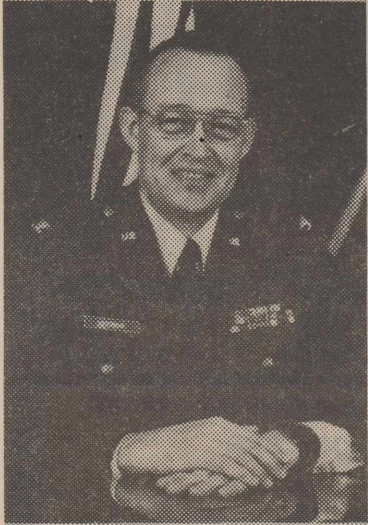
Short "service" at the base service station

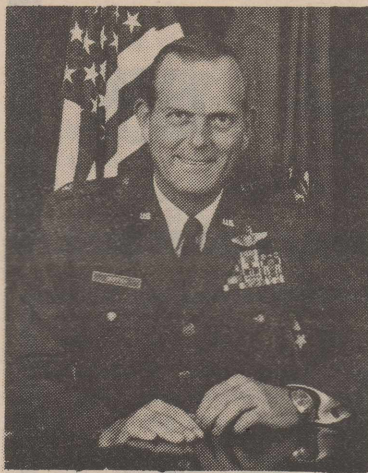
Give some thought to the other hazards. We've already had our first case of heat-stroke on the flight line—really need to watch that—

Chief Binnicker, a South Carolina native, entered the Air Force in August 1957 and began his career as a life support specialist at Altus AFB, Okla. In 1963, he cross-trained to the air operations career field where he worked until 1975 when he was selected as the Senior Enlisted Advisor for TAC's 12th Air Force, with headquarters at Berg-

strom AFB, Texas.

In 1977, he was selected as the Air Force Enlisted Representative and Senior Enlisted Advisor on the President's Commission on Military Compensation. After returning to 12th Air Force as Senior Enlisted Advisor in 1978, he was appointed as Senior Enlisted Advisor to the Commander-in-Chief, Pacific Air Force, until 1981. Local takes yearly award

The Data Automation section of the 1958th Information System Squadron was recently selected as the Air Training Command Information Systems Division Information Processing Center—IPC—of the year for 1985.

During 1985, Data Automation earned an enviable record of achievement and provided outstanding service to its customers. The IPC supported virtually every organization on base with on-line and batch processing and

technical assistance to small computer users. Over the course of the year 13 to 21 military personnel and six to 11 civilians assigned were assigned to IPC.

Air Training Command chose the Reese IPC to be one of two base level IPC's to lead the command with the Phase IV Implementation/Conversation—I/C. Reese quickly proved that the Command's confidence was not misplaced. The level of preparation and commitment to the success of the I/C became apparent as the conversation progressed. The IPC completed the conversion well within the scheduled time frame and as a result the contractor's system analysis was released early.

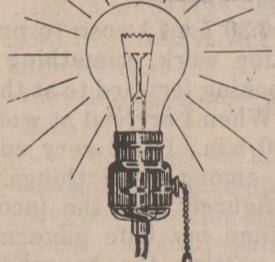
The IPC served as a test

The performance of Data Automation at Reese AFB during 1985 was clearly superior in every respect.

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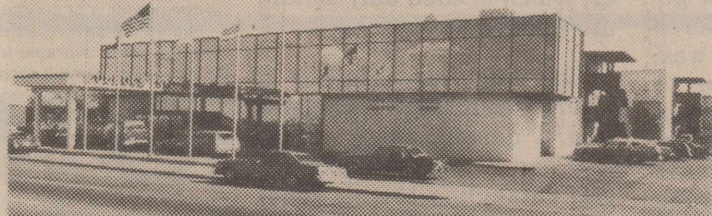
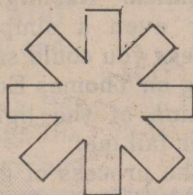

Chief of Staff confirmed

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—Gen. Larry D. Welch was confirmed by the Senate June 19 to be the 12th Chief of Staff of the Air Force. He will assume that role July 1, upon the retirement of Gen. Charles Gabriel.

Gen. Welch has served as Commander in Chief of the Strategic Air Command and Director of the Joint Strategic Target Planning Staff, Offutt AFB, Neb., since August 1985.

Born in Guymon, Okla., General Welch earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Maryland and his master's degree in international relations from George Washington University.

He spent two years in the enlisted ranks with the Kansas Air National Guard before joining the Air Force and then entering the Aviation Cadet program. He received his pilot wings and commis-

sion in April 1955. The 51-year-old command pilot has logged more than 5,500 flying hours. He flew combat missions in F-4C's over North and South Vietnam and Laos. General Welch also served in Tactical Fighter Units in Europe, the Continental United States and Alaska.

General Welch was Air Force Vice Chief of Staff before taking the reins at Strategic Air Command.

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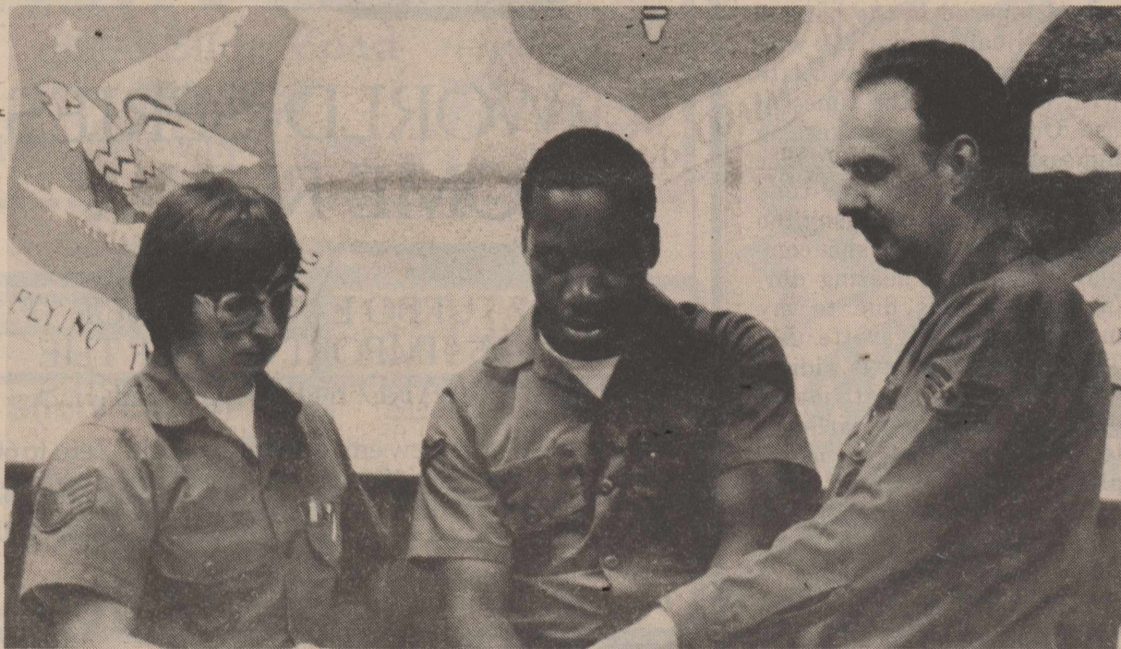
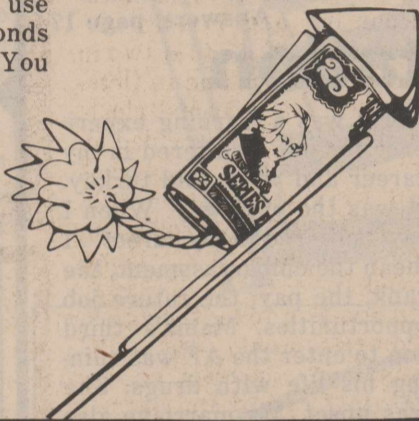

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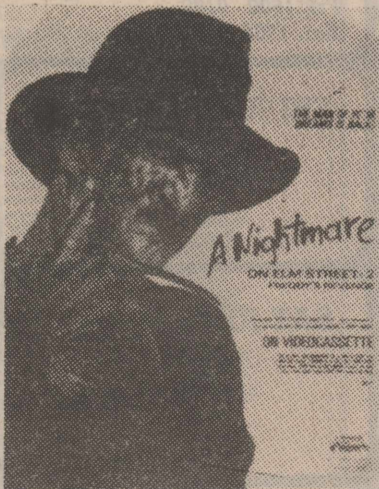
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Knowing about animal bites

A chance for rehabilitation

Today's story is the last of this series. It's a story of how an airman's family life had become affected by his use of marijuana. It's titled "Drugs: A Simulated Euphoria", said SSgt. Jeffrey Kidd, NCOIC, Social Actions.

Drugs: A Simulated Euphoria

After encountering a few massive problems in my life, I decided to turn to drugs for an outlet. My recourse later proved that use of drugs as an outlet for problems is a negative route. The burden of usage alone is slow suicide. In the later months of 1984 and beginning of 1985 my use began slowly and increased to a filthy habit.

I was first introduced to drugs at the age of seventeen with a close friend. I feel that most persons experimenting for the first time are usually introduced to them (drugs) by a friend or group of friends. Depending on the person, usage will cease or continue. The initial times I used marijuana substances I stopped because it wasn't that appealing to me.

Persons who use drugs in the social environment feel a sense of belonging. This may

be a supplement for persons lonely or unwanted lifestyles. But later they realize that friendships based on simulated euphorias are incomplete and short-term. When those "friends" aren't around anymore, the person may use a drug to replace the need of a friend. He thinks "pot is my friend, and pot always listens, stimulates my ideas, and makes me feel good." Once again, simulated euphoria.

As you know, users create a tolerancy and "graduate" to more powerful and brain-smashing drugs. People even use them (drugs) to create a mood for every time perimeter of the day. Example of John Smuck, a chronic user, who is looking for the answer by using various drugs. He wakes up; to clear his head and start his day he snorts the remains of his gram he spent \$100 for (rent money) the previous day. After his heart is beating too fast, he smokes pot to ease his hypertension created. Up and down he goes day to day. He replaces an uppity moody with a downsy drug. He'll use a drug to battle the effects of another.

My escape from the drug

world was a learning experience for me. I suffered in my career and went cold turkey. It was the only way. When I say "suffered in my career", I mean the embarrassment, the rank, the pay, the future job opportunities. Mama's third son to enter the AF was ruining his life with drugs. She was upset. My marriage also was dampered in the haze of the marijuana realm. My wife simply refused to associate with me during the times of use. Our sex life was getting impossible as I replaced her time with me for my time with dope. I hope this isn't too personal, but once she complained of my wheezing during sex. It was due to my marijuana and cigarette use. That sort of thing is ridiculous. Just like that model drug user I spoke of earlier, I too found pot to try and replace my best friend, my wife. I am a very luck man to finally have woken up to the real world last April. Today I speak better, have ideas of my own, am in great physical condition, have a better marriage, acquired rank, and can brief anyone on the happenings of drug use.

Everyone who has ever come in the main gate has probably seen the American flag proudly flying in the brisk West Texas breeze. Every morning and evening it is solemnly raised and lowered by members of Command Post, the Security Police and the Wing Honor Guard. These people do their job proudly, but I've noticed that some members of the wing are unaware of the honors that our flag deserves.

The stars and stripes represent a living country and should be considered a living emblem of the respect and pride we have for our nation. The flag is a symbol of our heritage from Bunker Hill to Beirut. It has been alternately honored, respected, burned and defiled. It represents everything that we, as Americans, should hold close to our hearts and, by following a few simple rules, we can give our flag the respect and reverence that it deserves.

Summer is here and with it

comes the kind of nice weather that will encourage you to display a flag outside your office building or home. When you do, insure that it doesn't touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, bushes or merchandise. Let it fly free and raise it briskly in the morning and lower it ceremoniously at sunset. If you display your flag at night, illuminate it for all to see. Contrary to popular belief, you can display your flag on an inclement day. Just use an all-weather, nylon flag. If you use a flag in an auditorium, office or on a speaker's platform it should hold the position of superior prominence and be to the speaker's right as he faces the audience. Never wear the American flag as clothing or a costume, nor use it as bedding or draperies. A flag patch or lapel pin can be affixed to clothing and should be worn on the left lapel or shoulder near the heart.

During the raising or lowering of the flag, all persons in uniform should stand at attention and salute. All persons not in uniform should stand at

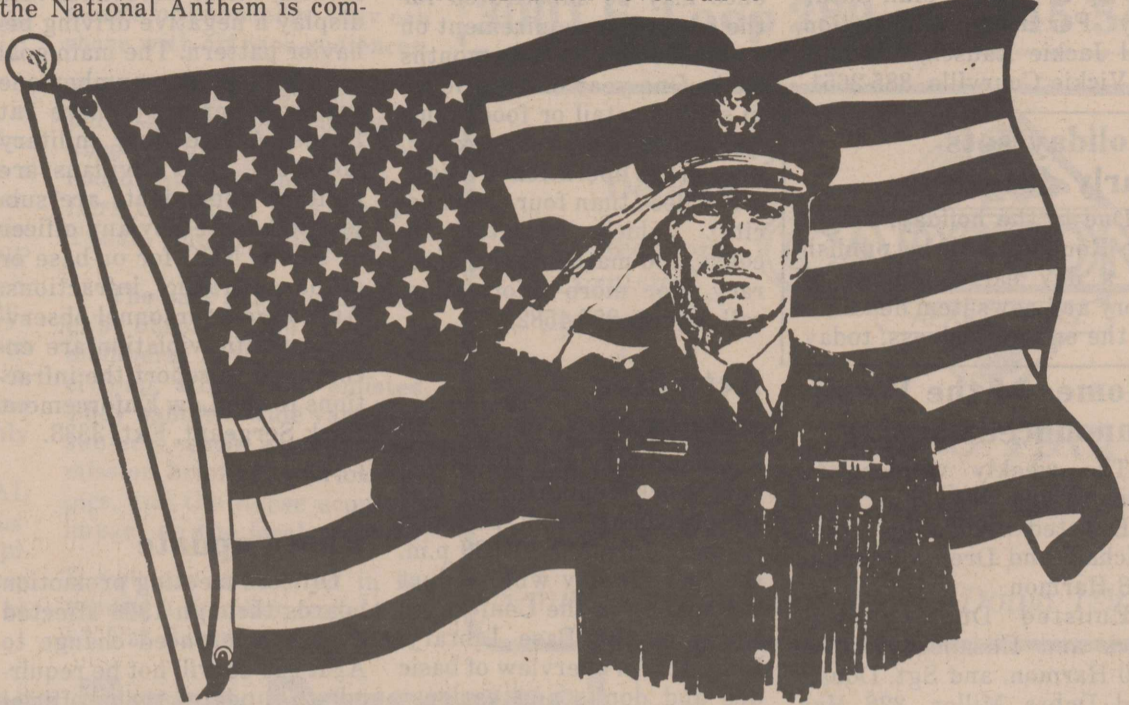
attention and place the right hand over the heart. All caps and hats should be removed. If the flag passes in a parade, render the appropriate salute six paces before and hold it until six paces after the flag has passed.

If you happen to be driving on the base or in the housing area when retreat is sounded, please stop your vehicle until the National Anthem is com-

pleted. If you are walking on base or in the housing area, stand at parade rest until you hear the National Anthem and then render the appropriate salute. If you are just about to exit a building, don't wait until after the retreat ceremony is complete, get outside and show your respect and support of our great nation. And don't ever run to

get inside before the ceremony starts. Not only is this an insult to the flag, it also demonstrates a lack of respect for this nation and the men and women who protect it.

Be proud of the heritage that surrounds the flag. Teach your family what it means to respect and honor the symbol of our country.

The active ingredient in MINT CAL is 2-4 Dinitrophenol—DNP. DNP is used as a pesticide and a dog wormer. The Food and Drug Administration has not approved DNP for use in humans. The product interferes with the cell's ability to use food to produce energy. It produced an increase in metabolic rate and heat production and is highly toxic to man.

Persons using MINT CAL are urged to discontinue using it immediately. The Hospital offers weight loss classes which are safe and aimed at long-term weight control.

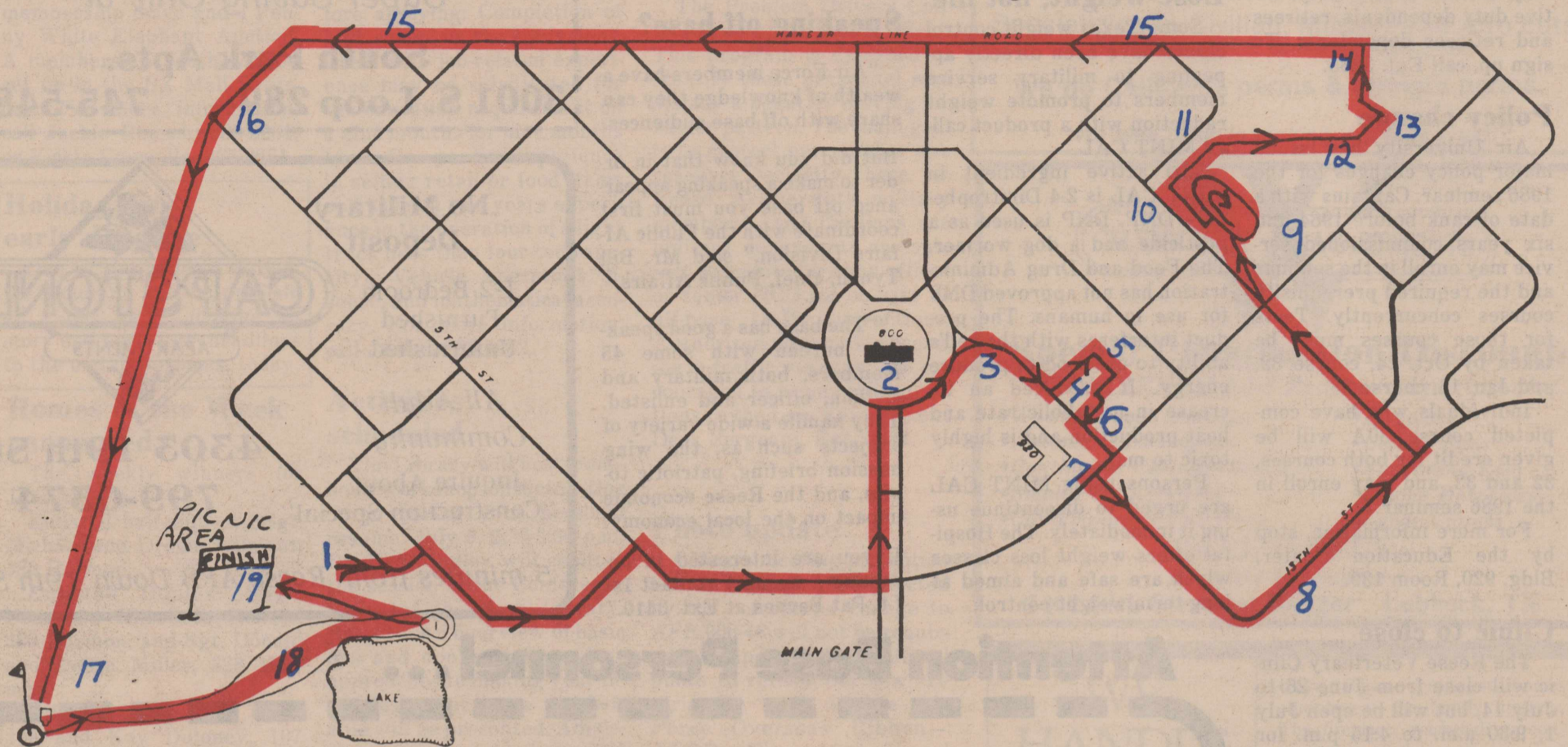

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Everyone needs a budget

KELLY AFB, Texas (AFNS)—The key to financial solvency is a working budget backed up with a readily accessible savings account.

According to Rosalyn Massie, personal financial management program counselor in the Family Support Center here, people get into financial trouble because they lack a financial planning program.

They deal with money on a "want" rather than "need" basis, without finding out whether an item can be worked into the budget, she said. "They want it and just go out and buy it."

Many people think they don't need to save or budget, said Mrs. Massie. "They think, 'I have so many bills to pay and that's where my money goes.' But when they don't have the extra money for an emergency—that's when they really need it."

If people allow their expenses to exceed what is coming in, naturally their budgets are not going to balance at the end of the month. People really don't plan to fail, Mrs. Massie said, "they fail to plan."

The only thing that keeps people solvent in the long run is a realistic working budget and a regular savings plan, she said, adding, "Saving has to be a systematic, willful thing to leave that money in an account for emergencies."

She said individual retirement accounts are fine once a person has a "savings backbone," because they have substantial penalties for early withdrawals. "But you need liquidity—at least three to six months' take-home salary that you can get your hands on in an emergency," she said.

People who don't know how to set up a budget can get help from the Family Support Center. At most bases there is a personal financial management counselor to help find out where every penny is going and to develop and balance a budget.

Because credit in this country is so easy to get, Mrs. Massie said, "It's best for individuals who have difficulty managing credit or who do not have a working budget to buy on a cash-only basis."

If creditors are already

"pounding on their doors and they are active duty," they can go to the FSC and talk to someone in the Air Force Aid Society. Air Force Aid can help reconstruct their budget, said Mrs. Massie.

AFAS has a program that will keep active-duty members from going into bankruptcy. "And if it's within the AFAS monetary limit, members can get an interest-free budget reconstruction loan," she said.

Under the BRP, Mrs. Massie said, creditors are paid, all past-due amounts are brought up to date and members are brought to a point where everything fits within their ability to pay. The member has to accept financial management counseling and subsequent monitoring.

Once people get behind or pay bills late on a regular basis, their credit is affected, said Mrs. Massie. "The retail merchants' association probably already has this information—and it stays on record for about seven years."

She explained that whenever a credit check is done, it shows whether a person pays on time or whether the bills are paid late. A credit check also will show whether or not there is a foreclosure, a repossession or an uncollected balance.

Most credit associations across the country now are connected by computers so that an association in one city can talk to an association in another city. "You can't run away from your debts—your credit records follow you," said Mrs. Massie.

If a person has to file bankruptcy, there are two types available. Chapter 7—total bankruptcy—wipes all debts off the books. The other—Chapter 13—is the wage earner's budget reconstruction plan.

"With Chapter 13, your outstanding debts are paid back, but all interest and finance charges are deleted, and the payments are based on your ability to pay," said Mrs. Massie.

When a person files for bankruptcy, she said, it's very difficult to re-establish credit. However, she believes it might be a little easier with Chapter 13 because "the creditors do receive their mo-

ney—but over a longer period of time and without interest.

"But," she said, "it's even better if you don't get into this situation. And you won't—if you stay on a budget and establish and regular savings plan."

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

Commander's trophy points

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS)—Lackland AFB, Texas, has lengthened its lead over Lowry AFB, Colo., to 110 points in Air Training Command sports and recreation competition. The Lackland lead in the race for the ATC Commander's Trophy comes 10 events into this year's 23 event sports calendar.

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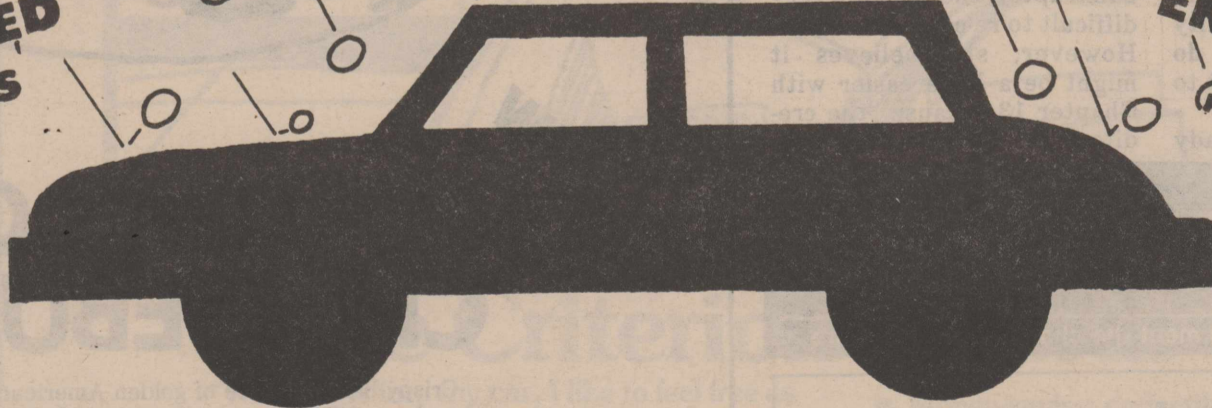
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Will this happen to you?

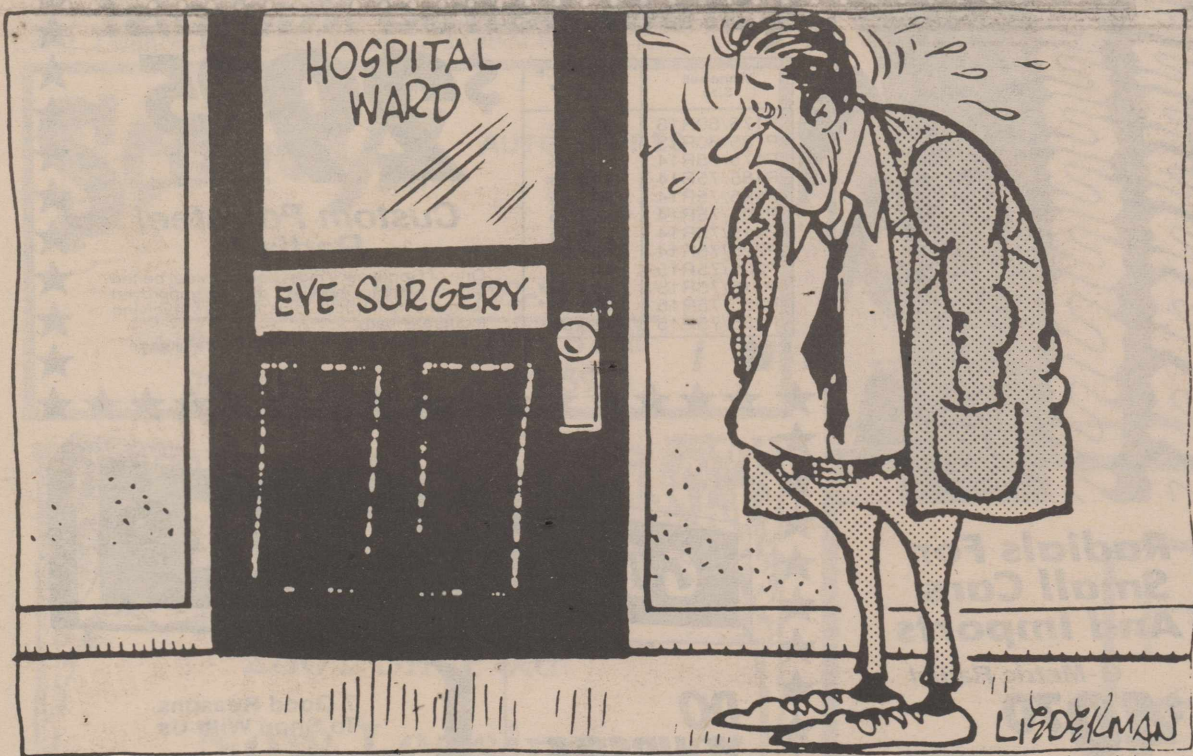
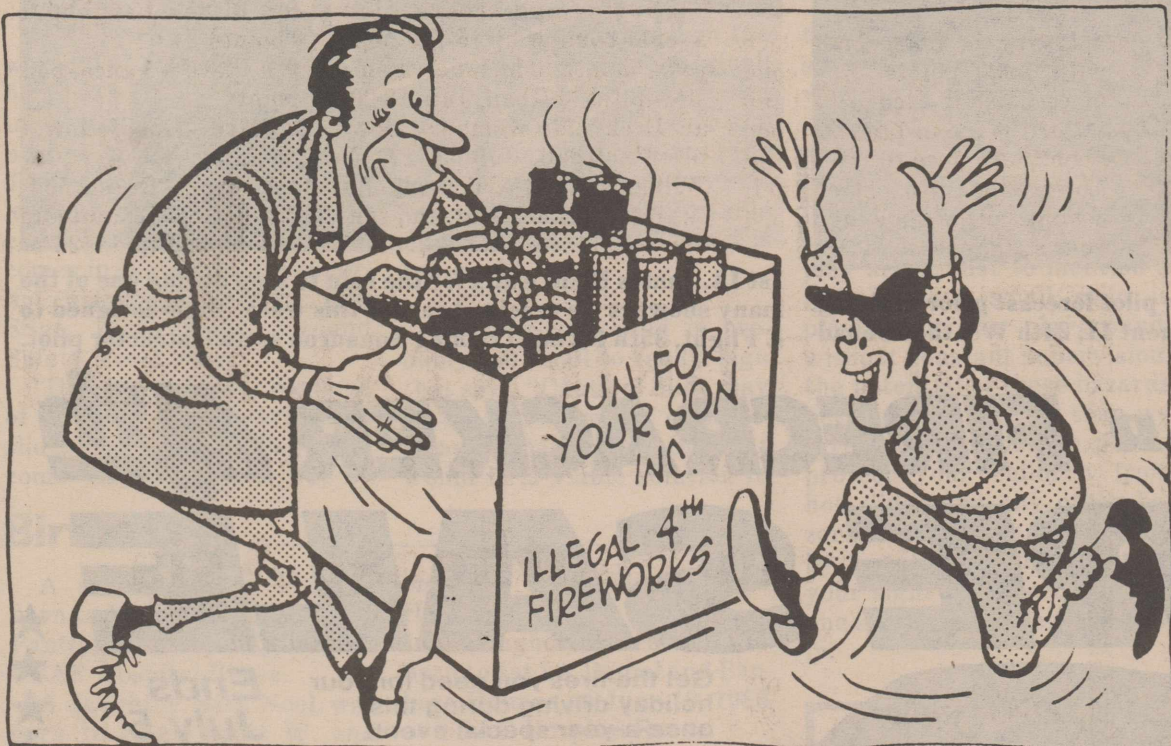
What is legal? What is allowed on Reese?

In the City of Lubbock, as in most cities, it is illegal to set off fireworks.



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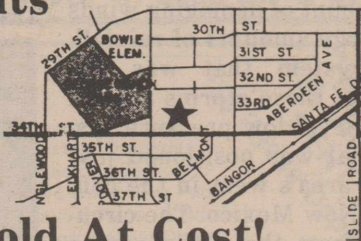
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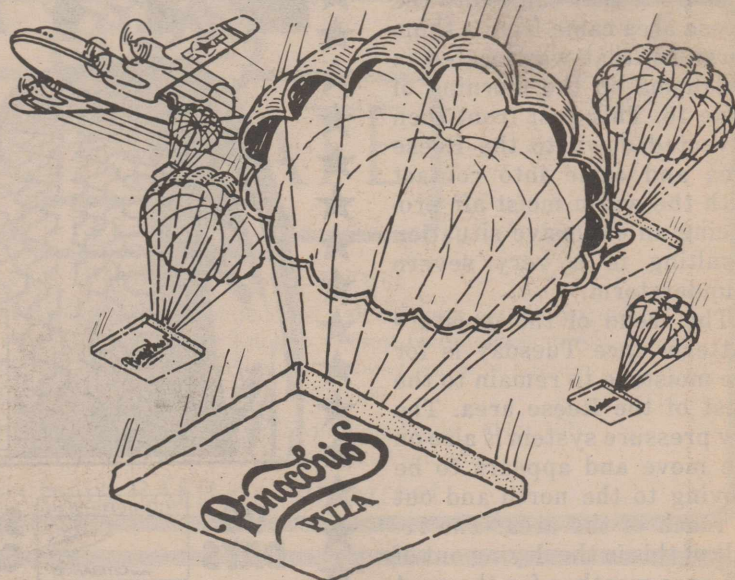
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Reese catches a few inches of rain

The reason for records is for them to be broken. In the Reese area the weather has broken its share. The storms that have been plaguing the area have brought an incredible amount of damaging winds and large amounts of rainfall. The system that was the cause of these storms was an upper level low pressure system that was positioned just to the area's west in the center of New Mexico. The circulation from the low pressure system continued to bring moisture into the area keeping all levels of the atmosphere saturated. The low pressure system also kept spinning off disturbances in the form of troughs into the area creating instability areas which aided in the formation of thunderstorms as experienced at Reese during the last few days.

As a result of the low pressure system remaining in the area for such a lengthy period of time, Reese has received 6.05 inches of measurable precipitation for the month of June. The average rainfall for the month is around 2.05 inches! Winds from these storms are breaking all previous records which have been kept since 1952. 65 knots was the record but on June 16, 1986, the winds peaked out at 68 knots (78 mph). It has been known that the storms can be severe over the Texas Panhandle and it appears that this year the storms made this a self evident truth. In the case of the storm which created the strong winds, it's birth was right over the Reese vicinity. A gust front appears to be the culprit. A gust front is the result of a dying thunderstorm that collapses producing a disturbance much like that of a cold front on the surface but with very gusty winds and not as extensive as the cold front. The gust front is an area of extremely unstable air. The gust front that came into the Reese area came from a thunderstorm that was located in Oklahoma on the morning of June 16. This gust front then advected down to the Reese area and came into contact with the warm moist air producing an explosive situation resulting in a very severe thunderstorm.

The trend of the moisture pattern since Tuesday is for the moisture to remain to the west of the Reese area. The low pressure system is also on the move and appears to be moving to the north and out of reach of the area. The result of this is the drying out of the area weather for the next few days. The weekend looks quite nice at this time with the temperatures being in the mid 90s and the overnight lows will be in the mid 60s. The chance of thunderstorms will probably be in the forecast but this threat will begin to decrease as the weekend approaches. Hopefully mother nature will let the air dry out and the days will be a little more comfortable and little less humid.

A point of interest lies out in the Gulf of Mexico. A tropical storm called "Bonnie" is

producing winds between 80 to 90 knots and is headed for the shore. Once these tropical storms hit the shore line, they usually die out because they require warm moist open waters to feed on to keep them alive. If you or anyone you know is traveling down to the southeast border of

Texas, give the weather station a call at 3685 and we can give you a heads up on the activity. This system does not look as though it will affect the immediate area at this time. Have a good weekend from the Reese weather station.

Playgrounds hide many hazards

"Can you image what it would be like to stick your hand on a pile of red hot burning coals or on a flaming burner from a cook stove? The feeling you would endure is very similar to what a small child bears when he or she comes in contact with a super-hot playground slide," said SSgt. Ricky Pope, Ground Safety Technician.

"During the hotter portions of the day, the playground slides in Reese Village become unbearably hot due to

the sun beating down on the shiny metal. If your small child is playing unsupervised in this playground, he or she is not going to know that the slide is hot until they have received a very uncomfortable skin burn or worse. Then it is too late!

"Your young child is probably too small to read a sign that says, 'Caution! Slide may be too hot to touch,' or something of that nature. So what would be a viable solution to

this problem? Well, good constant parental supervision would be good for starters.

"There are many potential hazards in and around playgrounds—playground equipment, broken glass, and streets surrounding these play areas, just to mention a few. If your small child is playing in the playground, without constant supervision, the potential of these hazards becomes far greater than we care to think about. So, please protect your children from hot slides and any other hazards that might harm them by not letting them out of your sight for a second. That one second could be very costly.
